**MILITIA INSPECTION.**—On Saturday last, the First Battalion York County Militia assembled in rear of the Artillery Park for General Inspection. There was a full, and seemingly, a cheerful attendance; and never do we recollect to have seen men behave in a more sober, orderly, and steady manner. Not the least symptom of intoxication was seen on the ground, save in one instance.

Col. MINCHIN put the Battalion through several evolutions, which were executed with much greater despatch and precision than could possibly have been expected from men brought into the field without any previous training. We were particularly struck with the fine soldierlike appearance and steady conduct of the two uniform Companies—the Artillery and Rifles—particularly the latter, who performed their exercises with uncommon dexterity, and marched past the saluting point in a manner scarcely to be excelled by any Regiment of the line.

On Friday evening last, we had an opportunity of seeing the Target at which the Rifles had been firing for the Company's gold and silver Medals, and a gold and silver Medal presented to them for competition by Col. Minchin, and a better drilled target we venture to assert cannot, from an equal number of shots, be produced in the Province.

The Gold Medals were awarded to R. H. Mackenzie and P. Brannen—the silver ones to E. Bradley and J. Agnew. At the presentation of these Medals, we could not help remarking that the breasts of P. Brannen and E. Bradley were well studded with similar prizes won on former occasions.

#### GENERAL ELECTION.

**YORK COUNTY.**—The Poll for the election of four Members of Assembly for this County opened here on Monday last. The Candidates are Colonel Allen and Messrs. L. A. Wilmut, James Taylor, Charles Fisher, John T. Smith, Wm. Dell Hartt and James Cameron. The discourse at the Hustings was addressed by those Gentlemen, as well as by D. L. Robinson, Esquire, Member for York in the late House, but who quite unexpectedly has retired from the contest, and strongly recommended his opponent to the former election (W. D. Hartt), to the support of his friends. We shall not attempt to give an epitome of the several speeches, but more remark that they were very appropriate, and marked with much less of a radical spirit than we have observed on several similar former occasions. This must be gratifying to every right minded man, and induces a hope that whoever may be successful, their energies will be directed to the rational improvement, and not the destruction of existing institutions.

**COUNTY OF KENT.**

On Tuesday last, the Court of Oyer and Terminer was opened in Kent by the Honorable Judge Parker, on which occasion the Judge addressed to the Grand Jury, a speech of considerable length, alluding not only to all subjects which usually occupy attention on such an occasion, but to the death of the King, and the accession of her present Majesty under circumstances so interesting as to engross the attention of the whole world. His Honor particularly mentioned the beneficent and urbane interest which the late King always expressed for the welfare of these Provinces, his frequent visits to these shores, and the great personal knowledge he had of our situation. A King who knew so much about us, and whose disposition was of so kindly a nature as to permit him to entertain and to express so much concern in our behalf as he invariably did, was so unusual, that his death was a loss to us of an irreparable nature.

We regret that our Correspondent was unable to procure a copy of Mr. Justice Parker's Speech, as it is represented as one particularly striking and very appropriate.

There were but two cases upon the Calendar; one for an assault on the High Sheriff, Le Baron Drury, Esq. in the execution of his duty, and the other for an offence which cannot in a civilized country be named, committed by a youth who has brought disgrace upon a respectable family and neighbourhood, and who it would be better had he never had a name.

Thomas Fingleton pleaded guilty for the assault, threw himself on the mercy of the Court, and received the lenient sentence of one month's imprisonment.

The capital part of the charge against the other prisoner being supposed untenable, the indictment was found for a misdemeanor, a verdict of guilty returned, and a sentence of one year's imprisonment, after a most feeling exhortation, mingled with much just reprehension, given by His Honor, who read the latter part of the 18th chapter of Deuteronomy, was passed.

On the conclusion of their business, the Grand Jury delivered in open Court, by their Foreman, John P. Ford, Esquire, the following address to His Honor:—

May it please Your Honor,

We, the Grand Jury of the County of Kent, now in Session, beg leave unanimously to express our acknowledgments to your Honor for the Speech you were pleased to address to us, detailing in so luminous and instructive a manner the nature of the responsibility and important duties which have devolved upon us; and we assure you that all our suggestions have received from us the deepest attention.

We have great pleasure in meeting your Honor on the first occasion of your presiding at the Kent Circuit, since your elevation to the Bench—an appointment which we trust, and do most sincerely believe, will tend as largely to the honour and interest of Her Majesty, as to the well-doing and satisfaction of the country at large.

To the expressions of regret for our departed Sovereign, of blessed memory, which breathed through the whole of your speech, we earnestly respond. The interest and solicitude entertained by His Majesty's William the Fourth, for the welfare of these Provinces, was so steady and unflinching, his personal knowledge of them so perfect, that the grief we feel for a loss so irreparable, we want language adequately to express.

On the commencement of a new reign,—and that reign commencing too under circumstances so interesting, we should be backward in the performance of our duty were we not to embrace this opportunity of declaring the steady loyalty which inspires the whole population of this County. We, and those whom we represent, fervently pray that the Throne of Her Majesty will long be implanted in the hearts of a free, a happy, and contented people; and that our tried and time-honored institutions be transmitted to posterity unimpaired.

To which the Judge made the following reply:—

Mr. Foreman, and Gentlemen of the Grand Jury,

I cannot but feel much gratified by the sentiments you have been pleased to express in regard to myself personally, on this first

occasion of meeting you since my appointment to the Bench of this Province; and I can assure you with great truth it will always be my earnest wish and endeavour to merit a continuance of your good opinion. I thank you also for the attention you have paid to my suggestions on the duties of your responsible office.

Your Address, however, Gentlemen, most appropriately alludes to the subjects of higher moment in comparison to which all matters affecting myself, however grateful to my feelings, are unimportant. No one could listen without emotion to the terms in which you have responded to my remarks on the recent events in the Mother Country; for I am proud to say, there is no part of the widely extended Dominions of the British Crown, in which a deeper feeling of affection and loyalty existed towards our late most gracious Sovereign, than in this Province; and I am perfectly satisfied, that the assurance you have given of devotion to Her present Majesty, and of warm attachment to the Institutions of the country, will find an echo in the breast of every inhabitant of this County.
