

us to convey with mathematical precision the opinion of our Exchange. Several merchants, says the *Havre Journal*, having asked the Insurance Companies to name a premium against a war with America, the Insurers named three per cent; this premium appearing too high for the chances of war, as calculated by the merchants, very little was done at the rates named by the Insurers.

The London Times has a letter from Paris of Nov 17, which says—"It is not to be doubted that France is making decisive preparations for a positive rupture with the United States. An imposing fleet will soon assemble in the Mediterranean, and Admiral Rousin is recalled from his embassy at Constantinople, to take command of it. It is still hoped the Message to the next Congress will contain some civil expressions towards France which may authorize the payment of the indemnity. This, however, may depend upon the dispatches sent by Mr. Barton, by the packet of Nov 1, which communicated the result of an interview with M. de Broglie, that the conditions of Valaze's amendment must be complied with—and the positive declarations of the Ministers that France would consider an act of nonintercourse as tantamount to a declaration of war. Hence this interview may be deemed of a hostile character, and even if the President should have intended to say civil things in his message, this message, if received in time, may cause him to expunge it."

PARIS, Nov 22.—By way of precaution, in case of a possible rupture with the U. States, our naval stations are to be reinforced. Rear Admiral Makau, appointed Governor of Martinique in place of Admiral Halgates, will command the land and sea forces in the Antille; three ships of the line and as many frigates will be added to our squadrons in those seas.

The London Morning Herald of Nov 19th, contains a letter from a correspondent at Paris, which says—"The American question is, I may say, in train of satisfactory adjustment. The British Government has offered its mediation between France and the United States. It has been accepted by the cabinet of the Tuilleries, which even goes so far as to offer to lodge the money in the Bank of England or in the British Treasury. Mr. Barton will not quit until December 1; but his going or staying, although connected with the question, cannot influence it in the slightest degree."

The steamer James Watt, arrived at Portsmouth, Eng. Nov 17, from Corunna, the 12th, where she landed 15,000 stand of arms and ammunition for the Queen's newly raised troops.

The London papers of Nov 21st, contain many speculations regarding the affairs between the United States and France, but are generally of opinion that war will not result from the present difficulties.

Second Edition.—Boston, Jan. 2. We have received the New York *Courier and Enquirer* of yesterday morning. As is customary on New Year's day, no afternoon papers were printed. The papers contain the Congressional proceedings of Wednesday, and late accounts from Europe by the *Geo. Washington*, but nothing important.

Our Pilot Boat came up last evening having boarded the packet ship George Washington off the coast. She sailed from Liverpool on the 25th November. She will not come in until to-day, as ten per cent. of duties on certain articles are taken off to-day. The Editor of the New York Daily Advertiser, are placed in possession of Liverpool papers to the 24th, together with the latest Price Currents, Shipping Lists &c.

Our dates are two days later from Paris, viz: to the 23d Nov. and all parts of the Continent. There is nothing more of importance in relation to American affairs; Mr. Barton had not left France. The following absurd article we copy from the Morning Herald.

The Temps announce an important fact, if it be not contradicted viz:—a secret treaty of alliance between the United States and Russia, the object of which is to take all chance for the future. The intelligence conveyed in such vague terms is scarcely susceptible of discussion, we are well aware that the two Governments, notwithstanding the difference of their principles, have a certain number of common interests, which have frequently given rise to commercial treaties, some of which are of very recent date. As long as England remains mistress of Canada, and menaces the frontiers of the United States, the natural ally of the Americans will be the Emperor of Russia, who has the same cause for dread for his Asiatic possessions.

The Paris paper of Sunday, and the Messenger, Gazette de France and Journal de Paris, dated yesterday, 23d, together with letters from our correspondent in Constantinople, Madrid, Bayonne, and Paris, have arrived to us by express.

After a variety of resolutions taken on the subject, the French Chambers are convoked (by an ordinance published in the *Moniteur*, of Sunday last) for the 29th December. This determination—which anticipates by a fortnight the period fixed very recently for their convocation—was considered in Paris to have been produced by the rather unpleasant view forced on the French Government of its alliance with Russia, by the growing importance of events in Spain, and, above all by the serious aspect of the American Indemnity question.

MR. ROEBUCK'S DUEL.—We have received an account of a duel which took place on Thursday, between Mr. Roebuck, M. P. for Bath, and John Black, Esq. of the Strand. The duel occurred at Muddiford, near Christ Church, and ended by the exchange of one shot each, happily without injury to either party, but also without accommodation. The cause of the quarrel was the use of some very offensive words applied by Mr. Roebuck, in one of his pamphlets, to Mr. Black. Mr. Roebuck was attended to the ground by Mr. Revan, and Black by Mr. McGilivray.

We have the gratification to announce, that Sir Francis Head, the Assistant Commissioner of Poor Laws, has been appointed Governor of Upper Canada, and that this appointment has been highly approved by His Majesty. Sir Francis will sail in the course of a week.—He sent his resignation as a poor Law Commissioner on Saturday, and we believe that his successor has already been determined on. The County of Kent will regret the loss of the services of Sir F. Head.—[Morning Chronicle, November 24.]

LONDON, November, 23. MONEY MARKET.—The languor in the Stock Exchange to-day has exceeded even that which has been its general characteristic of late. At the middle of the day, not a bargain had been made for the account in Consols, and no transactions of any importance had taken place for money. The quotations have not shown the slightest variation from those of the close of the market on Saturday.

NEW YORK SUFFERERS.—The meeting at Philadelphia on Friday last, chose a committee of fifty, to prepare and report a memorial to Congress praying the prompt appropriation of \$10,000,000 to the sufferers by the conflagration at New York, and also to call on the Legislature of Pennsylvania, for an appropriation of money for their relief.

A New York paper states that the property of Arthur Tappan & Co. was rescued mainly by the blacks, who rushed into the store after it was hot as an oven. By these means more than \$100,000 worth of goods were removed.

THE LATEST ESTIMATE OF THE LOSS.—It is now estimated that the Commercial loss will be much smaller than was at first supposed. A great many of the merchants were insured on open policies. Take a sample—one merchant was insured for \$60,000, yet he had not over \$10,000 in his store. In consequence of this state of things, it is calculated that insurances will cover the commercial loss to the extent of 75 or 80, or even 90 per cent. All the Insurance Companies but three, the North River, Greenwich and Bowery, are of course bankrupt. The commercial credit of the city therefore will not be so much injured as at first supposed.

STEAM NAVIGATION TO LONDON.—We have been furnished with a copy of the prospectus of an association in London, for establishing the "First Line of Steam Ships to run between London and New York." The capital of the Company is £500,000 in 5000 shares of £100 each.—A letter from London, of the 6th of November says:—"The prospectus has been out only three days, and already 4700 shares (within 250 of the whole) have been applied for in lots of three to ninety shares each."—N. Y. Mercantile.

BRIDGE ACROSS THE FALLS.—It will be recollected that we some time ago stated, that the Bridge Company had fixed upon the site for the intended Bridge, at a short distance below the Falls, crossing immediately into Carleton. We believe this site was adopted as well from the difficulty and expense of erecting a Bridge directly across the Falls, as from a desire on the part of the Directors to locate it at the most convenient place for public accommodation. We now understand that offers have been recently made to erect a wooden suspension Bridge for the sum of £2400—the work to be warranted for ten years. We learn that arrangements are about being made for commencing operations forthwith, and it is expected that the Bridge will be completed next autumn.—*St. John Courier*, Jan. 9.
