The readiness and good will exhibited by the Regiment, whenever and wherever its services could be useful, to the Inhabitants of the Town, have called forth our gratitude, and the disposition always shown by the Officers to cultivate good will and kindly intercourse, has created in us warm feelings of regard; and many among us who have had opportunities of cultivating their friendship, lament the loss of friends whom they have learned to value.

You depart at a most severe season, upon a duty the most disagreeable a Soldier can have to discharge; but, while we regret that our Friends are called from us on so trying a service, we cannot but rejoice that a Regiment so distinguished will be among the Defenders of British Rule, and the Supporters of those Inhabitants of Lower Canada, who amidst treason and rebellion, stand firm and true to their Queen and Country.

Be assured Sir, that you leave in New Brunswick a people devoted to the Government and Constitution, under which it is their happiness to live. Many among them are descended from those who preferred a Wilderness and their Loyalty to plenty under Foreign Dominion. They remember and are proud of the Deeds of their Ancestors. Many again are Emigrants from the Mother Country, who know and feel that Country's greatness, and all are united in one common sentiment of attachment to the British Empire. We embrace this opportunity of expressing these our feelings, that you, your Officers and your Men, may communicate them to the various classes of the population of Canada. The rebellious and disaffected will look in vain for a kindred feeling among the Inhabitants of New Brunswick, whose services when required, will always be at the disposal of their Sovereign.

Our best wishes and warmest esteem attend you, and much shall we rejoice to hear of the termination of your arduous march, and that success has once more crowned your exertions.

To this Address Lieutenant Colonel Booth replied as follows:—

Fredericton, Dec. 2, 1837.

Sir—In my own name, and in that of the Officers, non-commissioned Officers, and Soldiers of the 43d Light Infantry, I beg to express our most grateful sense of the compliment conveyed to the Regiment at large in the very flattering and friendly address of the Clergy, Magistrates, and Inhabitants of Fredericton.

We receive with pride your assurance of satisfaction with the conduct of the corps during its stay in this truly peaceful and loyal Province.

We warmly and sincerely reciprocate the feelings of esteem and good will expressed towards the Officers, and were it allowable for a Soldier to regret the exchange of a life of ease and social intercourse for one of action and enterprise, the occasion of our departure from Fredericton and its kindly society for the scene of the present unfortunate disturbances, might well excuse the entertainment of such a sentiment.

We most cordially join in your deprecation of the rebellious movements of Her Majesty's subjects in Lower Canada, and, stimulated by your loyal declarations of sympathy with the cause which our arms are called to support, we shall encounter with cheerfulness the difficulties that may lie in our path.

Be assured, Sir, that whatever may be the destination of the 43d Light Infantry, we shall be cheered by the reflection, that friendly eyes and wishes are following our career; that we shall always look back with grateful recollections to our sojourn in your Town; and that we depart with lively feelings of interest in the welfare and prosperity of the Province of New Brunswick, and of the inhabitants of Fredericton in particular.
