The sentiments contained in this Address are most acceptable to me, and I thank you for the renewed expression of your desire to co-operate zealously, and cordially, with me in directing your best exertions to the attainment of such objects as I have thought it necessary to recommend to your more immediate consideration; and also to the adoption of such measures as may tend to promote the general interests, and prosperity, of the loyal inhabitants of this Province.

ADDRESS OF THE HOUSE OF ASSEMBLY.

To His Excellency Major General Sir Archibald Campbell, Baronet, G. C. B. Lieutenant Governor and Commander in Chief of His Majesty's Province of New Brunswick.

THE HUMBLE ADDRESS OF THE HOUSE OF ASSEMBLY.

May it please Your Excellency—

We the Representatives of His Majesty's loyal subjects, the people of New Brunswick, beg leave to express our thanks for Your Excellency's Speech at the opening of the present Session.

We rejoice with Your Excellency, at the happy and prosperous condition of the Province; and we assure Your Excellency that in addition to making the usual provision for the ordinary services, we shall not fail to encourage and promote that Public spirit now manifesting itself throughout this important portion of the British Empire.

To the Laws regulating Statute labour, the House of Assembly has always zealously applied itself; and we shall cheerfully give the present system our deliberate consideration, with a view to such improvements and alterations as its importance demands.

Deeply regretting that the Bounty so liberally granted by the Legislature for the endowment of Parish Schools, has been in too many instances rendered ineffectual by the want of moral qualification and ability in the teacher, it shall be our earnest endeavour to apply such remedies, as a careful and diligent investigation may suggest.

We thank Your Excellency for directing the Treasurer's accounts to be laid before us, and are gratified to learn that the finances of the Province are in a healthy state; this will enable us to continue our aid and support to all Institutions of Public utility.

Our gracious Sovereign having been pleased to confirm the Act to provide for the Custom House Establishment, and to accede to the terms proposed for relinquishing the Quit Rents, we are glad that these questions, are thus fairly settled, and, in common with all His Majesty's subjects in the Province, we receive the relinquishment of the Quit Rents as an additional mark of the paternal regard of our King, and we fully appreciate the solicitude which Your Excellency has at all times evinced on this important subject.

Your Excellency may rely that such communications from His Majesty's Government as you may be pleased to lay before us, shall receive our best attention.

REPLY:

Mr. Speaker, and Gentlemen of the House of Assembly,

I thank you for this loyal and satisfactory Address, and for the assurance which it affords me of your prompt attention to such enactments as may tend to advance the general prosperity of the Province, and particularly to those subjects which I have thought it important to bring more immediately under your consideration.

I have only to assure you that I shall always be most ready to give every aid in my power, in the adoption of such measure as may lead to the promotion of the welfare and happiness of the people at large.

GARRISON BALL AND SUPPER.—On Thursday evening the 21st instant, Colonel Booth, K. H., and the Officers of that distinguished and gallant Corps the 43d or Monmouth Regiment of Light Infantry, gave a splendid Ball and Supper in the spacious rooms of the Court House. The rank, beauty and fashion of the neighborhood, were invited to this entertainment, which was on a scale of magnificence and grandeur seldom witnessed. Every luxury that nature could afford or art suggest was in profusion, together with the choicest viands and wines.

The Ball and Supper Rooms were splendidly decorated, in a style that could not be surpassed, and the whole illuminated with wax lights. The Colours of the Regiment triumphantly floated at the head of the Supper Table. On them might be perceived the trophies and never fading laurels, gained by the Corps in many a hard fought, sanguine, and well contested field, from the Plains of Abraham to the close of the Peninsula War. On these banners may be noticed the ever to be remembered and soul stirring inscriptions—Vimero, Corunna, Talavera, Busaco, Fuentes, D'Onor, Ciudad Rodrigo, Badajoz, Salamanca and Vittoria.

The Ball was opened by Colonel Booth, the gallant Commander of the 43d, and Lady Campbell, followed by a galaxy of joyous hearts, who for the evening tipped it with elegance on the "light fantastic toe." The delightful Band of the 43d was in attendance—the music was of the first order. Dancing of waltzes, quadrilles, &c. commenced at nine o'clock, and continued without intermission until about three o'clock in

the morning, at which time the company separated, highly gratified with the happy evening which they had spent. It was regretted by all, that His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor was not present, but Lady Campbell, Captain Campbell, and the rest of the Family, graced the Company by their presence.

To Captain Hood great praise is due, for the manner in which the arrangements were made, under his superintendence, as that Gentleman exerted himself beyond the power of expression. Unfortunately, that Officer met with rather a severe accident in the knee, but at the same time it is pleasing to announce, that it was not of so serious a nature as was at first apprehended, and he is now in a fair way of recovery from the effects of it. Notwithstanding, the gallant Captain was among the gayest of the gay and foremost in the happy throng, and by his urbanity mainly contributed to the festivity of the evening.

After the company had broken up, Captain Hood and the Officers directed that the domestics should partake of refreshments, which was accordingly done.

The alarm of Fire during the past week has been frequently repeated, and we regret to say has been attended with serious losses to many individuals; and from the sections of the town where it broke out, might have been productive of the most disastrous consequences. On Sunday morning, a large workshop belonging to Mr. Thomas Wright, Carpenter, was burnt to the ground, and consumed a great quantity of lumber in a manufactured state, and destroyed four or five sets of very valuable Tools and various other articles. On Saturday morning a fire broke out in a building belonging to the Messrs. Taylors, and partly occupied as a paint shop by Mr. C. Smiler—this was consumed, together with the Barn and Shed attached thereto. Two valuable Cows were dreadfully burnt before they could be extricated, that they were immediately killed. The dwelling House of James Taylor, Esq. caught fire, but the flames were subdued before doing much damage. By the indefatigable exertions of the Fire Companies and Inhabitants generally, combined with the noble example of Col. Booth and the Officers and Men of the gallant 43d, (whom we have often beheld with admiration, successfully waging war with the raging element, as if again contending in battle with a foreign foe)—a vast portion of the town which stood in imminent jeopardy was happily preserved.

Two impressive Sermons were preached on Sunday last, in the Wesleyan Chapel, Frederickton, by the Rev. Messrs. Bushy and M'Nutt, from St. John, to large and attentive congregations, for the benefit of the Methodist Missionary Society. The Annual Public meeting was to have been held on Monday night; but in consequence of the very heavy snow storm which occurred on that day it was postponed to this evening (Wednesday). As these meetings are of considerable interest to Christians generally, we beg leave to call the attention of our readers to it.

HIS MAJESTY'S PACKET STAR.

The following Communications were received by the Deputy Postmaster General on Saturday last:—

"British Consulate, Boston, Jan. 8, 1836.

"Dear Sir—I beg to annex a Copy of a Letter received this day from the Acting Commander of His Majesty's Packet Star, relative to a most unfortunate and melancholy accident which happened to that Vessel on her voyage from Falmouth to Halifax with the November Mail. I am, &c. &c.

(Copy.) H. M. P. Star, at Sea, Dec. 6, 1835. Lat. 29, 30, long. 30, W.

"Sir—I beg leave to communicate to you for the information of My Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, that His Majesty's Packet Star bound to Halifax with the November Mail, in Lat. 46, long. 30, W. met with a heavy gale of wind, which threw her on her beam ends and dismasted her—washing overboard Lieut. J. BINNEY, Commander, and eleven Seamen; By your making this Communication known to the Admiralty, as also in Halifax, you will oblige me. I am now making the best of my way for Antigua." To the British Consul, Boston.

Although truly distressing is the intelligence of the fate of Lieut. BINNEY, and of those who, with him, sunk into a watery grave—still it is gratifying to find that the Packet is safe, and that at least forty of our fellow creatures have been providentially preserved to their families and connexions. The time when the gale was encountered is not mentioned—but as the Packet was

spoken on the 17th November, in lat. 47, and as the deplorable occurrence took place in lat. 46, it is probable it happened a day or two after that on which she was fallen in with. On the 6th Dec. according to the Acting Commander's Letter, she was in lat. 29, 30, long. 30, between 600 and 700 miles from Antigua; where we trust she has safely arrived. If the Commander in Chief, who, we understand, left Bermuda about two months since was at any of the Windward Islands, it is likely a Ship of War would be ordered to convey the Mails hither immediately, but if not, and they are detained until the Star's damages are repaired, a fortnight or three weeks we should think will elapse before they come to hand.

We cannot close this article without offering to Mr. Binney, his Family and Relatives, our sympathy, and the expression of our deep regret at the loss they have sustained in the death of their near and dear connexion, who has been prematurely and suddenly taken from amongst them. His Widow and Orphan Boy, now living in Falmouth, have yet to learn the dreadful tidings—to them, this affliction of Providence will long be keenly and severely felt.—Halifax Royal Gazette.
