FROM FLORIDA.—To the politeness of Lieut. Daney, of the U. S. Artillery, who came passenger in the schr. Amelia, Capt. Jenner, arrived here this forenoon from New Orleans via St. Augustine, we learn that the troops have removed from Micanopy to Gary's Ferry, Black Creek, in consequence of sickness and the exhausted state of the Teams. A detachment consisting of three Companies, have since been ordered by Col. Crane, to take post at Santa-fee bridge, 28 miles from Gary's Ferry, on the road to Newnansville.

The garrison in the interior are as follows— at Newnansville 60 miles from Gary's Ferry; Santa-fee Bridge; Gary's Ferry; and Picolata. Numerous small parties of Indians, (supposed to be Creeks) are reported to be passing South in the vicinity of Newnansville.

There are now above three hundred men sick at St. Augustine, having been brought from the interior.

Maj. Pierce had abandoned his intention of renewing the attack on the Indians at General Clinch's plantation, from the exhausted state of the troops, &c. and a superior force of the enemy.

Capt. Ashby had entirely recovered from his wounds.

Lieut. Daney gives a deplorable account of the health of the U. S. forces in Florida.—He states that a company of eighty-five U. S. Dragoons, who arrived there in March last, there were but six reported capable of duty, of his company, consisting of between sixty and seventy, there were only four who, when he left, were not on the sick list.—Charleston Southern Patriot.

SAINT JOHN COURT OF OYER AND TERMINER AND GENERAL GAOL DELIVERY, SEPT. 1836.

The King v. Hugh Gilday. Prisoner convicted of a felony in stealing from Peter Giltgan. Sentenced to be imprisoned six months in the common goal, and during the period kept at hard labour.

The King v. Prince Kenny. Prisoner convicted of a felony in stealing from William Lawton. Sentenced to be imprisoned six months at hard labour.

The King v. Angus M'Donald. Defendant convicted of an assault, with intent to commit a rape. Sentenced to be imprisoned one year at hard labour.

The King v. William Murphy. Prisoner convicted of aiding and abetting John Murphy in committing a felony, by discharging a gun with intent to maim Solomon Birchill. Sentenced to be imprisoned six months at hard labour.

The King v. John Kendall and William M'Cauley. Convicted of a rescue, and resisting a magistrate in the execution of his duty. Defendants recognized with sureties to appear at the next Court of Oyer and Terminer, and abide the sentence of the Court.

The Grand Jury ignored a bill preferred against John Spears for manslaughter.

GREAT FIRE AT QUEBEC.

About noon on Saturday last, a fire broke out in the lower town of Quebec, which was burning when the mail left in the evening. The only account of this disastrous fire which we have received, is contained in two editions of the Mercury, the first published at 3 o'clock, and the second at half past 4 o'clock. From our knowledge of the location of the section of the town where the fire was raging, we are persuaded that the loss must be very great. It will be seen that six vessels, with their cargoes, had been destroyed. Although the fire broke out very near the river, yet unfortunately, the tide was out, and the distance from the wharf to the water was probably not less than thirty feet.—N. Y. Albion.

From the Quebec Mercury of Saturday.

Three o'clock—Calamitous Fire.—This day at noon, a fire broke out in the upper floor of the store on the Queen's wharf, occupied by Mr. Vass, which speedily communicated to the stores of Mr. Buteau, and the bonding warehouse near the Cul-de-Sac, and to the dwelling house in front. The fire is still raging and has extended in the direction of St. Peter street, as far as the house of Mr. Marrett, and along Rue Sous le Fort to Mr. Arnold's new house, the interior of which is consumed. The wind is from the east, and blowing freshly, and the flakes are carried to a great distance; there is no saying how far it may extend.

The house at the corner of St. Peter's street and the Rue Sous le Fort has also taken—and a house in Champlain street was set on fire by the burning shingles falling on the roof; but the flames did not extend. The roofs of several houses and buildings in the Upper Town have also been set on fire by the burning shingles, but from the inhabitants being on the alert, the fire has been extinguished without doing much mischief. The flakes are carried completely over the town, and fall thickly on the esplanade.

The tide was unfortunately out when the fire commenced, and six large schooners, which were aground in the Cul-de-Sac, have been consumed with their cargoes. The whole town is in confusion, and the streets thronged with carts removing property and goods.

No estimate can be formed of the amount of property consumed; but the stores of Messrs Masson, Strang, Langevin & Co., and other stores on the wharves, are said to have been full of goods.

Half past 4.—The flames have somewhat abated, and it is hoped that the ravages will not extend beyond their present limits.

The flames subsided at six o'clock, and the Catholic church was saved, but with great difficulty.

From Neilson's Quebec Gazette.

The total number of buildings destroyed are 10 dwelling houses, and 6 stores.

Numbers of boats, canoes, &c. have been employed all day dragging the river in the vicinity of the Queen's and Napoleon wharves in search of articles thrown over during the fire. Many articles have been fished up by that system, though whether they have reverted to their rightful owners is rather problematical.

The total amount of the loss sustained is estimated at £65,000 to £75,000. Four or five fellows taken in the act of robbing at the fire, have been lodged in goal.
