On Saturday last, a Deputation from the Counties of York, Sunbury and Carleton, waited upon His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, at Government House, when Lieutenant Colonel Allen presented the following Address:—

To His Excellency Major General Sir JOHN HARVEY, K. C. H. and C. B. Lieutenant Governor and Commander in Chief of the Province of New Brunswick, &c. &c. &c.

The Humble Address of the undersigned Inhabitants of the Counties of York, Sunbury and Carleton.

May it Please Your Excellency,

We, Her Majesty's dutiful and loyal subjects inhabitants of the Counties of York, Sunbury and Carleton, in Her Majesty's Province of New Brunswick, beg leave to express to Your Excellency our deep and sincere regret at the demise of our late most Gracious Sovereign, King William the Fourth, of Blessed Memory—a Sovereign justly endeared to all his subjects, and whose memory will be long and affectionately cherished by the inhabitants of this Province in particular.

We at the same time beg to unite most cordially with Your Excellency, in our congratulations on the accession of Her most Gracious Majesty Queen Victoria to the throne of her Ancestors; to whose person and government we feel the most ardent attachment. And we assure Your Excellency, as Her Representative, of our firm and undeviating determination to support Her Majesty, the Constitution, and those enlightened principles of government in which the Province of New Brunswick has largely participated.

We are well aware of the difficulties which beset Your Excellency in assuming the government of this Province, at a very important period in its history. And we deeply lament that the course pursued by a majority of Your Excellency's official advisers, should have been such as to have justly deprived them of the confidence and support of the Country, and to have embarrassed your Excellency's government.

But we entertain an unshaken hope, that Your Excellency will continue heartily to discharge the high and important duties devolving upon you, with that firmness which has hitherto characterized Your Excellency's administration. And we hail with heartfelt satisfaction the long wished for addition which Your Excellency has recently made to the Executive Council; a body which, when properly constituted, will doubtless cordially unite with Your Excellency in developing the resources and promoting the peace and prosperity of this rising and valuable appendage to the British Empire.

To which His Excellency was pleased to make the following most gratifying reply:—

Gentlemen,

I deeply participate in the regret which you have expressed on the demise of our late most Gracious Sovereign, whose memory it is very gratifying to me to believe, will be long and affectionately cherished by the people of this Province. The Sceptre of His mild and paternal way has passed into other hands, but the spirit of that way will not be changed.

I thank you on the part of our Most Gracious Queen for your loyal expressions of ardent attachment to Her Majesty's Person and Government; and, as Her Majesty's Representative in this Province, I venture

in Her name, confidently to promise to its inhabitants in return for their willing and devoted allegiance, every blessing which our inestimable Constitution, administered in the spirit of a just, impartial and enlightened regard for the best interests of the Empire, is capable of dispensing.

I came amongst you fully impressed with the arduous nature of the duties which my office imposed upon me, at the particular crisis of public affairs, at which my administration commenced; free from all local prejudices, and actuated by no other motive than an anxious desire to promote the public welfare, I have not shrunk from the adoption of such measures as appeared to me, upon mature consideration, best calculated to effect that great object; and I beg you to believe that I derive a high degree of satisfaction and encouragement from the declaration which you have been pleased now to make to me of your approbation of the line of conduct which I have deemed it my duty to pursue.

LONDON, August 2.

The following letter from Lord John Russell to Lord Mulgrave, published, with a view to influence the Irish elections, is certainly the best and boldest announcement of policy, in one branch of administration, that has been issued since the new reign began.

WHITEHALL, 18th July.
“My Lord—I am confiding again to your Excellency the important charge of administering the affairs of Ireland in her Majesty's name, the Queen has commanded me to express to your Excellency Her Majesty's entire approbation of your past conduct, and her desire that you should continue to be guided by the same principles on which you have hitherto acted.”

“The Queen willingly recognizes in her Irish subjects a spirit of loyalty and devotion towards her person and Government.”

“Her Majesty is desirous to see them in the full enjoyment of that civil and political equality to which, by recent statute, they are fully entitled; and her Majesty is persuaded, that when invidious distinctions are altogether obliterated, her throne will be still more secure, and her people more truly united.”

“The Queen has seen with satisfaction the tranquility which has lately prevailed in Ireland; and has learned with pleasure that the general habits of the people are in a state of progressive improvement, arising from their confidence in the just administration of the powers of Government.”

“I am commanded to express to you her Majesty's cordial wishes for the continued success of your administration; and your Excellency may be assured that your efforts will meet with firm support from her Majesty.”

“The Queen further desires, that you will assure her Irish subjects of her impartial protection.”

The number of the Ladies in Waiting is now completed by the appointment of the Countess of Darham. We hear that the honor has been conferred in a manner peculiarly gracious and gratifying.—*Morning Chronicle.*

HANOVER.—The accounts from Hanover, since the event which has given to that crown a separate existence, have not from the details which they gave of the ascent to the throne of the present possessor, been hitherto without interest; but from the papers last received, they now assume a very considerable political importance. His Majesty appears to have taken the first steps in his reign by publicly disclaiming and refusing assent to the existing constitution of the kingdom of Hanover, which it will be recollected, was not very long since presented to that kingdom by his late Majesty William IV. The King states that he cannot perceive “either in the form or substance” anything in that political organization to hand him or his successors to its adoption; but, on the contrary, much in it of which he disapproves; “as in many points not corresponding with his wishes, which are solely directed to the promotion of the good of his faithful subjects;” and not affording guarantees for the permanence of the prosperity of his faithful subjects;” and that he, will therefore, shortly, but not hastily, or inconsiderately, announce the modifications which he proposes in it. Till, however, further changes are announced, his Majesty requires that the state continue to be governed by the existing laws. The new constitution is to be communicated to the “State,” (the legislative body) after it has been resolved by the King, and it will be their duty to register, not discuss, the terms of it.

Boston, Sept. 6.
The ship Exchange, Capt. Atkins, arrived at this port last evening from Liverpool, whence she sailed on the 6th of August.—We have London dates of the 5th.

The Tories had carried the election in Midsex, and defeated Mr. Hume by a majority of 269. The conservative papers are in high glee at the event.—So far as the elections had proceeded in the kingdom, the London Morning Herald states that ministers had not gained ground.

The money market in London continued easy. U. S. Bank Post notes are quoted at 95.

The advices from Paris are to the 3d. There is no intelligence of any interest.

A most horrid and devastating calamity has overtaken the residents of Sierra Leone. The mortality by yellow fever among the Europeans was dreadful. It was calculated that 40,000 persons had been attacked with it, and its ravages were more frightful than on any former occasion.

The Liverpool Chronicle announces the arrival of the Packet ship England on the 5th, and is happy to state that she brought half a million of dollars to the various houses in Liverpool. The Chronicle says that matters were an improving appearance in this country.
