By the arrival of the English Mail, we have received London dates to the 7th July. The House of Lords, after a warm debate, had again returned the Irish Corporation Bill, as amended, to the House of Commons, by which the further consideration has been postponed for three months.

Tea Ship, direct to New Brunswick.—We understand that the ship Clifton, Captain Worrell, taken up for account of parties in this City, sailed from London on the 19th June, bound for Canton and St. John, N. B. This vessel may be expected to arrive about February next, with a cargo of teas.—St. John Courier.

Visit of the Bishop of Nova Scotia.—The Lord Bishop of Nova Scotia, arrived here in the Cape Breton Steamer on the 6th inst. and has since been actively engaged in the duties of his high calling. He consecrated the Churches at Bathurst and Bay du Vin, conferred the solemn right of confirmation on 40 persons in St. Paul's Church Chatham, on Sunday week, and last Sabbath ordained the Rev. Mr. Hudson, the Minister officiating in this District. His Lordship took his departure in the Steamer yesterday.—Miramichi Gleaner.

HALIFAX, August 16.

Extract of a letter from the keeper of the Canso Light House, dated July 20. "On the 7th of July there were 65 sail of vessels passed through Canso harbor, with a strong breeze from the south; and on the 8th 50 sail came to anchor in this harbour—of that number I received light money from 32 sail, part of the remainder paid to the westward, and part I could find no master for, and they were off next morning, so that I had no chance to serve them as I would wish, they have got up to a plan of going on shore as soon as the anchor is down, and then say that the master is on shore whether it be true or not. On the twelfth, there were eighty sail passed without asking—if I had force to take with me in the boat, I would make them pay under sail, but they will not pay without being obliged to. I think there are about five hundred sail of American vessels gone to the North Bay fishing already.

YARMOUTH, August 5.—The harbour of Barrington was so crowded with mackerel during last week, that a number of persons caught (by the line,) split and cured from three to four barrels a day each.

Negro Revolt at Havannah.—The Providence Courier publishes the following extract of a letter, dated

HAVANA, July 10.
Yesterday afternoon there was a revolt among the negroes outside the wall. They fired a wax manufactory and killed a corporal of the army.—They were attacked by the cavalry and were soon put to flight, six negroes being killed and ten taken prisoners, who will be garroted in a few days.
