GRAND JURY'S REPORT.

The Grand Jury, in returning such of the County Accounts as have been submitted to them at the present Session, beg to offer for the consideration of the Court, the following remarks:—

First. From the very limited time allowed for the examination of the documents (they not having been placed in the hands of the Jury until Friday at 12 o'clock), the Jury have not been able to bestow that care and attention in the examination which, in the opinion of the Jury, would have been desirable.

Second. The Jury recommend that in future the accounts be arranged so as to enable the Court to place them in the hands of the Jury on the first day of the Session, and that the present report, or a true copy thereof, accompany the accounts when submitted to the Jury next year.

TREASURER'S ACCOUNT CURRENT.—The Jury recommend that Account No. 1. should be reduced by striking out the undermentioned items, which would appear to have been furnished for Mr. Clapper's office, viz.

Stove, Pipes, Fire Irons, &c. &c. amounting to £8 13 3

No. 2. The Jury are of opinion that the undermentioned charges in the Coroner's account are wholly inadmissible, viz.

3 Jurors, 10 miles, £1 2 6

Paid N. O'Donnell for waggon hire, 1 10 0

No. 17. No bills of particulars accompanying Mr. Clapper's account for contingencies, the Jury are of opinion that many of the charges must be extravagantly high, and recommend that hereafter Bills of particulars be produced.

The Jury observe with regret, that No. 22, 24 and 25, are accounts for interest on large sums due by the County, and would recommend the Court to adopt measures for the discharge of those sums, and relieve the County from these charges hereafter.

The Account No. 32, for the Auditor's salary, the Jury conceive to be a useless and improvident expenditure of the public funds, and trust the office will be immediately abolished, as the duties may be performed by the Grand Jury with equal benefit to the County and at less expense.

AUDITOR'S REPORT.—Of the Accounts named in the Auditor's Report, the Jury remark:—

First. That the Account No. 4, of Dr. Fraser for attending inquests is, in the opinion of the Jury, a charge for services not required, and therefore conceive it altogether inadmissible.

William Payne's Account No. 7, for killing 11 dogs, at 5s. each, should, in the opinion of the Jury, be promptly paid, and the like services encouraged.

The Jury pray the Court to withhold payment of Mr. Clapper's Account, No. 8, for contingencies for 1836, until a full, detailed and particular statement (accompanied with vouchers) be produced for each and every charge.

The Jury would call the attention of the Court to the charge of £13 16s. paid to College for Rent of Alms House Lot, and charged in Commissioners' Account current. The Jury being under the impression that these premises are the property of the County, they therefore pray that, at the next January Sessions, the Court will be pleased to order a statement to be laid before the Grand Jury of the tenure under which those premises are held.

The Jury are pleased to perceive by the Treasurer's Account, that the salary of that officer has been increased agreeable to the recommendation of the last Jury, and most respectfully beg to call the attention of the Court to the very arduous, efficient and necessary services rendered the Court and the County at large by Mr. Joseph Beek, and trust the Court will make him a small allowance for those services out of the County Funds.

The Jury beg to call the attention of the Court to the state of the Fire Engines in Frederickton, which they regret to say, are in a most shameful and disgraceful condition, and would recommend that they be forthwith placed in an efficient state, and that hereafter an account of the Fines collected from delinquent Firemen be laid before the Grand Jury.

The Grand Jury would likewise recommend, that the County Accounts be published in the Royal Gazette at least one week in each year, together with the Grand Jury's reports thereon.

Grand Jury Room, 14th January, 1837.

At an adjourned General Sessions of the Peace, holden at the County Court on Thursday the 19th January, 1837.

The Court had under consideration the County Accounts for the year 1836, with the Presentation of the Grand Inquest thereon.

With respect to the first and second remarks, the Court will adhere to the practice heretofore pursued, of laying the Accounts before the Grand Jury, without any unnecessary delay.

Account No. 1. The articles here alluded to were not for Mr. Clapper's office, but for the public Record Office of the County.

Coroner's Account, No. 2. The charges in this Account were under the notice of the Court at a former Session, and after a mature consideration of all the circumstances, were of opinion that the expense incurred was necessary and indispensable, and it was accordingly ordered to be paid.

No. 17. This is an Account of H. G. Clapper, Esq. Clerk of the Peace, for the ordinary contingent expenses of the County for the year 1836; for fuel, stationary, payment for scrubbing and cleaning the County Court rooms, repairs, &c. including two coal measures for the use of the County, amounting in all to £11 4 6. The Court having considered the several items in this account, are of opinion that the services were necessary and proper, and the charges fair, reasonable and moderate, and do order it to be paid.

Nos. 22, 24, 25. In the present state of the County, the Court deem it inexpedient to adopt any measures for assessing the County to pay off the principal of these debts.

No. 32. With regard to the office of Auditor, the duties of this officer has been merely to arrange and methodize the accounts, in order to their being laid before the Court in proper form, and to prevent delays which would otherwise necessarily ensue, and the Court cannot recognize the power in the Grand Jury, to dictate to them the course they should pursue in this respect.

Auditor's Report, No. 4. This account is still under the consideration of the Court, and will receive due attention: it was prematurely laid before the Grand Jury.

With respect to the Alms House Lot, circumstances beyond the control of the Court have heretofore intervened to prevent the title being perfected, a Committee however will be named to cause it to be done without further delay.

Ordered, That Mr. Saunders, Mr. Fraser and Mr. Emerson, be such Committee. James Taylor, Esq. having signified to the Court his particular desire to resign the situation of Auditor—his resignation is accepted; and

Mr. Joseph Beek is thereupon appointed Accountant to arrange and methodize the County Accounts, School and Road Returns, &c. and to lay them before the Court at a salary of ten pounds for the present year.

With regard to that part of the presentment relating to the Fire Engines, the Court deemed it necessary to examine Mr. Needham one of the Firewards, and Mr. Thomas Bowden, Engineer; by the statement of the latter, it appears that Engine No. 1 is in as good state and repair as for many years back, and by no means in a "shameful and disgraceful condition." This Engine has no serviceable hose, and is therefore not so efficient as it ought to be, but the Engine itself is clean, well oiled and in a serviceable state.

Engine No. 2 has serviceable hose, and is clean and in as good state and repair, as it is possible to place it in considering its age. Mr. Needham corroborates the statement of Mr. Bowden, and adds that when Engine No. 1. is used, hose is obtained for it from another source. He further states, that no fines have been ever recovered.
