

Address of the Committee of the Baptist Education Society to His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor.

To His Excellency Major General Sir JOHN HARVEY, K. C. H. and C. B. Lieutenant Governor and Commander in Chief of the Province of New Brunswick, &c. &c. &c.

We, the Committee of the Baptist Education Society of this Province, beg leave to approach Your Excellency on the occasion of Your Excellency's assuming the Government of New Brunswick, with sentiments of respect to yourself and gratitude to our most gracious Sovereign for an appointment so welcome and so much in accordance with the just expectations of the people.

Among the many objects in this Province which will receive Your Excellency's attention, we fully believe that none will occasion greater interest than the education of its constantly increasing population.

From a deep sense of the importance of this object, and for the purpose of removing some of the difficulties which the youth of this Country have had to encounter in obtaining elementary and general knowledge, a society was organized in September 1833; and we, as managing Committee, proceeded at a heavy expense and entirely by voluntary subscription, to erect and establish the Seminary at Fredericton.

We trust Your Excellency will take a suitable opportunity of examining into the principles and proceedings of our Institution, and kindly afford such patronage as Your Excellency shall consider its usefulness merits; and that Your Excellency will accept the accompanying papers preparatory to such an examination.

[From the New York Albion, June 10.]  
By the Philadelphia, Sampson and St. Andrew, we have received London papers to the 8th ult.

In our last we stated that in consequence of the remittances made in Mr. Biddle's bonds, that confidence had revived, and cotton advanced in price. The subsequent arrivals, however, tended in a great degree to destroy that confidence, and reproduce the gloom that had been partially dissipated. The numerous failures in the United States were producing all the effects that might naturally be expected, and one of the large American houses had again applied to the Bank of England for succour. When the intelligence of the suspension of specie payments shall have been received, the British merchants may be able to contemplate in some measure the full extent of the disasters. The effects must be most serious to all connected with the American trade—but we will not dwell upon a theme fraught with so many melancholy forebodings.

A very large amount of protested bills, as may be supposed, has been returned. We do not learn that other circles of trade have suffered in proportion with the North American. A failure is reported in the East India trade, Majorbanks & Co., which, it appears, arose from injudicious speculations in teas and silks.

The affairs of Lower Canada are making all the progress that can be desired; on the 24th of April, the remaining Resolutions were brought forward for discussion. The 7th was passed with a very large majority, only fourteen voting against it. The 8th, the most important, was then moved: when Mr. Wason offered an amendment to the effect, that the House of Assembly was right in refusing all supplies until the "grievances" were redressed; "the reasonableness of which the House of Commons recognised." This was fatal to the opposition, for however unwilling many persons might feel to resort to the measure of taking monies from the Colonial Treasury, without the authority of the Assembly, the fact of justifying the proceedings of that Assembly, and recognising the "reasonableness" of their complaints and their conduct, was a very different affair. Mr. Wason's amendment was therefore lost by a vote of 116 to 32. We anticipated, from the tenor of the last accounts, that Mr. Roebuck's opposition to this Resolution would be less than we at first apprehended, and stated in our leading article of the last number, that he was beginning to lose heart. The result has completely justified our expectations. The last two Resolutions were carried without a division. On the 1st of May, Lord John Russell appeared at the bar of the House with the Resolutions, and asked for a Conference, for the purpose of

concurring in them. This was granted, the Peers named, and the matter appointed to be taken into consideration by the Lords on the 9th. We heartily congratulate the loyal people of Canada on this prosperous issue to their business in Parliament.

The Irish Tythe Bill has been read a second time in the Peers, and committed.

**A BILL**  
To exempt the Union Fire Company of the Town of Fredericton from Statute Labour on the Highways and Streets within the said Town.

WHEREAS a Fire Company has been formed in the Town of Fredericton, to consist of not over forty effective Members, called The Union Fire Company, for the purpose of removing property to a place of safety, and have made Bye Laws for their regulation and guidance, by which Bye Laws each Member of the Club engages to furnish himself, at his own expense, with certain utensils for taking down and removing furniture and merchandize, which utensils have frequently been and still are liable to be lost at every fire that takes place in the said Town, and which the members of the Club are obliged to replace at their own expense, for which they receive no compensation;

Be it therefore enacted by the Lieutenant Governor, Legislative Council and Assembly, That the Members of the Union Fire Company in the Town of Fredericton, shall be and they are hereby exempted and freed from all Statute Labour on the highways and streets within the said Town, during the continuance of the Club, any law or usage to the contrary notwithstanding.
