KING'S COLLEGE, FREDERICTON.

June 21, 1836.

The following arrangement is made for the observances in connexion with the Encenia, concluding the present academical year.

On Saturday next, at 10 in the morning, Candidates for the Degree of Bachelor of Arts will be examined by the Rev. James Somerville, L. L. D. and the Rev. George Cowell, A. M.

On Sunday morning the Anniversary Sermon will be preached in the Parish Church of Fredericton by the Rev. George McCauley, D. D.

On Monday, at 10, Candidates for the Scholarship proposed to general competition will be examined.

On Tuesday, at the same hour, the Annual Meeting of the Council will be held; after which the usual Examination of the College will take place.

On Wednesday, at the same hour, the Collegiate School will be examined.

On Thursday, at noon, the Encenia will be celebrated, the Rev. Dr. Somerville pronouncing the commemorative oration; Degrees will be conferred in convocation; and the subject for the Douglas Medal of the ensuing year will be proposed by His Excellency the Chancellor.

From the St. John Courier extra, June 18.

By the arrival of the ship *China*, after our paper went to press, in the remarkably short passage of twenty days from Newry, we have been obligingly favoured with papers from that place to the 24th May, containing London dates to the 21st, from which we we hastily give the following summary:—

By an answer given by Lord Glenelg to a question put by Lord Strangford in the House of Lords on the 19th, no measure will be brought forward during the present session for disturbing the existing timber duties.

Mr. O'Connell had, by the decision of the Committee on the Dublin Election, been unelected in the representation of that city, and Messrs. Hamilton and West, the conservative candidates, had taken the oaths and their seats as members for Dublin.—Mr. O'Connell had subsequently been returned for Kilkeny.

A collision was evidently about to take place between the two Houses on the amendments made by the Lords on the Irish Municipal Reform Bill, as from what fell from Lord J. Russell in the Commons, H. M. Government would not advise the same being agreed to by that House. Parliament had adjourned for three weeks from the 20th May, and it was confidently expected a dissolution of the House would take place immediately after the recess.

It was apparent that Ministers felt themselves in a dilemma as to the course of proceeding, and it is asserted upon the best information that Lord Melbourne would retire from the Premiership.

House of Lords, May 19.—Lord Strangford inquired whether any alteration would be proposed this Session in the Timber Duties?

Lord Glenelg answered in the negative; but in answer to another question, said that the subject of the measurement of deals, &c. was under consideration.

THE CABINET.—A report is in circulation that Lord Durham has been sent for, in consequence of the resignation of Melbourne, who still continues indisposed. It is added that this arrangement has been adopted, in order not to break up the present cabinet. We learn that Lord Glenelg has been to the King at Windsor, from whence he arrived this morning at the Foreign Office.—*True Sun.*

PROPOSALS will be received at the Provincial Secretary's Office until the first of September next, for opening thirty or forty miles of the Royal Road, as follows:

To be cut out four Rods or sixty six feet in width and to have twenty six feet in the centre fully cleared of Roots, Rocks, Logs, &c. to a depth of at least eighteen inches below the surface of the ground, and levelled. Also to have culverts or water courses placed where the Road may require them, and made of two side pieces of sound hewn Hemlock or Cedar Timber, sixteen inches square and twenty four feet in length; these to be placed at least three feet apart on ridges if required, and let in nine inches below the surface of the road; these to have four cross pieces of six inches square dovetailed into them at equal distances allowing two feet to spare at each end. The whole to be floored with five inch sound hewn Hemlock or Cedar, twenty four feet in length, laid close and butted; after which sixteen feet of the centre to be covered with five or six inches of gravel.
