GENERAL THANKSGIVING.—A Proclamation in Yesterday's Gazette, calls upon the People of Nova Scotia to observe Thursday, the 23d day of November, as a public day of General Thanksgiving to Almighty God, for saving us from Pestilence during the past year, and vouchsafing us the great blessings of abundant Harvests.—*Journal*.

CHARLOTTE TOWN, P. E. I. Oct. 21. A beautiful piece of sculpture, from the chisel of the celebrated Chantry, was erected yesterday in St. Paul's Church, at the North side of the altar, in commemoration of our deceased Lieutenant Governor, the late Sir ALETAS WILLIAM YOUNG. This memorial, intended to convey to posterity the remembrance of his worth as a man, and of his gallantry as a soldier, independently of its attractions as a work of art, will be viewed with peculiar interest, as being the joint recognition of his virtues and affection, by his afflicted widow and children. The devices, which are admirably executed in basso relievo, consist of a head of the deceased—a striking likeness—a sword and wreath, and his crest. The tablet is of white marble. The following is the inscription:—

Sacred to the memory of
LT. COL. SIR ALETAS WILLIAM YOUNG, KNT.
He served in Ireland as a Captain in the 15th Regt. of Infantry, during the Rebellion of 1793.
In Egypt he fought in the ever memorable Actions of the 8th, 15th, and 21st March, 1801.
He afterwards served in the Mediterranean, Spain, Portugal and the West Indies, and was engaged in the Battles of Vimeira, the Douro, Talavera, Basaco, Sobral, and Redinha.
And was present at the siege of Badajoz, the taking of Olivenza, and the capture of Guadalupé.
After a long and painful illness, which he bore with Christian fortitude and resignation,
he closed his earthly career as
Lieut. Governor of Prince Edward Island, on the 1st of Dec. 1835, aged 58 years.
His gallant conduct as a Soldier, his fearless integrity as a Civil Ruler, and his mild and amiable character as a husband, a father, and a friend,
insure him the respect and esteem of all who knew him.
The remembrance of his virtues and his affection is fondly cherished by his afflicted Widow and Children,
who have caused this Tablet to be erected.

NEWFOUNDLAND.—Last evening Captain Meagher politely handed us the Newfoundland Public Ledger of the 20th, and the Patriot of the 23th of October. By these papers we perceive the House of Assembly and Council of that Island, are as usual, at loggerheads.
A writ has been served on Messrs. Morris, Kent, and Nugent, Members of the Assembly, for an alleged libel on the character of Judge Boulton, contained in speeches made by those gentlemen in the House.—*Miramichi Gleaner*, Nov. 7.

Mr. BUCKINGHAM, late Member of the British Parliament, Sheffield, and author of several published works on the actual state and condition of the Oriental World, derived from personal Travels of several years' duration in Asia and Africa, has just arrived in New-York from England, where he is now delivering Lectures, in the words of his own advertisement, "descriptive of the Geography, Scenery, Productions, ancient Monuments, and existing Cities of those sacred and classical Regions of the Earth, in which the scenes and events of Scriptural History and Prophecy are laid, from the earliest dawn of authentic record to the close of the Gospel, and from thence to the present day."—In Mr. Buckingham's recent farwell address to the British people, previous to setting out on his tour of the world, which we published a few weeks ago, he stated his intention of visiting the British North American Colonies, among which he named New-Brunswick. We may therefore hope to enjoy the high pleasure of hearing Mr. B's Lectures on PALESTINE, and other Eastern Countries, which have been so highly praised in all parts of the United Kingdom, where they have been heard by a million of persons.—*Saint John Observer*.
