

To the Freeholders of the County of York.

GENTLEMEN,

THE electioneering contest in our County having now terminated, I feel myself called upon to explain certain circumstances connected with my appearing as a Candidate at the recent election, and to assign my reasons for retiring from the Poll at an early stage of the proceedings.

Very soon after the announcement of the demise of the Crown, I was strongly solicited to offer myself a Candidate for the suffrages of the People. I waived the subject some time, not wishing to interfere with persons who might come forward, whose age, experience and general qualifications would entitle them to such a degree of your confidence and support as I could scarcely expect to receive. After the lapse of a few weeks, those solicitations being repeatedly urged, and my answer required, I stated that it was my determination not to offer, if either W. D. Hartt, Esquire, or two other Gentlemen whom I named, should do so, being fully convinced that were either of those Gentlemen, but particularly Mr. Hartt and myself both to appear as Candidates, we should so far injure each other's interest as to render the prospect of succession to both very doubtful.

I requested a friend to call upon Mr. Hartt, and communicate to him my determination; he did so, and Mr. H. assured him that he would not offer, but advised that I should announce my intention of appearing as a Candidate immediately, and that I might rely upon his influence and support being exerted in my favour. I still declined for about a week, during which time I called upon the two other Gentlemen alluded to, and learned that it was not their intention to offer. I also had three different interviews with Mr. H., and on each occasion said to him that if he had the slightest wish to offer, that I would most willingly abandon my intention of doing so, and render him all the assistance in my power, but he as often declined, and still tendered me his support, assuring me at the same time that he fully acquiesced in the opinion, that were we both to offer it would be impossible for either to succeed.

I then announced my intention of appearing in the capacity before named, and made my arrangements accordingly; after which Mr. Hartt, through the solicitations of his friends, was induced to offer. I felt that he had placed me in a very difficult position; to retire without prosecuting an undertaking after having engaged in it, would be contrary to my general principle of action—to proceed would be to place both him and myself in a situation which I had determined to avoid; the result of which, I still feared, might prove a failure to both. I however resolved to continue a Candidate and abide the result, rather than subject myself to the charge of fickleness or indecision of character. I had scarcely engaged in the contest when a new difficulty occurred: Mrs. Smith's health being so much affected by the sudden relapse of a dangerous disease from which she had just partially recovered, as to induce the most serious apprehension that the result might be fatal, and that probably within a short lapse of time.

Had Mr. Hartt not been a candidate, I should have considered myself bound by the pledge I had given you, to continue the contest, and finding it impossible to attend the Poll in person, should have selected some person to represent me at the several stages throughout the County, or until I could again attend myself; but as Mr. H. had offered, contrary to my expectations and that of my friends generally, I considered myself in some measure relieved from that pledge, and as both the circumstances before mentioned tended to lessen my prospect of success, as well as being fully convinced that were I to continue a candidate, it could scarcely fail to prevent Mr. H. from succeeding, I resolved to retire.

I have most carefully avoided any allusions to the occurrences which took place between Mr. Hartt and myself, as well as the hustings as at all other times, until after the termination of the Election, lest the circumstances should militate against him, being quite willing to make such allowances in favour of that Gentleman, on account of the recent severe contest in which he had been engaged as a Candidate, and believing that he should again come forward, as I could not have made for any other person, or even for him under other circumstances, nor should I now allude to the subject but for the purpose of relieving myself from a seeming inconsistency with which I might otherwise be charged, and of giving a fair explanation of a circumstance which has occasioned considerable remark.

I now thank you, Gentlemen, for the flattering assurances of support received from many of you, which I have no doubt I should have realized had I continued a Candidate, and while I continue to pursue my own avocations, shall avail myself of every opportunity of obtaining such information as will enable me to perform the duties of whatsoever situation I may be placed in through life. I have long felt deeply anxious for the prosperity and welfare of our Province, and am confident that that anxiety cannot be diminished. Should my services at any future time be required as a Representative for the County, or in any other capacity which would tend to promote your interests, they shall be cheerfully devoted; but I trust I shall never be found aspiring to any situation for the mere purpose of gratifying my own inclinations, without a view to the public good, and being competent to discharge the duties connected with the same.

## CENTRAL BANK OF New Brunswick. CASH CREDITS.

THE period having arrived when the Directors of the Central Bank of New Brunswick feel themselves enabled to carry into effect an arrangement which they have long had in contemplation, namely, to establish CASH CREDITS, according to the Scotch System of Banking, so far as that system may be applicable to this Province. Public Notice is hereby given, that the Board of Directors will receive applications for Cash Credits to a limited extent, from responsible persons, from and after Monday the 16th of October instant, under the following regulations, viz.:

1st. The application to be made by Letter addressed to the Cashier, stating the extent of the credit required, the name, addition and residence of the applicant, and the names, additions and residences of two responsible persons to be proposed as sureties. 2d. The security to the Bank will be a Bond with two sufficient Sureties.

3d. The account to be settled at the end of every three months, and the Balance struck.

Six per cent. to be charged upon all sums drawn out, and four per cent. allowed upon all sums returned during that period.

4th. The Contract may be terminated by either party, and all arrears must be paid upon one month's notice being given.

5th. The Sureties, or either of them, on application to the Board, and on sufficient cause being shown, shall be permitted to inspect the account of the party for which he or they may be bound, and such surety or sureties may, if they see fit, terminate the Contract, on settling the account and paying up all arrears.

6th. No fractional part of a pound will be paid or received under the Cash Credit.

7th. The foregoing Rules may at any time be altered, amended, modified or repealed by the Board of Directors.
