

settlements of British North America, as affording a secure field for the profitable employment of capital.

2. After several meetings attended by many of the Mechanics connected with the North American Colonies, it was unanimously

Resolved,—"That it is expedient to form a Banking Company for British North America."

3. The management of the Company's affairs to be vested in the London Court of Directors, and the Bank in the Colonies to be conducted by local Boards appointed by them.

4. A general meeting of the Proprietors to be held yearly in London, at which a statement of the Company's affairs will be submitted to them.

5. A clause will be inserted in the deed of settlement to compel the Directors, should it ever appear from the books, that a loss has been sustained of one third of the capital, to call an extraordinary general meeting of the shareholders, and submit to them a statement of the accounts, for the purpose of determining on the expediency of dissolving or continuing the Company.

6. The Directors reserve to themselves power at any time they may deem expedient to apply for and accept on behalf of the establishment of a Charter of Incorporation, or Act of Parliament, with the security to the shareholders the advantages of limited responsibility.

7. In the appropriation of shares applications recommended by a Director will be preferred.

8. A deposit of £10 per share to be paid within seven days of the allotment, and the deed of settlement must be signed at the time of payment.

9. After the payment of the deposit, no further call will be made for a considerable time, the remaining portion of the capital will be required by instalments not exceeding £10 per share, at intervals not less than two months of which due notice will be given.

Civil Appointments.

We mentioned last week the excitement which had been produced in this Town from the awful appearance of the fires which were furiously raging in the forests in our immediate neighbourhood; since which they had spread to a very alarming extent during the latter part of the week. The wind was generally high, and caused the flame and smoke to range in every direction, creating the most fearful apprehensions lest this flourishing place should again be doomed to a fate even more dreadful in its effects than during the conflagration in 1825. But in this as in numberless instances the hand of Providence has intervened, and been better to us than all our fears—plentiful showers of rain has refreshed and revived the face of nature and given to vegetation the most lovely and animating appearance. What then is our duty in reference to the direful calamities which were suspended over us, and from which we have been so recently and mercifully preserved. Must it and ought it not to be the language of every sincere and honest heart—Oh that men would praise the Lord for his goodness and for his wonderful works to the children of men!

"CITY BANK."—We understand that the instalment of fifty per cent. on the capital stock of the City Bank has been

promptly paid in by the Shareholders. Ten shares, which had been subscribed for by a minor, who would be debarred from receiving the dividends, &c. until he attained his majority, having been left unpaid, were sold at auction, and brought six and a half per cent. premium. The notes, which arrived on Wednesday, are now being filled up, and it is expected that all the other necessary preparations will be completed by the 15th, when the Bank will go into operation.—*Saint John Courier*, July 9.

ACCIDENT.—We learn that Mr. John O'Dougherty, of Gagetown, was accidentally drowned at that place on the 1st instant, while getting on board a small vessel on the way to the City.—Mr. O'Dougherty has left a wife and small family to lament their sudden bereavement. He resided for several years in St. John, and was generally respected by his acquaintances.—*Ibid.*

ARREST OF A MURDERER.—Timothy Dempsey, who was accused of the murder of Patrick Parle, and against whom a verdict to that effect was returned by a Coroner's Jury at Bellefoune, County of Gloucester, on the 1st May last, was lately arrested in Boston by persons who pursued him from this Province, and brought to this City in the *Wag Union*, on Wednesday last. He has since been conveyed to the County where the crime was committed, to await his trial at the next Circuit Court.—*Ibid.*

THE WEATHER.—We have seldom much to say about the weather, particularly when we can say so little in its favour, as has been lately the case. The season is extremely backward, and on midsummer day, an evening seat by the fire was by no means uncomfortable. The upland meadows are parched, and the present appearance of the grass gives a miserable prospect of the hay harvest.—Potatoes, where care has been taken to procure good seed, look well. In another column will be found extracts from the United States reports, which gives very opposite accounts of the crops; and in the South, it appears, they have had heavy rains. Here the weather has been remarkably dry; during the whole spring we have had only a few showers, and vegetation is weak and tardy for want of moisture.—*St. Andrews Standard*.

THE WEATHER.—The Weather during the greater part of the week, has been excessively warm—the thermometer standing at noon, on Wednesday last, at 110 in an exposed situation. What has added to the heat, is the extensive fires that have been raging in the woods, which, on the afternoon of the above mentioned day, assumed a very threatening appearance, and the people wisely made preparations for any emergency, by placing pumcheons and other vessels near their dwellings, which they filled with water. On Friday night we had a thunder storm, which was accompanied with a heavy fall of rain: this damped the fires considerably—but yesterday the settlements were again enveloped in smoke. Every thing in the fields look parched and withered for want of moisture.—*Miramichi Gleaner*.

ALLEGED MURDER.—On Thursday last the dead body of a man was found on the shore of Hog Island, at the mouth of the Digdeguash, in the inner Bay of Passamaquoddy, which was recognized to be that of Matthew Lynch, a pensioner, who had resided on the adjacent mainland. An inquest was held before David Mowat, Esq. the Coroner, when, from marks of violence observed on the corpse and numerous circumstances testified by witnesses, a verdict of murder was pronounced, with strong suspicions of James Robinson (who lived in Lynch's neighbourhood,) being the perpetrator of it. The hue and cry was issued, but it is mainly to be attributed to the vigilance of Colin Campbell, Esq. the High Sheriff, that efficient steps were taken to secure the party accused. Being at St. George on official duty last Saturday, he discovered that Robinson had absconded, and that a person answering to his appearance had taken the road to Saint John. He lost no time in procuring a warrant from Moses Vernon, Esq. and, by a fortuitous circumstance, got it indorsed by Mr. Menzies, a Magistrate for the County of St. John, who happened to be present. Thus armed, the Sheriff despatched two men on horseback, who overtook and arrested the supposed culprit, the same night, within a mile or two of St. John, and brought him hither on Monday. An examination took place before Justices Ker, Douglas and others on Tuesday, when Robinson was fully committed to take his trial at the next Court of General Gaol Delivery.—*St. Andrews Standard*, June 30.

His majesty's sloop *Wanderer*, which sailed hence on Monday last, proceeds to the Bay of Fundy, to prevent infringements on the British fishing grounds in that quarter, by vessels of other nations. There is now a ship of war on every fishing station for that purpose.—*Halifax Recorder*.

The Right Hon. the Earl of Dalhousie has written to the Hon. P. McGill, expressing his acknowledgments for the compliment paid in electing him an Honorary Member, by acclamation, of the St. Andrew's Society of Montreal; and contributing one hundred pounds sterling to the funds for the support of unfortunate emigrants who may come under the notice of the Society.

On the 26th May, at his residence, Canning (Queen's County,) Mrs. Sarah Sypher, relict of the late Mr. Lodewick Sypher, in the 86th year of her age.

On the 4th inst. at the same place, Mr. Eber Stone, in the 89th year of his age—an old and respectable inhabitant of Canning.

To be cut out four Rods or sixty six feet in width and to have twenty six feet in the centre fully cleared of Roots, Rocks, Logs, &c. to a depth of at least eighteen inches below the surface of the ground, and levelled. Also to have culverts or water courses placed where the Road may require them, and made of two side pieces of sound hewn Hemlock or Cedar Timber, sixteen inches square and twenty four feet in length; these to be placed at least three feet apart or wider if required, and let in nine inches below the surface of the road; these to have four cross pieces of six inches square dovetailed into them at equal distances allowing two feet to spare at each end.
