

such transfer shall be valid and effect-
tual, notwithstanding there may be any
debt due to the said Bank, from the
person or persons whose Shares may be
seized and sold: Provided also, that the
said Cashier shall, upon the exhibiting
to him of such certified copy of the
execution, be bound to give to such
Sheriff or other officer, a certificate of
the number of Shares in the said Capital
Stock held by the Judgment Debtor
named in such execution; and the
Shares of such Judgment Debtor in the
said Capital Stock, shall be bound by
such execution, only from the time when
such copy of the execution shall be so
left with the Cashier.

XV. And be it enacted, That this
Act shall continue and be in force and
effect for and during the continuance of
the Act to which this is an amendment.

His Majesty's Packet Camden, arrived
at Halifax on Sunday the 24th ultimo, after
a very boisterous passage of 46 days. She
has brought London papers to the 6th, and
Halifax to the 5th March. Such news
of interest as they contain will be found
in the following summary:

LONDON, MARCH 2.

The Irish Municipal Corporation Bill had
been read a second time in the House of
Commons.

The Committee on the Carlow Election
was sitting, but its proceedings were not
made public.

The greatest activity continued to pre-
vail in all the manufacturing Districts of the
Kingdom.

The news from France is without interest.
Spanish affairs remained much the
same as at last advices.

The Princess Sophia has very narrowly
escaped being burnt to death at Kensington
Palace, by her clothes taking fire; early as-
sistance being rendered, she fortunately re-
ceived but trifling injury. Lord Brougham
was said to be fast recovering his health.
Lord Sidmouth has resigned his pension of
£3000 granted for his services as speaker
of the House of Commons. Mr. Marsden,
formerly Secretary of the Admiralty has
given up his retiring pension of £15,000
per annum.

There have been presented to the house
this year 57 petitions for railways, involving
an estimated outlay of upwards of 28 mil-
lions sterling, founded on which 82 bills
have been read a first time: to the petitions
have been affixed names of 36,978 assents,
6,575 dissents, and 7,475 neutrals.

It has been made a standing order of the
House of Commons, that seven clear days
shall intervene between the second reading
of all Railway Bills and the sitting of the
Select Committee upon Railways.

The Grand Orange Committee met in
Dublin on Saturday, Joseph Grier, Esq.,
in the chair. It was agreed in reference to
the King's answer to the address of the
House of Commons—"That the brethren
should be warned against the novel doc-
trine that the mere wish of the Sovereign,
expressed through his ministers in answer
to an address from the House of Commons,
has the force of law, or can restrain the sub-
ject in the legal exercise of constitutional
rights. The Orangemen of Ireland have
the most sincere respect (they say) for the
will of the Sovereign, but the liberty of the
subject they respect more, and will main-
tain; while the British Constitution re-
mains unsubverted they cannot be deprived
of their rights save by the co-operation of
the three branches of the Legislature." Sir
Harcourt Lees has just addressed the
Orangemen to the same effect, in a short
letter.

MARCH 5.—There are now orders in this
country for between 200 and 300,000 tons
of iron for railways; and the iron manufac-
ture has not for a long time been in so pro-
sperous a state. Since the 1st of September
last wrought iron has increased £3 per ton.
The mining districts of the north of Eng-
land are also in a thriving state. Lead,
which for many years bore a ruinously low
price, is now highly remunerative, and in
great demand.

Our accounts from Lisbon state that a
schism had broken out between the Queen
and the Ministry relative to the appoint-
ment of the Husband of Donna Maria, as
Commander in Chief of the army. It is al-
leged that the Minister of War has refused
to sign the appointment, and that the
Queen insists upon it. It was therefore
expected that a change in her advisers would
be the result.

The Russian, Prussian, and Austrian
Governments have issued an imperious
summons to the free Senate of Cracow, call-
ing upon them to dismiss within eight days
the Poles, and all others subject to the three
Powers above named resident in Cracow.
The Senate refused to obey, and bodies of
troops have been marched into the country
to enforce the mandate.

The insurrection of the Circassians against
Russia is prospering beyond all expec-
tation; they have carried the war into the
Russian territory, and taken the im-
portant town of Stavropol. This is a move-
ment of great interest at the present mo-
ment, and will be watched with intense an-
xiety.

The French continue to increase their
naval force. The Archipelago is said to be
its present destination; America no longer
affording a pretext.

NEW HOUSES OF PARLIAMENT.—Mr.
Charles Barry, the author of the design en-
titled to the highest premium, is an archi-
tect well known, as having erected the
Travellers Club House in Pall Mall, and
some tasteful Gothic churches. His design
for the new Houses of Parliament is mag-
nificent. He sweeps away all the present
buildings of the House of Lords and Com-

mons, together with Stephen's Chapel, the
cloisters, the King's entrance, &c. and on
this site, stretching along the Thames, be-
tween Westminster hall and the river
arranges his new buildings. The plan is
regular; the elevation shows a splendid fa-
cade towards the Thames, the principal
feature of which is a most richly decorated
massive tower, 170 feet high, covered with
tracery; the style is highly ornamental, and
of the best period of gothic architecture.
The cost is spoken of as at least a million.

ARREST FOR DEBT.—From returns of
affidavits of debts it appears in two years and
a half 70,000 persons have been arrested in
and about London, the law expenses of
which amount to no less a sum than half a
million.

The arrival of the Abram, another of the
Davis' Straits whalers, has been the source
of much satisfaction, as the state of health
of the crew, as well as of the crews of the
lost ships, a portion of which she had on
board, is so good as to lead to the hope that
the men of the vessels still ice bound will
successfully resist the inclemency of the sea-
son, and that the sacrifice of human life ori-
ginally dreaded will not take place.

The weather throughout this month has
been unusually boisterous, with changeable
winds and dreadful squalls, beyond precedent
in the recollection of the oldest inhabitants.
We have fully participated in the storms you
rejoice to have occurred in the south,—
Scotch paper.

It is supposed that about 200 sail of ships
lost anchors and cables between Yarmouth
and Harwich, and from twenty to thirty
were driven on shore, and lost in the late
heavy gales. So many vessels have not put
into Harwich with loss and damage, at any
one time, for the last seventeen or eighteen
years.

PORTSMOUTH, Feb. 23.—Great dispatch
is used at this dockyard in forwarding the
equipment of the line of battle ships Bel-
leophon and Vanguard, seventy four; but
although many captains are named to com-
mand them, no positive appointment has
yet taken place. The rumour of the Briran-
ia, 120, flag ship at this port, being ordered
to relieve the Caledonia 120, in the Medi-
terranean, is utterly unfounded.—The latter
ship is ordered home to be paid off.

SHEERNESS, Feb. 20.—Various have
been the reports at this Port, as to the ships
that are likely to be fitted out, in conse-
quence of the increase of the Navy; it is,
however certain that the Hercules, 74, and
Asia, 84 guns, will be the two first. We
have at present as demonstration ships of
the line, Camperdown, 104, the Powerful
and Asia, 84 guns each, and the Hercules,
74; frigates, Alfred, 54, and Seringapatam,
48, in a perfect state of residence as to their
fitness when required for sea. The Camper-
down, Powerful, and Hercules are rig-
ged; the Asia ordered to be rigged; and
the Alfred and Seringapatam have their
holds stowed, and spars ready. The Ben-
heim, 74, at this Port, and Howe, at Char-
ham, are to be fitted immediately as demon-
stration ships.

ARMY.—Sir James Lyon, we understand,
has been appointed Commander in Chief of
the Forces in North America. The Rifle
Brigade now in this garrison, are to be re-
lieved by the 85th Light Infantry, which
regiment may be expected here about the
end of next month. The 1st Royals are
under orders for Canada.

The 52d and 81st regts. are to proceed to
Gibraltar.—Halifax Journal.
