### PUBLIC NOTICE.

The following Regulations respecting the  
purchase of Crown Lands in this Province, re-  
ceived by the last Mail from England, are, by  
order of His Majesty's Government, to be  
strictly pursued.

"From and after the first day of June next,  
Purchasers of Land belonging to the Crown  
will be required to pay down at the time of  
Sale ten per cent on the whole value of the  
purchase; and the remainder within fourteen  
days from the day of Sale: and until the  
whole price is paid, the Purchaser will not be  
put in possession of the Land. In the event  
of Payment not being made within the pre-  
scribed period, the sale will be considered  
void, and the deposit be forfeited."

## IN THE YORK GENERAL SESSIONS, January Term, 1837. FERRY REGULATIONS.

BE it ordered, That all the existing Re-  
gulations relating to Ferries in the  
County of York be rescinded, and the fol-  
lowing be substituted in lieu thereof:

I. There shall be the following Ferries es-  
tablished in the County of York, namely:

No. 1. The Ferry at the lower end of the  
County across the River Saint John, com-  
monly called the short Ferry, of which Tho-  
mas Peppers to be the Ferryman.

No. 2. The Ferry from the lower end of  
the Town of Fredericton, across the River  
Saint John to either side of the River Nash-  
waak, of which Guy C. Jouett to be the  
Ferryman.

No. 3. The Ferry across the mouth or the  
River Nashwaak, of which Guy C. Jouett  
to be the Ferryman.

No. 4. The Ferry across the River Saint  
John from the public wharf at Phoenix  
Square in Fredericton to the opposite side  
in Saint Mary's, of which — to be the  
Ferryman.

No. 5. The Ferry from the upper Land-  
ing in Fredericton to the Nashwaaksis in  
Douglas, of which — to be the Ferryman.

No. 6. The Ferry across the River Saint  
John from Brewer's to Crook's Point, of  
which John Brewer to be the Ferryman.

No. 7. The Ferry across the River Saint  
John on the Great Road at Burgoyne's, of  
which Joseph Burgoyne and Duell Muzzeroil  
to be the Ferryman.

No. 8. The Ferry across the River Nash-  
waak on the Great Road at M'Leod's, of  
which William M'Leod to be the Ferryman.

No. 9. Peterson's Ferry across the Nash-  
waak leading to the Pennyock, of which John  
Peterson to be the Ferryman.

II. All Ferryman now appointed or here-  
after to be appointed, shall take out a Li-  
cence therefor, under the seal of this Court,  
signed by the Clerk, before they act in such  
capacity, and any Ferryman acting without  
such Licence (servants and assistants of Li-  
cenced Ferryman excepted), and any un-  
licenced person who shall within one mile of  
a Licenced Ferry receive pay or compensa-  
tion for Ferrying, shall incur a penalty as  
hereinafter provided.

III. That each Licenced Ferryman shall  
at all times keep a sufficient number of good,  
sufficient, and safe Boats and Scows, clean  
and in good order, properly floored, for the  
conveyance of Passengers, Horses, Carri-  
ages, Teams loaded and unloaded, Cattle,  
&c. &c.

IV. That each licenced Ferryman shall  
always provide himself with a printed copy  
of the Regulations and Fares, and shall ex-  
hibit and shew the same to any passenger  
who may require it.

V. That the most prompt attention shall  
at all times be shown to the Ferriage of Pas-  
sengers; and for any unnecessary or unrea-  
sonable detention the Ferryman shall incur  
a penalty, unless he can shew to the satisfac-  
tion of the Magistrate before whom com-  
plaint shall be made, that such detention was  
unavoidable.

VI. That the Ferries across the River  
Saint John, opposite the Town of Frederi-  
ceton, herebefore designated as Numbers  
2, 4 and 5, shall be kept constantly plying,  
crossing at least once every half hour, and  
offener if Passengers require it; and no  
Boat or Scow shall after having left the  
shore with passengers, return back again  
for others without the consent of all the pas-  
sengers in the Boat.

VII. That in case of any vacancy occur-  
ing by the death or removal of any licenced  
Ferryman, such vacancy may be filled up  
and a new licence granted at any Special  
Session of the Peace.

VIII. That each licenced Ferryman is  
hereby distinctly made liable and answer-  
able for the negligence, misconduct or omis-  
sion of his assistants and servants employed  
in and about such Ferry, and shall be liable  
to all the pains, penalties and forfeitures in-  
curred by them.

IX. That the established hours of Ferri-  
age during the season, be from sunrise till  
10 o'clock at night, but every Ferryman  
shall ferry passengers when required at all  
times of night, receiving double fare there-  
for.

X. That each and every breach of or offence  
against these Regulations, or of any one of  
them, or for demanding or receiving a greater  
rate of fare or ferriage than is herein al-  
lowed, the party offending or licenced Ferryman  
shall forfeit and pay a sum not exceeding  
five pounds nor less than five shillings, upon  
complaint made and duly proved before any  
one of His Majesty's Justices of the Peace  
for the County of York, and levied and ap-  
plied as the Law directs.

XI. That the following fares, and no  
greater, be allowed for Ferrying, viz:

For every foot passenger, fourpence;  
For every child under 12 years, twopence;  
Horses, Oxen, Cows, and of their kind,  
over one year old, including the person in  
charge, eightpence;  
Colt, Calf, Sheep or Hog, including the  
person in charge, sixpence;

Four wheeled Carriage or Waggon, with  
two Horses or Oxen and driver, one shil-  
ling and sixpence;

Four wheeled Carriage or Waggon, with  
one Horse and driver, one shilling;

Two wheeled Cart or Carriage, with two  
Horses or Oxen and driver, one shilling and  
sixpence;

Two wheeled Cart or Carriage with one  
Horse and driver, one shilling;

For all loads of Hay, Straw or Firewood  
drawn by two horses, one shilling;

For ditto drawn by one horse, sixpence;  
For all loads of other articles drawn by  
two horses or oxen, eightpence;

For ditto drawn by one horse, fourpence.

Half of the above rate of fares to be al-  
lowed for the Ferries herebefore designa-  
ted as Nos. 3, 8 and 9.

And it is further ordered, That a suffi-  
cient Scow to pass at least a double waggon  
and two pair of horses at a time—to be tight  
with a drop at each end—floored and a Bar  
of Iron to run through eyes about a foot  
above the gunwale—to be provided by the  
Ferryman at Burgoyne's Ferry.
