A PROCLAMATION.

WHEREAS notwithstanding repeated Public Notice heretofore given, by which all persons were strictly commanded to abstain from cutting Timber, or in any other manner trespassing on the wild lands within this Province, lying to the eastward of and contiguous to the boundary line, at present in dispute between Great Britain and the United States of America, and known under the denomination of "the disputed Territory;" Individuals in violation thereof, have from time to time been guilty of cutting and making timber, and otherwise trespassing thereon;

In order effectually to prevent a repetition thereof in future, I do hereby forbid all and every person and persons from occupying any part of the same wilderness lands or in any manner trespassing thereon, by cutting Timber or otherwise, and every offender in the premises, will be forthwith prosecuted to the utmost extremity of the law, and no compromise will hereafter be made with them under any circumstances.

The Warden appointed by His Majesty's Government to superintend and watch over the said Territory, is also hereby enjoined to take all measures within his power to detect any and all offenders, and give the earliest information, that legal proceedings against them may be forthwith adopted.

And I call upon all His Majesty's liege subjects within the Province, to be aiding and assisting, in all things within their power, to carry into effect the object of this Proclamation.

Given under my Hand and Seal at Fredericton, this twenty sixth day of July in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and thirty seven, and in the eighth year of His Majesty's Reign.

PROVINCIAL APPOINTMENTS.

The Lieutenant Governor deeming it essential to the public interests immediately to establish a Board for the due examination and auditing of all Provincial accounts, has been pleased to make the following appointments, subject to the confirmation of Her Majesty's Government, viz:

The Honorable Frederick P. Robinson, to be Auditor General, H. G. Clopper, Esquire, to be Assistant Auditor.

And His Excellency has been further pleased to appoint George J. Dibblee, Esq. to be Clerk of the Peace, and of the Court of Common Pleas, for the County of York, and George Garden, Esq. to be Sergeant at Arms to the House of Assembly, vice H. G. Clopper, Esq.

The Hon. William Black, Charles Simonds, Esq. and Robert F. Hazen, Esq. Commissioners to examine the securities to be given by the Saint John Water Company, for the repayment of the sum of £5000, to be lent to them pursuant to the Act of Assembly.

PROCLAMATION.

WHEREAS it hath pleased ALMIGHTY God to call to his mercy our late Sovereign Lord King WILLIAM THE FOURTH, of blessed and glorious memory, by whose decease the Imperial Crown of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, and all other His late Majesty's Dominions, is solely and rightfully come to the High and

Mighty Princess Alexandrina Victoria, saving the rights of any Issue of His late Majesty King William the Fourth which may be born of His late Majesty's Consort;—We, the Lieutenant Governor and Commander in Chief, and the Members of His late Majesty's Executive Council, the Judges and principal Officers of His said late Majesty's Government of this Province, and numbers of others, Magistrates and principal Inhabitants, being here assembled, therefore do now hereby with one full voice and consent of tongue and heart, publish and proclaim that the High and Mighty Princess Alexandrina Victoria, is now, by the death of our late Sovereign, of happy and glorious memory, become our only lawful and rightful liege Lady Victoria, by the Grace of God, Queen of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, Defender of the Faith, saving as aforesaid, Supreme Lady, &c. of this Province of New Brunswick; to whom, saving as aforesaid, We do acknowledge all faith and constant obedience, with all hearty and humble affection, beseeching God, by whom Kings and Queens do reign, to bless the Royal Princess Victoria with long and happy years to reign over us.

A PROCLAMATION.

Requiring all Persons being in Office of Authority or Government at the Death of the late King, to proceed in the Execution of their respective Offices.

J. HARVEY, Lt. Governor.

WHEREAS by an Act made in the Sixth Year of the Reign of Her late Majesty Queen Anne, intitled "An Act for the Security of Her Majesty's Person and Government, and of the Succession to the Crown of Great Britain in the Protestant Line;" it was enacted, that no Office, Place, or Employment, Civil or Military, within the Kingdoms of Great Britain or Ireland, Dominion of Wales, Town of Berwick upon Tweed, Isles of Jersey, Guernsey, Alderney, and Sark, or any of Her Majesty's Plantations, should become void by reason of the Demise of Her said late Majesty, Her Heirs or Successors, Kings or Queens of this Realm, but that every Person and Persons in any of the Offices, Places, and Employments aforesaid, should continue in their respective Offices, Places, and Employments for the Space of Six Months next after such Death or Demise, unless sooner removed and discharged by the next Successor, to whom the Imperial Crown of this Realm was limited and appointed to go, remain, and descend: And Whereas by an Act made in the Fifty-seventh Year of the Reign of His late Majesty King George the Third, intitled "An Act for the Continuation of all and every Person or Persons in any and every Office, Place, or Employment, Civil or Military, within the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, Dominion of Wales, Town of Berwick upon Tweed, Isles of Jersey, Guernsey, Alderney, Sark, and Man, and also in all and every of His Majesty's Foreign Possessions, Colonies, or Plantations, which he or she shall hold, possess, or exercise during the Pleasure of the Crown at the Time of the Death or Demise of His present Majesty, until removed or discharged therefrom by the succeeding King or Queen of this Realm;" it was enacted, that all and every Person and Persons, who upon the Day of the Demise of His said late Majesty should hold any Office, Civil or Military, under the Crown, during Pleasure, should, under and by virtue of the said Act and without any new or other Patent, Commission, Warrant, or Authority, continue and be entitled in all respects, notwithstanding the Demise of His said Majesty, to hold and enjoy the same: But nevertheless the same should be held or enjoyed only during Pleasure of the King or Queen who should succeed to the Crown upon the Demise of His said late Majesty; and the Right and Title to hold and enjoy the same under the Authority of the said Act should be determinable in such and the like Manner, by the King or Queen who upon the Demise of His said late Majesty should succeed to the Crown, as the Right or Title to any Office, Place, or Employment granted by such succeeding King or Queen, during Pleasure, would by Law be determinable. I therefore, with the advice of Her Majesty's Executive Council, declare Her Majesty's Royal will and pleasure to be, and do hereby direct and command, that all and every Person and Persons, who, at the time of the De-

mise of His late Majesty, of Glorious Memory, duly and lawfully held, or were duly and lawfully possessed of, or invested in, any Office, Place or Employment, Civil or Military, within this Province, do, severally, according to their Places, Offices or Charges, proceed in the performance and execution of all Duties belonging to their respective Offices, whilst they shall hold the same respectively, during Her Majesty's pleasure; And I do hereby require and command all Her Majesty's Subjects to be aiding, helping and assisting, at the Commandment of the said Officers and Ministers, in the performance and execution of their respective Offices and Places, as they and every of them tender Her Majesty's Utmost Displeasure, and will answer the contrary at their Peril.
