At a meeting of the Officers of the First Battalion York County Militia, held at the Adjutant's Office, in Fredericton, on Thursday the 23d day of November, 1837.

Resolved unanimously, That we, in common with our fellow subjects in this Province of New Brunswick, deeply lament the spirit of violence and rebellion now exhibited in the Province of Lower Canada, and which, fostered and excited by evil minded persons, will, unless immediately checked and put down, plunge the Country in anarchy and blood.
That it is our duty at this time to give expression to those feelings of loyalty by which the people of this Province have ever been actuated, and thus to convey our unqualified disapprobation of the proceedings of the sedition faction in Lower Canada, as well as our cordial sympathy for, and desire to support, our loyal fellow subjects in that Province.

That having learned that Her Majesty's Troops stationed in this Province are under orders to proceed to Quebec, we have now assembled to offer our services to His Excellency the Commander in Chief, for the performance of Garrison duty, or any other Military service to which His Excellency may be pleased to order us, for the maintenance of the Queen's Government, and for the protection of the lives and property of our fellow subjects, and we feel convinced that the non-commissioned officers and men of the Battalion, and Companies attached thereto, moved by a like sense of their allegiance and duty to their Queen and Country, will, with cheerfulness and alacrity, obey the calls of His Excellency.

Resolved, That Lieut. Colonel Minchin do wait upon His Excellency the Commander in Chief, and communicate the foregoing resolutions.

We have much pleasure in publishing the Resolution of the House of Assembly of the 21st July last, with the interesting Despatch

which has been received with reference thereto.

On motion of Mr. L. A. Wilmot,—Whereas the inhabitants of this loyal Province are deeply grateful to the Right Honorable Lord Glenelg, Secretary of State for the Colonies, for the liberal and enlightened policy, which, under our Most Gracious Sovereign, has characterized his Lordship's decisions on the important question recently brought under his notice by this House; And whereas this House is desirous that a personal as well as a political remembrance of that noble Lord should be perpetuated in this Province, therefore Resolved unanimously, That an humble Address be presented to His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, praying that His Excellency would communicate with His Lordship, and on behalf of this House request that His Lordship would be pleased to allow his full-length Portrait to be taken, and sent to this Province, to be placed in the Assembly Room; and further, that this House will make provision for the same.

This Resolution was promptly conveyed to His Lordship by our highly esteemed Lieutenant Governor, Sir JOHN HARVEY, in a Despatch bearing date the 27th July. To this His Excellency has received the reply which we now publish by permission, and most fully participate in the high satisfaction which we are sure the people of the Province will feel that this enlightened and distinguished Statesman has acceded to the wishes of the House, and with the terms in which he has been pleased to communicate the same.

SIR,—I have the honor to acknowledge the receipt of your Despatch, No. 21, of the 27th of July, transmitting a copy of an Address, which has been presented to you by the House of Assembly of New Brunswick, praying that you would communicate with me, and on behalf of the House, request that I would allow my full length Portrait to be taken, and sent to the Province, to be placed in the Assembly Room.

I cannot but sensibly feel the honour which the House of Assembly have done me on this occasion.
Deeply convinced of the importance of the duties committed to me, and anxious to discharge them with fidelity at once to my Sovereign, and to the true interests of the Province of New Brunswick, I felt it a privilege to co-operate with the House of Assembly in securing the constitutional rights and promoting the prosperity of the people whom they represent. If any fresh motive were requisite to animate my zeal in the same cause, I shall find it in the generosity with which my services have been accepted and appreciated.

Impressed with these sentiments, I feel it my duty at once to accede to the desire of the House of Assembly, happy in having my name associated with an era, auspicious as I trust, to New-Brunswick, and thankful to those who have given me that gratification. I am scarcely aware what is the most fitting and respectful mode in which this reply to your Despatch of the 27th July, can be made known to the House.

I can therefore only request that you will effect that object in the manner most consistent with the usual forms and observances, and most respectful to the House of Assembly.

The new steamer Nova-Scotia, commanded by Capt. T. REED, started yesterday morning on her first trip to Eastport and St. Andrews. She went off in excellent style, and it is anticipated will prove a fast boat. She is fitted up in a most superb manner for the accommodation and comfort of passengers, neither expense nor pains having been spared to render her in every respect worthy of the patronage of travellers.—We understand that her regular trips will be to Digby and Annapolis, and Eastport, for the remainder of the season.—Observer, Nov. 4th.

The Montreal Morning Courier, of the 6th inst. quotes from the Quebec Mercury, the following observations:—With regard to the 43d Regiment, should their services be required, a march across the portage is not impracticable either in summer or winter. The gallant Officer who now administers the Government of New-Brunswick, made the trip on snow shoes, in 1812—13, when he came out on his appointment to the Staff in Canada.

Sir John Harvey, the Lieut. Governor of New-Brunswick, was a Lieut. Colonel in Upper Canada during the last war with the United States, and was principally instrumental in contriving the plan of attack, and carrying it personally into execution, at the battle of Stony Creek, near the Lake Ontario, where the United States Army was defeated, and Generals Chandler and Winder made prisoners. The honor of Knighthood was conferred upon him as a reward for that service.—Halifax Recorder.

LATEST FROM EUROPE.

From the New York Journal of Commerce.

By the ship Westchester, Captain Ferris, we have received London papers to October 11th, and Liverpool to the 12th, inclusive. The latest previous dates were to the 10th from both places.

The British Parliament was to convene on the 15th of November.

The returns of revenue for the quarter ending Oct. 10th, exhibited a fall off, as compared with the corresponding quarter

of last year, of £917,651 in the Customs, £156,562 in Excise, £122,489 in Stamps, £26,695 in Taxes, and £3,530 in miscellaneous; and again on nothing except £19,006 on the Post Office. Net decrease on the quarter, £1,187,762; on the year, £2,097,295.

LONDON, Oct. 10, (EVENING).—The Consol market has been somewhat heavy to-day, and quotations are a shade lower. Consols closed at 92½ to 93 for money and this account, and at 92½ to 93 for the November account. Exchequer Bills were 50s. to 52s. and India Bonds 52s. to 54s. premium. Money was rather more in demand.

ROCHDALE FLANNEL MARKET, MONDAY.—There has been a falling off in the demand for flannels to-day, and the buyers have been generally offering lower prices. In the wool market there has not been much business done, as prices are generally expected to be lower.

STATE OF TRADE AT MANCHESTER.—The flatness which we have mentioned as prevailing in the market for the last two or three weeks, appears to be on the increase. Yesterday was a very dull day both for goods and yarns; and the prices of each were lower—in some instances considerably so.—Guardian.

LIVERPOOL COTTON MARKET, Oct. 11.—The Cotton market on Tuesday was exceedingly inactive, and the sales did not exceed 1000 bags, at rather drooping prices. To-day there was a moderate demand, chiefly from the trade, and 2500 bags were sold at fair prices.

SPAIN.—Bayonne, Oct. 7.—An expedition which partly succeeded, left St. Sebastian on the 3d, in order to surprise Guetaria, and returned on the 4th with a considerable booty. Lord John Hay co-operated in this expedition with the naval forces under his command. It was stated at St. Sebastian that Don Carlos had re-entered Navarre. The bands of Sauz, who separated from Cabrera to join Don Carlos, intercepted the Madrid road during two days.

PORTUGAL.—We have received news from Lisbon of the 4th inst. The infant prince was christened on the 1st, by the name of Pedro d'Alcantara.—Marshal Saldanha and several officers who had espoused the Charlist cause were still remaining at Vigo; but the Duke of Terceira, with his wife and family, was in the Tagus, on board the British ship Malabar, intending to come to England. The Cortes had decided in favour of two legislative chambers, by sixty-four votes against sixteen. A change of Ministry was talked of; the capital, however, remained quiet.

A Belgian paper states that the art of directing balloons through the air, has at length been discovered by a William Von Eschen of Brussels.

LAW RELATING TO WILLS IN ENGLAND.

The following alterations have been made by Statute, in England, of the law relating to the execution of Wills.

The following are the principal regulations contained in the recent act (1 Victoria, c. 26) for amending the Laws with respect to Wills, which will take effect on the 1st day of January, 1838:—No will made by any person under the age of 21 years, will be valid.—Sec. 7. The new statute does not alter the laws as to the wills of married women.—Sec. 8. The regulations to be observed in making a will or codicil are as follows:—1. The will or codicil must be signed at the foot or end thereof by the testator. 2. If he does not sign, it must be signed by some other person in his presence and by his direction. 3. The signature must be made or acknowledged, by the testator, in the presence of two or more witnesses present at the same time. The witnesses must attest and subscribe the will or codicil in the presence of the testator.—Sec. 9. Appointments by will, under a power, are made subject to the above mentioned regulations.—Sec. 10. The testator's marriage is a revocation of his will (excepting in certain cases of exercise of powers).—Sec. 11. The revocation of a will or codicil may be by any of the following means:—1. By a will or codicil executed in the manner above mentioned. 2. By a writing declaring the intent to revoke, and execute as a will. 3. By burning, tearing or destroying of the will by the testator, with intent to revoke, or by some person in his presence, and by his direction.—Sec. 20. Alterations made in wills must be executed in like manner as wills. N. B.—The signature of the testator and subscription of witness may be made in the margin, or opposite or near to the alteration or at the end of a memorandum, on the will, referring to the alteration.—Sec. 21. Residuary devises in wills will include (unless a contrary intention appear in the will) estates comprised in leases or void leases.—Circular from the Home Office.

A NEWFOUNDLAND LEGISLATOR.—His multifarious Offices and Duties.—Extract from the Proceedings of the House of Assembly, August 25:—The House in a Committee of Supply.

Mr. T. F. Moore moved, seconded by Mr. Brown, that the sum of £100 be voted as a salary for a Stipendiary Magistrate on the South shore of Trinity Bay.

Mr. Winsor begged to enquire of the Hon. Member for Trinity if he was not himself a constable for the south shore of Trinity Bay?

Mr. T. F. Moore said he was, and that too for 18 years, and he verily believed he was the worst paid officer, not under the Crown but under Heaven, for he only got three quarters pay during that long service, and he would say above board that there half so much good for the country as he did, and was worse paid. When he was first returned as an honorable member of the

House of Assembly, he was dismissed from office of Constable by Governor Prescott on that account, and shortly after that Governor Prescott dismissed him from the House of Assembly because he ordered the House to be dissolved. (Laughter.) Mr. Winsor would be glad to know if the Hon. Member was since appointed to the Office of Constable.

Mr. T. F. Moore said not to his knowledge, but he would again tell Mr. Winsor that there was not a single man in the country, he did not care who he was, that did not do some real good for the whole Island of Newfoundland, and was worse treated than Tom Fitzgibbon Moore,—he taught Sunday schools for 14 years, and other schools, (laughter) and for 14 years more, he did, ten to one, aye, he would say a hundred to one, more than any Priest or Parson in the Island, for he married, baptised, and read the burial services regularly—(much laughter)—yes, regularly and devoutly, Mr. Speaker, and he did more, for the married himself, made his wedding ring, and christened his own children—(roars of laughter.)

The Officer commanding the 43d Regt. requests that the Sheriff, the resident Gentry, and Inhabitants in general, at the Oromocto, will accept his public acknowledgments and warmest thanks for their very great kindness and hospitality to the Officers and Men of a Detachment of the 43d Regiment, on their arrival there after a long and fatiguing march from Gage Town, on the 26th inst. as well as to a Detachment under Captain Bell, which arrived there the week previous.
