We have been kindly favoured with a Grenada Paper of the 1st inst. from which we have copied a very gratifying account of the capture, by H. M. S. Vestal, within the short period of nine days, of three Slave Vessels—having on board 1256 Africans. The Phoenix, which was one of them, arrived here on Thursday, with Despatches to Vice Admiral Sir Peter Halkett, and on Saturday morning sailed for Sierra Leone, where a Court of Admiralty we understand, is established, the jurisdiction of which particularly extends to captured Vessels of her description. It is a melancholy reflection, that after the noble example set by England and the immense sacrifice made by her in abolishing Slavery throughout her West India Dependencies, in devoting a portion of her maritime force in checking it, and in exerting her influence with other Nations towards more fully accomplishing the object, that the cruel and horrid traffic shall still, extensively, we fear, be carried on, and that Spain and Portugal should still protect the vile wretches engaged in it from any other retributive justice and punishment than the loss of property.—Hal. Roy. Gazette.

ANOTHER FIRE.—The cry of fire again resounded throughout the city of Quebec last night, occasioned by Mr. Buteau's large stone house, at the corner of St. James Street and Arthur Street, leading to the Exchange, being discovered on fire in the upper part, occupied by Mrs. Widow Leighton as a private boarding house. The fire raged with great fierceness, and shortly consumed the building, with that adjoining, also the property of Mr. Buteau, and that occupied by Mr. Dean, of the firm of Rodger, Dean & Co., whose office was in the lower part of the same house. Fears were for some time entertained for the safety of the two large brick houses belonging to Mr. Henry Atkinson, opposite those burnt, but, although considerably scorched, they were saved by the splendid engines of the Alliance Office and the Royal Artillery. The wind was very strong at the time, but fortunately from the eastward, so that the flames were carried in a direction opposite to the wooden stores in the neighbourhood, filled with merchandise of all descriptions. The stores to the north were saved by the exertions of the axemen, who succeeded in removing a large wooden shed in the rear of the house where the fire commenced. The Assurance Offices are the greatest losers by this fire. Mr. Buteau had £1200 insured on his houses at the Quebec Office; Mrs. Leighton, £300 at the Alliance; Messrs. Tremain and Moir, £450 on merchandise in the house; the lower part of which they occupied as an office, and £1300 on goods in the rear store, all in the Quebec Office; Mr. Dean had £500 on his furniture, and the firm, Rodger, Dean & Co. a further sum on goods, likewise at the Quebec office. None of the goods of Messrs. Tremain & Moir were burnt; they were however considerably damaged by removal. This fire was on the whole better managed than is usual, but the best service was rendered by the engines of the Ordnance and Commissariat Departments. The want of well organized fire companies was however felt on this as on similar occasions, and we understand that the Alliance Company are about immediately to organize a company, to work their engine, with a number of hook and laddersmen, water carriers and all necessary attendants, to give full effect to the fine engine belonging to the Company. A volunteer company is also proposed to be formed, under the sanction of the members of the Board of Trade, who will supply them with a first rate engine to be entirely managed by volunteers. The recent frequent occurrence of these calamities, have rendered the formation of such companies absolutely necessary for the protection of the property and lives of the citizens.—Quebec Mercury, Thursday.

(CIRCULAR.) A MAIL ROBBERY! General Post Office, Quebec, 13th October, 1836. Sir, The Mail from Quebec to Halifax was feloniously carried off from the Mail Cart, on Tuesday evening last, the 11th instant, whilst the Carrier was changing horses at Saint Ignace, about 15 leagues below Quebec. The Portmanteau was found the following morning in a wood, cut open and empty. This Mail contained a considerable amount of Money, in Bank Paper, principally of the Bank of Montreal, in notes of 20, 10 and 5 dollars each. There were also two notes, one of the Halifax Banking Company, of £5, numbered 1893, and dated 1st July 1826, and the other of the Bank of Nova Scotia for £5, dated 2d June 1834, Letter A, number 2939. I have offered a Reward of 200 Dollars for the discovery of the Author or Authors of this Robbery.
