Whereas it has been found by experience that total abstinence from the use of all kinds of intoxicating liquors, as a drink, is not only safe but salutary, and as this is the only course that it can be rationally expected that intemperate persons will be permanently reformed, and as the example and moral influence of the temperate are the grand means of leading the intemperate to adopt and pursue a course so essential to their present and future good; therefore

Resolved, That this Society recommends the signing of a pledge, by such as are disposed, prohibiting the use of all kinds of intoxicating liquors, as a beverage; and the more generally this principle is adopted by every class in the community, and especially by all members of Temperance Societies, the more speedily and completely will be the triumph of the Temperance cause.

Resolved, That this Society will co-operate with the Provincial Society, established at Saint John, in adopting all proper and suitable measures for the advancement of the Temperance cause throughout the Province; and would recommend the formation of the several Temperance Societies in each County in the Province into one body, for the accomplishment of that object.

Resolved, That this Society respectfully solicits all the Societies in the county, which have not been united with this body, to join the same as soon as convenient.

Resolved, That the several Temperance Societies in the County are requested to hold a simultaneous meeting, in their respective districts, on the 26th February, agreeably to a resolution of this Society passed at its meeting in September last.
