**Extract from the Message of Governor Dunlop, of Maine, to the Senate and House of Representatives:**

The subject of the North Eastern Boundary of the State, which for several years has been rendered deeply interesting to our constituents, from the claim set up in relation to it by the British Government, remains unsettled; and I regret to say, that I have received no information to warrant the opinion that a speedy adjustment is expected. This claim by the British Government drew out of an implied but unequivocal admission by her own authorities, that the territory in dispute belonged to Maine. In the negotiation of the Treaty of Ghent, the Commissioners on the part of Great Britain requested "such a variation of the line of Frontier as might secure a direct communication between Quebec and Halifax." This request was an obvious concession, that without such variation the requested territory would not belong to that Government. To this request the Commissioners on the part of the United States replied, that the Federal Government had no power to cede away any portion of the domain of one of the States of the Union.—Resort was then had to ingenuity, and this resulted not in asserting a claim to the desired territory, but in declaring that their was "much doubt whether it does not already belong to Great Britain." Upon this expression of a doubt the whole superstructure of the controversy has been raised.

A claim to territory then began to be made.—This claim was at first indeterminate, for it indicated no line of boundary, and referred to no documents or reasonings by which it was to be sustained. Is it not then safe to conclude that this claim originated from an effort of invention? It contravenes the treaty of Boundaries, and in sustaining it, its supporters have substituted argument and ingenuity, for truth and justice.

It must be conceded that our people and their State Government have exercised a most liberal forbearance upon the subject, considering the series of years it has been agitated and the successive incidental circumstances calculated to excite and aggravate popular feeling. Our soil and our sovereignty have been invaded. Over a portion of domain of incalculable value, owned jointly by this and our parent Commonwealth, an attempt has been made to establish an adverse claim.—The jurisdiction of the State has been rendered imperative, either for the protection or redress of our injured inhabitants. Under color of authority from a foreign Government, our unoffending citizens in time of peace have been forced from their rightful homes and dragged beyond the limits of the State. Trials for imaginary crimes, have been instituted against them, and upon our brethren, guilty of no offence, and charged with no wrong, the indignities of a foreign jail have been imposed. Our political system has lodged in the first instance the power and duty of protection, with the Federal Government. To that Government we have appealed, but relief has not come. Our lands are sequestered, our sovereignty is insulted, and our injured citizens are unredressed. In this state of things, is it not due to our own self respect, as well as the cause of justice, that the State of Maine should insist on being immediately placed by the Government of the United States, into the possession of the invaluable rights from which she has been so long excluded?

### IN THE SUPREME COURT, Hilary Term, 7 Wm. 4, A. D. 1837. GENERAL RULES.

1st. WHEREAS it is deemed improper that any Clerk in the Office of the Pleas of this Court should act as an Agent of any Attorney, with or without remuneration or gratuity: It is ordered, that henceforth no Attorney of this Court do employ any such Clerk as his Agent, in any suit or matter pending in this Court, or in the transaction of any business in the office either of Clerk of the Crown or Clerk of the Pleas, and that the Clerk of the Pleas do not allow or suffer any Clerk or other person employed in his Office to act as such Agent, under any pretence whatsoever.

2d. It is further ordered, That from and after this present Hilary term, every Attorney of this Court enter the Return, and file the writ or Process in all actions which have not, at or before such Return, been settled or discontinued; and make and file with the Clerk a Docket of all such returns and Rules, on or before the last return day of the Term at which such writs are returnable, or within Thirty days thereafter: And that the Clerk do not in future receive or file any Docket, or enter any such rule after the said thirty days, without the special order of the Court, or a Judge, to be made on affidavit or affidavits properly accounting for the delay.

3d. It is further ordered, That the party applying for the Examination of a witness or witnesses *debene esse*, under the Act 26 Geo. 3, C. 20, or for an order for such Examination, or for the issuing a Commission under the Act 5 W. 4, C. 34, do state in the affidavit or affidavits upon which such application is founded, the nature of the Action, the Venue, and the state of the pleading or pleadings at the time of such application, also the name of the opposite Attorney or Agent: And do also whenever time will permit, give notice of such application, together with a Copy of the affidavit or affidavits to such Attorney or Agent.

4th. It is further ordered, That no Judgment be signed upon any warrant authorizing any attorney to confess Judgment, without such warrant being delivered to and filed by the Clerk.

5th. It is further ordered, That every Attorney of this Court who shall prepare any warrant of Attorney to confess any Judgment which is to be subject to any defence, do cause such defence to be written on the same paper or parchment on which the warrant of Attorney shall be written, or cause a memorandum in writing to be made on such warrant containing the substance and effect of such defence.

6th. It is further ordered, That no Sheriff, Bailiff, or Sheriff's Officer, shall presume to exact or take from any person or persons being in his custody by arrest, any warrant to confess Judgment, but in the presence of an Attorney of the Defendant, which Attorney shall then subscribe his name thereto: and that no Attorney do acknowledge or enter any Judgment by color of any warrant given by any Defendant being under arrest, otherwise than as is aforesaid.
