His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor and Commander in Chief, has been pleased to confer the Militia rank of Esquire on Mr. John Davis, of Miramichi.

KING'S COLLEGE, FREDERICTON,  
December 19, 1837.

At a Convocation this day held, the Rev. JOHN MAYNE STERLING, Bachelor of Arts of King's College, Windsor, was incorporated into this University.

We have authority to state, that His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor has received Letters Patent, under the Great Seal, extending the numbers of Her Majesty's Executive Council in this Province; and an additional instruction, under the Royal Sign Manual, appointing the undermentioned to Seats at that Board, viz: George Shore, Frederick P. Robinson, Wm. Franklin Odell, John Simcoe Saunders, Charles Simonds, Hugh Johnston, William Crane, Nevill Parker, A. E. Botsford, and Joseph Curard, Esq. res.

At a meeting of the Officers of the First Battalion Queen's County Militia, holden at the County Court House, in Gagetown, on Tuesday the 12th day of December, 1837, at which every officer of the Regiment was present.

The Honorable Colonel Harry Peters was unanimously elected Chairman of the meeting, and Captain T. R. Wetmore, Secretary.

Colonel Peters, in assuming the Chair, addressed the meeting in an appropriate, animated and loyal speech.

After which sundry resolutions were adopted, expressive of attachment to the Throne and Constitution of England, of their abhorrence and concern at the measures pursued by the disaffected portion of the Inhabitants of Lower Canada, with an offer of their united services, to aid in putting down treason and rebellion in Lower Canada.

To which His Excellency Sir John Harvey was pleased to return the following answer:

GOVERNMENT HOUSE, FREDERICTON,  
16th December, 1837.

To the Officers 1st Battalion Queen's County Militia.

It is unspeakably gratifying to me to receive such declarations of attachment to the Throne and Constitution of England, and of determination to support the Royal Authority, and put down treason and rebellion in a neighbouring Province, as are contained as well in Colonel Peters' address to, as in the Resolutions adopted by, the Officers of the 1st Battalion of

Queen's County Militia. That they are concurring in by the 2d Battalion, I do not for a moment entertain a doubt, believing as I do that they express the sentiments of the universal population of this thoroughly British Province. I am deeply sensible of the expression of confidence and favorable opinion as respects myself individually.

I have called the Legislature together for the purpose of suggesting the propriety of evincing towards our Loyal fellow subjects in Lower Canada, the sympathy which the Inhabitants of this Province feel for their situation, and of placing at the disposal of the Authorities in that Province, the services of such portion of the Militia of this, led by myself, as may be required for the support of the Royal Authority in Lower Canada, and the suppression of the revolt into which many of its naturally contented and well disposed peasantry have been led by wicked, unprincipled, traitorous and reckless Men.

Militia of Queen's County, in the name of Your youthful and most Gracious Queen, I thank you for the sentiments you have expressed.

The following is His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor's reply to the address from the principal Inhabitants of Saint John (inserted in our last number), which was presented to His Excellency on Tuesday the 12th instant.

To the Magistrates and other principal inhabitants of the City of Saint John.

GENTLEMEN.—I acknowledge with feelings of pride and pleasure, your truly loyal and patriotic Address. Proceeding from such a community, and bearing the signatures of all that is most respectable in that loyal city, I feel that I may justly consider this Address as an index, nothing equivocal, of the general feeling of the population of the Province. Taking it in connection with many others which have lately reached me, I deem myself warranted, not only unhesitatingly to commit the protection of the Province, and of the lives and property of Her Majesty's subjects within it, to its Loyal Militia; but also (in the confident anticipation of the Legislative sanction) to tender thro' His Excellency the Governor in Chief to Her Majesty's loyal subjects in Lower Canada, not the sympathies only, but the actual cooperation of a large body of the Militia of New Brunswick, in the suppression of the insurrection in that Province; and should their services be required or accepted, I trust that it is unnecessary for me to say, that I should glory in placing myself at the head of a Volunteer Force, acting under feelings and upon principles of so high and noble a character.

Our Canadian files reached us late last evening, and immediately as the Gazette was preparing for the Press. We have copied some of the latest articles from the Quebec and Montreal papers, but their contents are generally unimportant. The Montreal Gazette contains the following remarks on the present posture of affairs in Canada:—

"Although there evidently appears to be a lull at the present moment in the revolutionary storm which has lately visited this Province, yet we believe it will be acknowledged on all hands, that the final battle of the Constitution has not yet been fought; and that, until the rebels have, root and branch, been extirpated, there will be neither peace nor safety for Her Majesty's loyal subjects. 'It is true that the bravery and discipline of a handful of the Queen's troops have succeeded in relieving the banks of the Richibieu from that unhallowed blot with which the people of that neighbourhood have suffered their loyalty and respect for the laws to be indelibly tarnished. But treason and disaffection still abound in the land; and our authorities, civil and military, will find that the most important part of their duty remains to be fulfilled. We are no alarmists, and despite that creeping cowardice which would startle at the menaces of a revolutionary faction, however numerous and united. Still, the dictates of prudence and wisdom demand that every precaution that force can exercise, should be used for the purpose of convincing not only the avowed rebel, but his private abettors, of the folly and iniquity of their attempts to subvert the laws and the Constitution."

A Proclamation appears in the last Quebec Official Gazette, from the Governor in Chief, offering a reward of Four Thousand Dollars for the apprehension of "Louis Joseph Papineau, of the City of Montreal, Esquire, charged with the crime of High Treason." Another Proclamation offers a reward of Two Thousand Dollars for the apprehension of Dr. William Nelson, Thomas Storror Brown, Edmund B. O'Callaghan, M. P. P. and six others, who are charged with the same offence.

On Friday last, the Troops in this Garrison were relieved from duty by a guard of the Rifle Company, attached to the 1st Battalion of York County Militia, and has since been performed by the Officers and men of that Corps.

The spirit and readiness which has been evinced by this Battalion in the absence of Her Majesty's regular Troops, cannot be too highly spoken of, and the good conduct and orderly behaviour of the Men in general, has been such as to merit the most satisfactory commendation of their commanding Officers; and we have every reason to believe that the duty will continue to be cheerfully and faithfully discharged so long as their services may be required.

The last detachment of the 43d Reg. under the command of Captain Tryon, took their departure on Saturday morning last, for Canada. On Sunday the first detachment of the 85th Regt. under the command of Captain Power, arrived here on sleds, from Saint John, and proceeded yesterday morning on their route to Canada.

The head quarters (two Companies) of the 85th Regiment, under the command of Lieutenant Colonel Mansell, arrived here last evening from Saint John, and proceeded on to Canada this morning.

From the Courier, December 16.

At a Meeting of the Officers of the St. John County Regiment of Militia, held in Portland on the 5th instant:

PRESENT.  
The Honorable Charles Simonds, Lieut. Col.; Lieut. Col. Anderson; Major Hatheway, and upwards of twenty Officers, Captains, and Subalterns.

1. Resolved unanimously, That the Officers of this Regiment deeply lament the progress which rebellion is making in the adjoining Province of Lower Canada; and they view with abhorrence the proceedings of the faction there, who under pretence of seeking redress of grievances, have seduced a portion of Her Majesty's subjects from their allegiance, for the wicked purpose of revolution.

That actuated by those principles of loyalty which happily pervade the entire population of this Province, the Officers of this Regiment feel it a duty to offer their services to His Excellency the Commander in Chief, to perform garrison or any other military duty, which the absence of the regular troops may render necessary for effectually supporting Her Majesty's Government, and they are assured that the non-commissioned Officers and men of this Regiment, feel a like sense of duty to their Queen and Country.

2. Resolved, That Lieut. Col. Simonds do communicate the foregoing resolution, and tender of services to His Excellency the Commander in Chief.

To which His Excellency was pleased to send the following reply.

Government House, Fredericton,  
December 6, 1837.

SIR—I have received with the highest satisfaction the resolutions adopted by the Officers of the Saint John County Militia, at a meeting held in Portland yesterday.

I am so entirely convinced of the ardent loyalty and devoted attachment to British connexion by which the universal population of this Province is animated, that I am not only enabled to detach the whole of the Queen's troops in this Province to the support and assistance of those in Lower Canada, but also to entertain a well founded confidence of being empowered to afford to Her Majesty's loyal subjects in that Province, the assistance and co-operation of the Provincial troops from this, in the event of circumstances rendering it necessary.

To yourself individually I tender my thanks for your spirited offer, and cannot only assure you that in such an emergency as I have alluded to, I should be happy to find you and the St. John County Militia at my side.

HALIFAX, Dec. 13.—His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, we are informed, received a Despatch from Lord Glenelg, by the last Packet, stating, that it was extremely desirable that the separation of the existing Council into two Bodies should take place, without further delay, and conveying to His Excellency HER MAJESTY'S authority at once to appoint, provisionally, to each of the new Councils, those Gentlemen whom he might consider best qualified for the discharge of the respective duties which will devolve on them.

His Excellency communicated this Despatch to Her Majesty's Council yesterday, and after having, as we have heard from several of the Honorable Members, expressed, in the most feeling and impressive manner, his grateful acknowledgements for the able and impartial assistance which he has at all times received from them in the administration of the public affairs of this Province, His Excellency, in the QUEEN'S Name, declared that Board dissolved.—Royal Gazette.
