We have been favored with a copy of their address, as also of the Rev. Dr's. reply, which we here subjoin.

A typographical omission in the Gazette of July 5th materially affected the position of some of the Students who had passed their examination for degrees. In Classical Literature, the names of S. J. Scovil and G. Lee, and those of W. Scovil and G. M. Odell, ought to have been respectively united by a brace, signifying equality of merit in the judgment of the examiners.—The names of two other Students were correctly and necessarily omitted, their term having been disallowed for neglect of duty and great irregularity.

BAPTIST ASSOCIATION.—According to appointment, the Ministers and Messengers composing the Baptist Association, met at Salisbury, Westmorland County, on Monday, July 11. The introductory Sermon was preached by the Rev. S. Robinson, after which they proceeded to business by choosing Rev. J. Crandall, Moderator; the Rev. J. D. Caswell, Clerk; and R. E. Burpe, Assistant Clerk. They then attended to the business of the Churches, and appointed a Missionary Meeting, when the necessity and importance of sustaining domestic missions by our prayers and contributions was insisted upon in suitable addresses which were then delivered, after which was subscribed and collected £130.

On the following day, the Education Society held their first annual meeting, after the opening of their institution at Fredericton, when the Committee of Management read their Report, which was received and approved. The Society then expressed their unqualified approbation of the conduct of the Committee in their judicious choice of a Principal and the expenditures of monies. In aid of the funds of this Institution, there was subscribed and collected £225.

The Association in attending to their usual business, resolved that the Assembly's shorter Catechism be adapted to the views of the Baptist denomination, and used in their schools and families.

THE ARMY.—Sir Edward Blakney has received orders from the Horse Guards, to detain at Cork the Royals and 15th Regiment, which had just marched there from Enniskillen, in order to embark for Quebec. They are to wait special orders from the Commander-in-Chief.

The Depot Company of the 34th Regiment have been landed from Bowness, ex the Erie steamer, replacing the 52d Light Infantry at the Pigeon house fort. Major Greaves commands the 34th. A draft from that corps, consisting of Lieut. James, Ensigns Goodenough and McDonald, 2 sergeants, and 50 rank and file, are at Cork, awaiting consequence upon Nova Scotia, to join the service companies.

The Admiralty have had under consideration the severe case of the master assistants, and decided that in future his Majesty's ships are to bear as follows:—Line of battle ships, 3 master assistants; Other rated ships, 2 ditto ditto, Sloops, 1 ditto ditto. And that in default of captains applying for the same, the Admiralty will appoint that number to each ship in commission from amongst the most deserving.

ICE BERGS.—His Majesty's Packet Express, experienced severe gales from the W. S. W. to W. N. W. and during her passage, fell in with several Ice Bergs. On the 7th inst. lat. 43, lon. 61 20, fell in with two, supposed aground in 45 fathoms; they appeared to be at least 170 feet high—they were S. W. by W. true 70 miles from Sable Island.—Halifax Royal Gazette.

To be cut out four Rods or sixty six feet in width and to have twenty six feet in the centre fully cleared of Roots, Rocks, Logs, &c. to a depth of at least eighteen inches below the surface of the ground, and levelled.
