A PROCLAMATION.

WHEREAS notwithstanding repeated Public Notice heretofore given, by which all persons were strictly commanded to abstain from cutting Timber, or in any other manner trespassing on the wild lands within this Province, lying to the eastward of and contiguous to the boundary line, at present in dispute between Great Britain and the United States of America, and known under the denomination of "the disputed Territory;" Individuals in violation thereof, have from time to time been guilty of cutting and making timber, and otherwise trespassing thereon:

In order effectually to prevent a repetition thereof in future, I do hereby forbid all and every person and persons from occupying any part of the same wilderness lands or in any manner trespassing thereon, by cutting Timber or otherwise, and every offender in the premises, will be forthwith prosecuted to the utmost extremity of the law, and no compromise will hereafter be made with them under any circumstances.

The Warden appointed by His Majesty's Government to superintend and watch over the said Territory, is also hereby enjoined to take all measures within his power to detect any and all offenders, and give the earliest information, that legal proceedings against them may be forthwith adopted.

And I call upon all His Majesty's liege subjects within the Province, to be aiding and assisting, in all things within their power, to carry into effect the object of this Proclamation.

Given under my Hand and Seal at Fredericton, this twenty sixth day of July in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and thirty seven, and in the eighth year of His Majesty's Reign.

LATEST INTELLIGENCE.

[From the Woodstock Times Extra, July 31.]

The Houlton Mail, which arrived yesterday at half past five, A. M. furnishes us with Portland and Bangor Papers of the 26th and 27th instant, containing intelligence of the highest importance; among which is an extract from the Morning Chronicle of June 20th, announcing the DEATH of HIS MAJESTY KING WILLIAM IV.

This event, it will be perceived, is reported to have taken place on that day—and we are informed by some gentlemen from New York, that Victoria had delivered an address to the People.

The following is from the Eastern Argus, (Portland.)

The King of England is dead.—The news of this event is thus announced in the Morning Chronicle of the 20th June. "His Majesty expired about twenty minutes past three o'clock this morning. The Archbishop of Canterbury was present, as were also several members of the King's family. Immediately after the decease the Archbishop of Canterbury left Windsor Castle for Town."

The King's disease was described as "angina et hydrops pectoris," with symptoms of approaching ossification of the vessels about the heart, producing a painful oppression of the chest, a difficulty of respiration, and appearances of a collection of water.

The news of the suspension of specie payments by the American banks, reached Liverpool by the Europe on the 10th, and was sent by three Expresses to London, and is published in the London Times of the 13th. It did not create much excitement either in England or France.

Four failures had taken place in Liverpool during the week, commencing the 5th, and ending the 12th.—They were all houses engaged in American trade. "Any old man" factoring house in Manchester stopped on the 10th.

The London Times of the 13th of June, indulges in a series of remarks on the suspension of specie payments, charging the Banks and Merchants, and the country generally, with a breach of good faith. The London Courier, on the other hand, speaks of it with more candour, and in a reasoning manner, as originating in the necessity of the case.

The Cholera re-appeared at Naples on the 13th of April. From that date to the 19th May, 226 persons were attacked by it, and of these 117 died.
