

Canadian Subjects, and to preserve peace and good government in this Province:—

And whereas upon the occasions aforesaid, representations have knowingly been made entirely devoid of truth, for the purpose of inducing His Majesty's subjects to swerve from their allegiance, and of producing a belief that the Parliament of the United Kingdom has violated or intends to violate the just rights and privileges of His Majesty's subjects in this Province, and is about to adopt oppressive measures towards them:

Being desirous of undeceiving such as may unwarily have been led to rely upon such untrue and mischievous representations, it has become my duty as the Representative of His Majesty, to address myself most earnestly to the people of this Province, in the confidence that they will listen to the language of reason, respect unanimously those precepts of just subordination inculcated by the laws of their country, and by no act of reckless indiscretion, either compromise their present happiness and future prosperity, or permit those permanent interests to be compromised by others.

I do, therefore, by and with the advice and consent of His Majesty's Executive Council of this Province, hereby most solemnly exhort all the subjects of His Majesty in this Province to unite in the cause of peace and good order, to discontinue all writings of an exciting and seditious tendency, and to eschew all meetings of a dangerous or equivocal character; and I do hereby enjoin and strictly command all Magistrates in and throughout the Province, all Officers of Militia, Peace Officers and others His Majesty's good subjects therein, to oppose and frustrate the insidious designs adverted to in this Proclamation, and to preserve by their loyal co-operation, the vigour and inviolability of the Laws, on which their religion and future happiness depend.

Downing Street, 27th April, 1837.—Sir,—I have received His Majesty's commands to take the necessary measures for expediting to you a patent as a Baronet of the United Kingdom. The King is graciously pleased to confer upon you this mark of His Royal favor as a fit testimony of the high sense which His Majesty entertains of the services which you have rendered in the administration of the Government of Upper Canada. London, May 24.
The Money Market.—To-morrow being settling day in the Consul Market, the chief attention of the brokers and jobbers is directed to the adjustment of their accounts, and scarcely any thing else has been done. The quotation for money at the termination of business, was 9½ and 9¼ to ½ for the July account, being ½ per cent lower than yesterday. Exchequer Bills remain 32s. to 34s. premium; and India Bonds at 35s. to 37s. premium.

There is no use in concealing the fact that American credit is at its lowest in England. The word in every one's mouth is, 'The Americans mean to pay us off by a general insolvency.' Meanwhile the merchants of Liverpool and London, the manufacturers of Manchester, Leeds, Sheffield, Nottingham, Leicester, &c. positively decline making consignments with such a scanty chance of payment.

Accounts from the manufacturing districts are very gloomy.

Dangerous illness of the King.—The King had a very severe attack of asthma, on Sunday, which prevented his usual attendance at church. It now is reported, all but officially, that he cannot attend in London, this day, to preside at the grand dinner in honour of the Princess Victoria! Sir H. Hallford has been in constant attendance, and bets on the Stock Exchange, to-day, were heavy, as to the chances of his recovery. Betting on mortality! The report by this morning's paper is, 'His Majesty is better.' The Queen's health is slowly amending. She had, it seems, placed herself under some Homeopathic quack, who nearly killed her.

In domestic matters we have had only three events since my last. The election of Broadwood, (the piano forte maker,) as M. P. for Bridgewater, against young Sheridan, who ran away with Miss Grant last year: Sir F. Burdett having made, the evening before last, a flaming Tory speech against the abolition of church-rates; and Serjeant Talford (author of Job,) having made an able speech, on Friday, in moving the extension of copy-right (literary) to 60 years after the author's death.

We are in daily expectation of a change of ministry. Earl Grey and the Duke of Richmond have been closeted with the King, and the former is said to be anxious to resume office as premier. The Whigs are afraid that Lord Durham, who is returning from Russia, will divide the Radical Whig Union, and have a trial of his own strength against them. Brougham has written to some friends here to say, that he will soon be in office again.—The Conservatives appear to be equally sure of a break up in the ministry.

The King is said to have declined giving his assent to a dissolution of parliament. His words are even reported thus, 'My Lord Melbourne, if you cannot go on with this present parliament, I think you must go off.'

From France we have little news, save that Louis Philippe's amnesty has wrought wonders in his favour.—He can now walk through Paris without fear of assassination. A change of ministry, and a dissolution of the Chambers, is spoken of as another *tapis* when the session closes.—*Cor. N. Y. Star.*

The affair of the Vixen has been amicably settled between England and Russia. There had been much fighting in Spain, with alternate successes. The Christians had repossessed themselves of Hernani, and taken Irun, after a desperate resistance. It was thought that the Carlists were about to make a dash at Madrid, with all their force.

On the 17th May, Gen. Evans captured the town and redoubt of Irun. The town was pillaged, and two hundred prisoners massacred by the bayonet. The British officers were obliged to form a guard to protect the survivors. The defence was obstinate and violent.

The Portuguese ministry have resigned. The cause of their determining to take this step was the decision of the Cortes, after a debate of nearly three days, not to allow the Ministers Under-Secretaries of State.

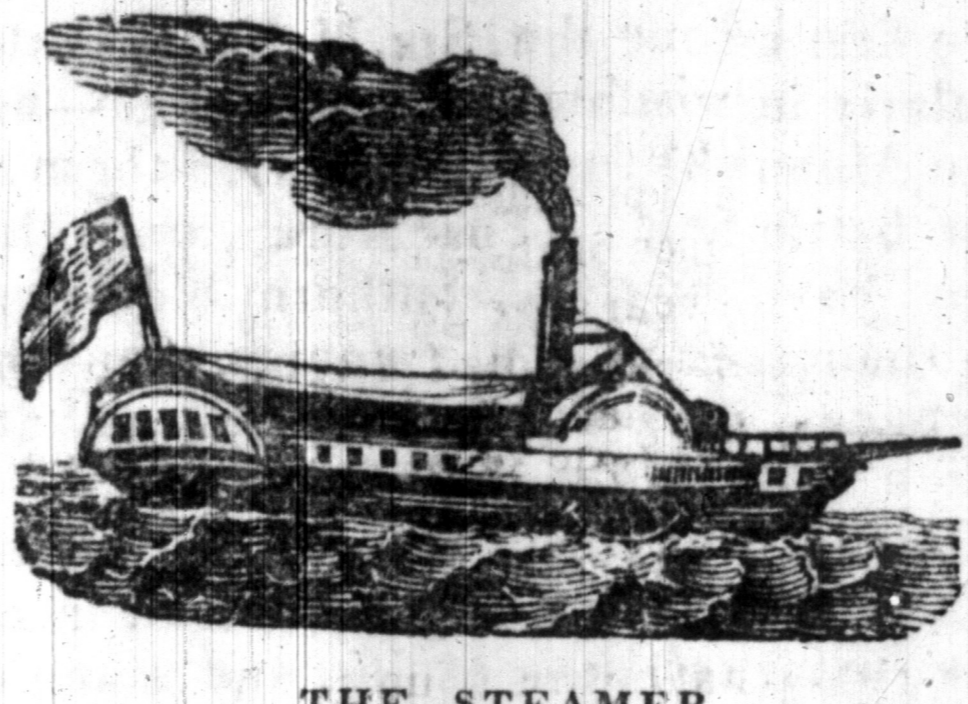
