



LEGISLATURE OF NEW BRUNSWICK.

HOUSE OF ASSEMBLY. COMMITTEE OF SUPPLY.

Saturday, February 20.
To His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, the sum of £350 for four years, to be paid to any person or persons who shall establish a Steam Boat communication, of not less than seventy horse power, between Miramichi and Pictou, Nova Scotia, and Charlotte Town, Prince Edward's Island; the said Boat to run not less than once a week (when not prevented by stress of weather or other unforeseen accidents,) for five years next succeeding after such Steam Boat shall commence on the first day of July in each year, during the said period touching at Miramichi each trip; the said sum to be paid annually, by Warrant of the Lieutenant Governor or Commander in Chief for the time being, by and with the advice of His Majesty's Council, on the production of a certificate from the Collector of the Customs at Miramichi, that the said Boat has entered and cleared at the Custom House, and the time and times such Steam Boat has entered Miramichi during the season for which such certificate is given between the periods mentioned, and upon condition that a good and approved security be given to His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor or Commander in Chief for the time being, before any Warrant be issued for the first annual sum, and that the said Boat shall be continued on that line running once a fortnight between the above named periods (except unavoidable accidents as before excepted,) for the term of five years next succeeding her commencement, which security shall be lodged with the Secretary of the Province; provided always, to entitle any person to the benefit of the foregoing sum, a Steam Boat of the power before mentioned shall be put into operation before the 1st day of July, 1837; this being in lieu of any other grant already made for the same purpose.

That the sum of £300 granted at the last Session to His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor or Commander in Chief, to be applied towards defraying the expense of building, equipping and fitting a Steam Boat to run between Fredericton and Woodstock, be re-appropriated; and further Resolved, that the sum, together with £200 additional, making in all £500, be granted to His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor or Commander in Chief, to be applied towards defraying the expense of building, equipping and fitting a good, substantial and effective Steam Boat, to be propelled by an Engine of not less than thirty Horse power, of good quality; which Steam Boat is to run between Fredericton and Woodstock for the conveyance of the Mails and Passengers; the said sum to be paid to such person or persons as shall first build and provide said Steam Boat, and establish the same on the said route, whenever it shall be certified to His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor or Commander in Chief by such person or persons as he may appoint for this purpose, that such Steam Boat has been built, and been running on the said route once a week for fifteen weeks, and that security has been given that the said Boat or some other equally efficient shall be continued on the said route, and kept so running during at least three years from its commencement.

Wednesday, February 24.
Mr. Chandler, from the Joint Committee of the Legislative Council and this House, appointed to present an Address to His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, on the subject of appointing Commissioners to meet such Commissioners as may be appointed by the Government of Nova Scotia, to run out and ascertain the line of Division between this Province and the Province of Nova Scotia, reported, that the Committee had attended to that duty, and that His Excellency was pleased to say, he would comply with the object of the Address.

Mr. Woodward, by leave, presented a Petition from Daniel Leavitt, A. S. Perkins, James Hendricks, and 22 others, Merchants and Traders of the City of Saint John, praying an Act of Incorporation may pass to them, under the name of *The New Brunswick East India Company*; which he read.

Mr. Weldon then called the attention of the House to the order, limiting the time for receiving Petitions and bringing in Bills.

When the question was taken, that the said Petition be received and lie on the Table, and it was decided in the negative.

To James Whitney, of Saint John, the sum of £150 for carrying the Mails to and from Saint John, Eastport, Saint Andrews, Digby and Annapolis, for one year, from the 1st April next to the 1st April 1837, agreeably to the prayer of his Petition; the said sum to be paid quarterly, by Warrant of His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor or Commander in Chief, on a certificate from the Post Master at Saint John being produced that the service has been properly performed.

To His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor or Commander in Chief, the sum of £500, for the improvement of the Great Road between Woodstock and Houlton.

To His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor or Commander in Chief, the sum of £ to enable the Saint Andrews and Quebec Rail Road Association to pay the necessary expenses incurred for that great and highly important undertaking, in exploring for the most suitable line and obtaining other useful information connected with the object in view.

Upon the question for sustaining the Resolution, the Committee divided—Yeas 13; Nays 16.

And it was decided in the negative.

To His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor or Commander in Chief, the sum of £ to be by him applied towards the expense of making an exploration and survey of a Rail Road from Saint Andrews to Quebec; the same to be applied as soon as it shall be certified to His Excellency, that the Legislature of Lower Canada have made a similar grant for the like purpose.

Upon the question for sustaining this Resolution, the Committee again divided; and it was likewise decided in the negative.

To His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, the sum of £ to enable him to remunerate the Saint Andrews and Quebec Rail Road Association for the expenses they have incurred in explorations and other contingent expenses.

And upon the question for sustaining this Resolution, the Committee again divided, and it was also decided in the negative.

We subjoin the following extracts received by the January Mail from England, which are the principal extracts of any moment contained in our latest Papers:—

The "Act of accusation" against Fieschi and his accomplices has been published in Paris. It appeared in the first instance in the shape of a Report made by the Count Portalis to the Court of Peers. It is of an enormous length, occupying the greater part of a quarto volume of 458 pages: A summary, and that of part only, occupies between four and five columns of the Times. The interest of this document by no means corresponds with its length. It seems to be made up of minute details of very trivial circumstances, as if it were necessary not only to give a statement of facts, but to record, for the edification of the Peers, all the gossip about Fieschi, of which the Parisian public grew tired long ago.

The foreign news convey the intelligence that the expedition of Marshal Clausel against Abdel Kader has been completely successful. This daring chief was twice defeated by the French troops, in two separate engagements; his principal town of Mascara carried; and the fortress which defends it razed to the foundation, as it was too remote from Algiers and Oran to be occupied to advantage.

The *Ætina* and the *Raven*, under the command of Captain Vidall, are about to sail for the West Coast of Africa, to map the coast between Sierra Leone and Fernando Po. Captain Beechey, in the *Sulphur*, and Lieutenant Kellett, in the *Starling*, proceeds to survey the coast of North and South America on the Pacific, in extension of Captain Beechey's former geographical researches.

The following are the members of the renewed Commission for consolidating the Military and Civil Branches of the Army—Viscount Howick, Viscount Palmerston, Lord John Russell, Lord Strathford, Mr. Spring Rice, Sir John Hobhouse; Secretary, Sir John Bissett. Orders have been received by the Spanish agents in London, from General De Lacy Evans, for the immediate recruiting of four thousand more British volunteers, for the service of Queen Donna Isabella, to form a *corps de reserve*, as the troops now out in Spain will take the field as soon as the wet season is over.

The war of the North does not seem to be prosecuted with much vigour, but still the Queen's cause is gaining ground.

A plan is in contemplation, supported by many influential merchants in the city, to establish a bank for the service of the British West India Islands, to promote the general trade of the Colonies. The management is proposed to be in London, with local managers in the Colonies. It is expected that much benefit will result from the scheme should it be carried into full effect.

Two ships are fitting at Chatham for the Polar regions—Capt. Back is to have the command.

The expedition for the relief of the Ice bound Mariners, under the command of Captain James Ross, was to sail from the Cove on the 31 January.

JANUARY 6.
The manner in which the speech of the President of the United States was received by the French Ministers, together with the great majority of the Chamber of Deputies, has fully borne out the opinion formed in the metropolis on its arrival here; and the matter is, therefore, to all intents and purposes, concluded to be virtually set at rest by the moneyed and commercial interests, and this conviction has already produced a corresponding effect on the state of business generally.

FALMOUTH, Jan. 9.
The speech of the American President at the opening of the Congress, and which was looked for with so much anxiety, is, as usual, a very lengthy document. The tenor of its language towards France is frank and firm, but not of a character to preclude a fair expectation, that the differences between the two countries may be amicably adjusted. France has consented to accept the mediation of the British Government, and little doubt seemed to exist, but that the interposition of our cabinet will prevent hostilities.

MEETING OF PARLIAMENT.—Lord John Russell has issued the customary announcement to the Ministerial Members of the House of Commons, previous to the assembling of Parliament on the 4th February, in which he requests their presence on that day, "as business of great importance will be immediately brought forward."

It is stated in accounts from Vienna, that two agents of Don Carlos were there soliciting assistance from the Austrian Government; but Prince Metternich is stated to have advised the Emperor to consider the subject. It is said that the Emperor of Russia has promised assistance, and that Charles X. at Prague, has given money and would furnish supplies.

Lord Ponsonby had an audience of the Sultan on the 23th of November, on which occasion, he received magnificent presents.

From the New York Albion, 13th Feb. By the arrival of the *England* from Liverpool, and the *Rhone* from Havre, we have received London and Paris papers to the latest dates.

The French question has within the last week assumed an aspect so favorable and pacific, that all apprehensions of war are rapidly subsiding. The Message of the President to both houses of Congress on the 8th inst., was of a most gratifying character in a two fold point of view:—First, it announced that the Government of the United States had accepted the proposed Mediation of England; and secondly, suggested to Congress the expediency of abstaining from taking any retaliatory steps against the French nation, until the result of the Mediation be known. The latter point will have great weight in Europe, and will strengthen the hands of the Mediator exceedingly, for it in effect, cancels fully and completely the threat or menace of which France so much complained. We repeat, this is a great point gained, and the President is entitled to the thanks of every lover of peace. The *Pantaloen* sailed with this important document immediately for England.

The arrival of the *England* brought us the speech of Louis Philippe on opening the Chambers, in which he announces that he has, on his part, also accepted the friendly offices of England. This adds another link to the chain of connecting circumstances in favour of preserving tranquillity. On the arrival of the *Rhone* yesterday, it was ascertained that the President's annual Message of December last, reached Paris on the 3d of January. and that it alone had given much satisfaction to the French Government. Under these accumulated favourable events, we think we are justified in prognosticating a speedy and favourable issue to this long pending question.

The article, which we have inserted elsewhere, from the *Washington Globe*, the Government paper, explains under what reservation the President has given his sanction to the Mediation. The reservation doubtless embraces a vindication of the right of the Chief Magistrate to communicate freely to Congress its sentiments; and a denial of the right of any foreign nation to take exception thereto. Upon this point Gen. Jackson has always stood firm and from which we know that he will never recede. Enough, however, has been said to soothe the feelings of France, and we feel satisfied that such will be the opinion of the British government. If France, then, be serious in her desire for peace, and why should we doubt it—the difficulty may be considered as already at an end. So much indeed does this opinion prevail in New York, that stocks of every description have rapidly advanced within a few days, and the gloom that has long hung over the minds of many has been replaced by the cheerful sunshine of hope and confidence.

POSTSCRIPT.—The Liverpool packet ship, *St. Andrew*, of the 8th ult. has arrived. The news favourable—so much so, that it is not improbable the French will determine to pay the money before the return of the *Pantaloen*. A King's Messenger has arrived, probably bearer of duplicates of despatches brought by the *Pantaloen*. The following passage is from the address of the French Chambers to the King:—

"Your Majesty has accepted the friendly mediation offered by the King of Great Britain, on the occasion of the difficulties which have arisen with regard to the execution of the treaty of the 4th July with the United States of America. Your Majesty has also displayed the justice and good faith of your policy, and expressed your desire of seeing these differences terminated in a manner honourable to two great nations. An important document recently published leads to a hope that this desire will be speedily realised."
