The arrival of the Ship *Jean Hastie* at Halifax, in 27 days from Greenock, has furnished us with dates to the 17th ult. from Glasgow.

GLASGOW, March 17.
The Church Rates Abolition Bill has already undergone a discussion of two nights in the House of Commons, and its fate is not yet determined. In our next we shall be able to give the division, which is the only thing we have to do with. In the mean time, the whole of the Episcopalians appear to be roused into action, and the petitions against the Ministerial scheme greatly outnumber those in its favour.

IRISH CORPORATIONS.—It is stated in the Dublin Evening Post, which is well versed in Irish affairs that a compromise has taken place between the leaders in the two Houses of Parliament, by which it is agreed that the Lords will pass an Irish Municipal Corporation Bill, comprising eight largest towns on the plan proposed last year by the Duke of Richmond, upon the condition that the Commons will pass the Irish Church Bill without the appropriation clause.

A motion was made in the House of Commons, says the Times of the 11th, to present an address to His Majesty, petitioning government to lay before the House all Legis-

lative proceedings of the American Congress, and all correspondence, upon the subject of the recognition by our government of the independence of Texas. The House divided on this motion as follows: yeas, 23; nays, 41.

Mr. Hoy, in making the motion about Texas, said it was the standard of slavery that was raised in Texas, and it behoved England to stand by Mexico in such a contest. Lord Palmerston said that the President's Message to Congress on that point was full and satisfactory, and shewed no disposition to violate the neutrality they had preserved. He also suggested that the interests of the North would be a sufficient check against any improper recognition of the independence of Texas. Mr. Ware withdrew an attack he had made against Mr. Forsyth, charging him with the speculating in Texas lands. He had ascertained that it was not a fact, and withdrew it with pleasure. O'Connell denounced the United States on the subject of Slavery.

The Boundary between New Brunswick and Maine had been a subject of discussion in Parliament. Mr. Robinson inquired whether any progress had been made in the settlement of the boundary line? Lord Palmerston said there had not. The question was still the subject of communications between the Governments of the two countries. He believed that both Governments were actuated by an earnest desire to bring the matter to an amicable conclusion, but difficulties had arisen in part out of the different forms of the two Governments, which had delayed the settlement till now.

We understand that the King, when informed of the present distress experienced by the silk manufacturers in Spitalfields, was pleased to direct that a sufficient quantity of silk for fourteen dresses should be immediately completed and forwarded to His Majesty at Windsor Castle.

A numerous meeting of Conservative members was held at Sir Robert Peel's yesterday afternoon, when, we understand, it was unanimously resolved to offer every legitimate opposition to the Chancellor of the Exchequer's plan for the abolition of Church rates.—Standard.

We regret to learn that some of the largest manufacturing houses in Glasgow are restricting their works to a great extent. Several steamloom proprietors have shut up whole flats of their factories in consequence of the depressed state of trade: and it said that one of the largest manufacturing houses in Glasgow has dropped nearly 1000 of their workers.—Glasgow Chronicle, March 13.

The depression in trade is beginning to assume a serious aspect in Paisley, in every department of the manufactures of the town. For the last two weeks the difficulty of obtaining work has been gradually increasing, and to day hundreds of weavers are going about the town, particularly on the Causey side, in quest of work. It is understood that there is a very considerable number idle.—Ibid.

CANADA.—The Times remarks:—As for Lower Canada we care little about it but as a channel for the course of the Saint Lawrence, the Nile of British North America, and the only medium of communication between England and the far more valuable region and more kindred people of the Upper Province.—The French Canadians mean separation, and nothing else, by their turbulence. For themselves alone, they are not worth the keeping; but as the key to Upper Canada, and the medium of intercourse with 600,000 of our own brave emigrated countrymen in that fine country, we must prevent this perverse breed from tormenting us longer by their audacity and extravagance.—One line of an act of Parliament will do it, without the aid of a single man or gun from Great Britain.

There is not a syllable of news worth communicating from the North of Spain. At St. Sebastian and Bayonne matters remained on the 5th as they were on the first day of the month. Lord John Hay, Captain Maitland, Colonel Wylie, and Colonel Wakefield, inspected the right bank of the Bidassoa on the 6th and afterwards proceeded to Bayonne. All is ready for a movement, but it is extremely uncertain when one will take place.

From the *St. Andrews Standard*, April 20.
Just as we were going to press, the signal post telegraphed a ship and barque in the Bay; they proved to be the Joseph Porter, Captain Thompson, from Liverpool, in 27 days, and the Colonist, Capt. Angus M'Master, from Dublin, in 36 days.

Capt. Thompson has favoured us with papers to the 22d March, from which we have hurriedly taken a few leading articles.

We have much pleasure in announcing that the Liverpool Courier speaks confidently of the improved state of the mercantile concerns in that great mart, which gives a tone to the interests of half the globe. On the 21st March, 4000 bags of cotton were taken at an advance, and of that quantity 500 were purchased on speculation.

We sincerely trust that the worst is now over; and that trade will, ere long, resume its wonted vigour and prosperity.

LIVERPOOL, March 22.
In another part of our publication will be found a letter from a highly respectable quarter, in reference to the proposition for applying to government, in the present depressed state of the commerce of the town, for a loan of exchequer bills under similar circumstances to those of 1825. This is a subject of deep and universal interest, and well worthy of serious consideration. We give no opinion as to the necessity of the case; we leave that to those who are more immediately interested, and of course better qualified to judge.

As our correspondent observes, the pressure is wholly of a temporary character; produce, which is the best of wealth, is held in abundance, but, owing to the extraordi-

nary depression of the market, it cannot be rendered available except at prices which would involve a ruinous sacrifice. All that is wanted is a present supply, in order to enable the holders of produce to meet the demands upon them, until confidence shall be so far restored as to hold out the prospects of a profitable market. In the meantime we are happy to state that a deputation from the American interest having been appointed to confer with the Bank of England in London, a satisfactory arrangement was made on Monday last, which is calculated to remove for the present, and we trust permanently, that painful anxiety which has lately prevailed amongst all classes of the commercial community.—Liverpool Courier.

Ministers have gained a majority on the Church rate question which even their most obsequious apologists do not venture to designate as a victory. In a moderately full house 272 divided for the ministerial resolution, and 250 against it—majority 23. Comparing this with the ministerial majority on the last grand trial of strength—the division on the Irish municipal Corporation bill,—and making every allowance for accidental fluctuations of attendance, it is not too much to affirm, that the result is one which, under ordinary circumstances, would have furnished ample ground for resignation.—Ibid.

DEATH OF VISCOUNTS CANNING.—On Friday last, intelligence was received of the death of Lady Canning, widow of the distinguished statesman who for some time represented this borough in Parliament. Lady Canning was the third daughter of Major General John Scott, of Balcombe, in the County of Fife, and sister to the present Duchess of Portland. Her demise, by elevating her son, the Hon. Chas. John Canning, to the peerage, has deprived Liverpool of a candidate, who, it was hoped, would one day have inherited the senatorial honors of his father. The Conservatives have not been idle in looking out for a fitting individual to fill the place thus inopportunistically left vacant. Knowing that, as rumours of an impending dissolution grow into belief, disposable, and at the same time eligible, persons will become more and more scarce, the committee, we have no doubt, will use every exertion to accomplish their object without delay.—Ibid.

Spain.—Official despatches have been received this morning at the Spanish Ambassador's, from the Spanish Consul at Bayonne, dated the 12th inst., confirming in every respect the previous accounts received by the telegraphic despatches of the taking of the whole of the entrenchments of the Carlist lines before San Sebastian, and of the preparations which are making for a further advance for the attack of Hernani. The despatches also state the loss of the Carlists at 900 to 1,000 men, amongst whom were 25 officers killed. They likewise mentioned, that two battalions of Biscay were incorporated into the field of battle with the battalions of Guipuscoa, in order to make them fight. They also confirm the arrival of General Oraa at San Sebastian, with the official communication of the advance of Espartero to Guernica, where he had taken 600 prisoners.—Sun, of Saturday.

SAVE YOUR DOLLARS.—We have just heard that a scheme by which the inhabitants of New Brunswick were to be gulled of their superfluous dollars,—some of our citizens may remember that a few months since they were solicited to subscribe for a book, then in course of publication in the United States, purporting to be a "Biography and History of the North American Indians &c." the subscription price three dollars.—A considerable number of subscribers for that work were obtained in this city, and copies of it delivered to them at the above price. At present the same book may be had of the Booksellers in this city, at half the original charge, viz. seven shillings and six pence—and in Eastport the price of it is one dollar! But notwithstanding this diminution of its price, we learn that three agents for the sale of this foreign book, are now perambulating the Province for the purpose of disposing of it at the full price. It is reported that one of those agents has succeeded in procuring the names of upwards of one hundred persons as subscribers in Sussex and other places between the Vale and this City; the other two agents have gone up the River St. John towards Fredericton, for the same purpose. We deem it our duty to warn the public, and put them upon their guard against this attempt to fleece their pockets.—City Gazette, April 20.
