

general invitation to the inhabitants, to meet them at the Mill, and such as attended early in the afternoon, had the satisfaction of seeing her make a trial of her abilities, which was quite satisfactory; and there is every reason to expect, that after a little rectifying, necessary at all times in the erection of new machinery, she will perform her work in such a manner, as will meet the wishes of her spirited and enterprising owners. At six in the evening, a most substantial repast was served up, of which upwards of three hundred persons partook; and although we cannot speak of the "feast of reason," or the "flow of soul," we can positively assert, that there was something more substantial, in the shape of mutton, veal, ham, beef, cheese, bread, &c.; and as to the flow, it was most copious, consisting of wine, (red and white,) brandy, ale, porter, &c.; and it is not to be wondered at, that with such good fare, the company should be well pleased with the liberal donors; and that the greatest good humour and harmony should prevail. A number of appropriate toasts were drunk and sentiments delivered, and the company broke up as the shades of evening closed in, giving three cheers to the success of the enterprise, the workmen cheering Messrs. Frost and Petrie, the architects, and thus conveying them to their dwellings.

On the following morning, the poor people were requested to attend at the Mill, when the fragments of the feast were distributed among them.

We wish every success may attend those undertakings, as they must add considerably to the extension of our trade, and consequently to the prosperity of the place.—*Miramichi Gleaner.*

ARREST OF DEMPSEY THE MURDERER.—A correspondent has politely sent us the following extract from the Providence Journal, of the 2nd July, by which it will be seen that, the above named criminal was arrested while at work on the Providence and Stonington Railroad.

Too much praise cannot be given to Mr. Kollock, for his unwearied exertions to detect this offender, as well as to the Authorities at Providence and Boston, for the ready and efficient aid they rendered him in effecting the object of his mission, which we are happy to perceive has been crowned with such success. It will serve also as a useful warning: the opinion has been too prevalent, that if an offender succeeded in reaching the United States, he was secure, as the Authorities of the British Provinces would not seek for him beyond the lines, their power to arrest ceasing on arriving there. This state of things is now happily passed away, and the violator of the laws of God and man will find, that flee wherever he will, the avenger is at his heels, and it is useless striving to elude him.

Dempsey arrived here on Saturday, and was conveyed on the following day to Bathurst, where he will be confined in the country jail to await his trial.

"Yesterday, a man by the name of Timothy Dempsey, was arrested upon suspicion of having committed a murder in the parish of Beresford, county of Gloucester, Province of New Brunswick, by Shepherd F. Kollock, the officer sent from New Brunswick for the purpose, assisted by Constables Coolidge and Clapp, of Boston, and Potter of this City. Dempsey, by the most unwearied exertions, was traced to this City in the vicinity of which he was laboring on the Providence and Stonington Railroad. The officers felt under great obligations to the Messrs. Turners, and other gentlemen of this city, for their prompt assistance in arresting the prisoner. The person murdered, was a young man of the name of Patrick Pearl, an Irishman, and a countryman of Dempsey. The murder grew out of a difficulty about the ownership of a tract of land on which they both resided. The circumstances are briefly as follows: Dempsey was attempting to destroy a fence constituting the division line as determined by the government surveyor; and was impeded by Pearl, who was thereupon seized by the wife and daughter of the prisoner, both of whom are now in prison in New Brunswick. Dempsey immediately struck the deceased in the side with the handle of an axe, and then with the edge below the left breast, which caused immediate death.

These facts were proved, we understand before the coroner's inquest. Dempsey was lodged in jail in this city last night and will be taken to Boston this day by the railroad, on his way to New Brunswick, where he will be tried for the alleged murder."—*Ibid.*

—Pictou, July 11.

Arrived, H. M. S. Champion, Commander Fair, only two days from the Magdalen Islands, where she left the Galbare, (surveying vessel,) Captain Bayfield. All was quiet and well at the Magdalenes—not a single American fishing vessel there, nor was there the smallest complaint in intimidation of any affair having taken place between the American Fishermen and those of the Island of Cape Breton. Since the Champion's last appearance in Pictou, she has cruised along the shores of Nova Scotia, Canada and Labrador Coast—visited our Fishing Establishments at Bay Chaleur, Gaspe, Perce, &c. On the coast of Labrador, from Mount Joli, as far westward as the Bay of Seven Islands, visiting the several settlements and establishments along the coast, including those of Mingan, St. John and the Seven Islands; she left the latter port on the 30th June, and Natsaquin, near Mount Joli, on the 31st inst.—affording countenance and support to our various settlements along this extensive line of tour, and medical assistance and advice to many that stood much in need of it, in the remote parts, which the Champion visited.

The settlers and inhabitants (British subjects) were delighted to see the British Flag, and would often talk of the old country, and give vent to warm expressions of love

and loyalty. No American fishing vessels had been seen on the coast of Labrador this year, nor indeed had they interfered with our Fisheries any where along our shores. In the spring they visited the shores of the Magdalen Islands, in the exercise of a right, though probably against our interests; nevertheless, as they have by Treaty the right, we have no cause, no just cause to complain of them.

The Champion's presence has, we have no doubt, given to the American Schooners a more northerly and easterly direction—and secured to our own Fishermen the privilege, if they have only the industry to profit by it.

We are happy in being able to state, that the shipping and trade of this port, up to the 1st inst. exhibit a very large increase over the corresponding period of last year.—*Pictou Bee.*
