KING'S COLLEGE, FREDERICTON,  
December 12, 1837.

The usual Examination of the College and Collegiate School will take place on Tuesday and Wednesday next; and at 2 o'clock on Tuesday a Convocation will be held for admission to Degrees.

On Monday morning last, the 43d Regt. began to move from our Garrison, on their route to Canada. A detachment consisting of 80 men, under the command of Lieut. Colonel Booth, were the first who left, amidst the cheers of a large concourse of the inhabitants, who had assembled to witness their departure; another company followed their companions in arms yesterday morning, under the command of Captain Egerton; and we understand that the whole of the remaining companies will be on their march by Saturday next. We need scarcely add, that the departure of this gallant corps is universally regretted throughout the Province.

The arrival of the English Mail for November, has furnished us with London dates to the 2d and Falmouth to the 4th ult. Extracts will be found in a preceding column.

The Cholera had made its appearance on board the Dreadnought in the Thames, but no new cases had occurred for nine days. Rumours of its existence in a dirty part of the City, called Well Alley, were in circulation.

Colonel Eeles, of the Rifles, is dead. Money is abundant in England, and business brisk.

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On Friday the 8th instant, a deputation from the St. Patrick's Society, of Fredericton, consisting of the President, Vice President, and a committee of ten members, waited upon His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor with the following Address:

The humble Address of the Saint Patrick's Society in Fredericton.

May it please Your Excellency,

At the present moment, when Lower Canada is in open rebellion, caused by the conduct of those factious demagogues who have led the unthinking and ignorant into the horrors of civil war—it becomes the duty of all classes of Her Majesty's subjects to express their detestation of such attempts to overthrow the British Government. We therefore, as Irishmen and British subjects, beg to approach your Excellency with hearts full of loyalty and devotion to our beloved Sovereign; and to assure your Excellency, that, fully conscious as we are of the blessings we enjoy under the British Constitution, we are ready to defend the same to the last extremity. Should, therefore, circumstances arise which may require our best exertions, be assured, Sir, that we shall call upon all our Countrymen, confident of the result, in British North America, to join with us in maintaining at whatever sacrifice the British Rule and these Provinces against anarchy and confusion.

We therefore respectfully pray that your Excellency will, whenever you may see fit, be pleased to call upon us to defend the British Flag with our lives and property.

To which His Excellency was pleased to make the following reply:—

To the Saint Patrick's Society of Fredericton.

GENTLEMEN.—Your Address is truly Irish—it goes direct to the heart, from whence it evidently proceeds.

Though not an Irishman myself, many years of my public life have been passed (and I will add happily passed) in Ireland. At an early period of my residence in that Country, the circumstances in which I was placed gave me peculiar facilities for correctly appreciating the worth of the Irish character. I have publicly said upon another occasion, "treat an Irishman with strict justice and a little kindness, and you will attach him to you with all the ardour of his warm hearted nature." Justice, he, in common with all classes of Her Majesty's subjects, feels a well-founded confidence of receiving under the protection of our unvaried Constitution, in every part of the British dominions; and kindness, when needed, he feels equally assured of experiencing from the Throne; hence his ardent loyalty to the one and his devoted attachment to the other.

In the name of our youthful Sovereign, I thank you, Gentlemen, for this Address. As Her Majesty's Representative, I will accept your proffered services, and will put myself at your head, if circumstances should render it necessary for the Militia Forces of this Province or any considerable body of them, to follow the Queen's Troops to the aid of Her Majesty's loyal subjects in Lower Canada.

Your Excellency may rest assured, that we view with sentiments of sincere regret and deep indignation the rebellious spirit and traitorous designs, openly evinced by Her Majesty's deluded subjects in Lower Canada.

We are fully convinced that our feelings are reciprocated by all our fellow subjects in this rapidly rising Province, and we hail with pleasure the voluntary offers made by the Militia of the County, should their services be required, in consequence of the removal of Her Majesty's Forces from this Garrison.

Sincerely thankful for the blessings which we enjoy under the mild and paternal sway of the Mother Country, and the invaluable privileges, which belongs to us as British subjects, we are determined, in spite of factious demagogues and restless agitators, to transmit these blessings and these privileges unimpaired to those who may come after us.

We shall ever be most ready to co-operate with our fellow Colonists in support of the Queen's authority, the maintenance of the Laws, and the defence of those inestimable civil and religious privileges which our forefathers purchased with their blood.

REPLY.

To the President and Members of the Fredericton Society of Saint Andrew.

GENTLEMEN.—I entirely believe that the members of this Society are surpassed by no class of the Queen's Subjects, in this or any part of Her Majesty's dominions, in loyalty to the Throne, dutiful submission to the Laws, and firm attachment to the British Constitution. Regret and indignation at the conduct of the Rebellious Faction in Lower Canada naturally spring from such sentiments; and that they pervade and actuate the whole of the people of this Province is sufficiently proved by the voluntary offers of Militia service which, as Her Majesty's Representative, have already been made to me.

Happy is the country which is in such a state; more especially when contrasted with that to which a revolutionary faction are using their wicked endeavours to reduce the neighbouring Province.

SAINT JOHN, DEC. 8.

We feel much pleasure in publishing the following Address to His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, from the Magistrates and principal inhabitants of the City of St. John. It is now in the course of signature, and from the Loyal and Patriotic sentiments therein expressed, we feel assured that it will be generally and numerously signed.

To His Excellency Major General Sir John Harvey, K. C. H. and C. B. Lieutenant Governor, and Commander in Chief of the Province of New Brunswick, &c. &c. &c.

May it please your Excellency:

We the Magistrates and the Principal Inhabitants of the City and County of Saint John, in the Province of New Brunswick, deem it our indispensable duty, at a time like the present, when the standard of sedition and rebellion is openly raised in Lower Canada, and when the valuable lives of Her Majesty's Loyal Subjects have been wantonly destroyed while endeavouring to arrest some of the treasonable authors, to express to Your Excellency the high value we place on the inestimable privilege we enjoy as British subjects, and which we are satisfied pervades all classes of Her Majesty's subjects in this Colony.

Convinced that the great body of Insurgents in Lower Canada are deluded by a few factious and designing men, who aim at nothing less than the dismemberment of that fair portion of Her Majesty's Dominions from the British Empire, and who have contrived to maintain an uncontrolled sway over a part of the ignorant peasantry, we know not how to communicate the great indignation we feel at the instigators and abettors of these treasonable proceedings, and earnestly hope that the constituted authorities of the country will be enabled to bring immediately into active service such a force as will put down the rebellion, and by a prompt, firm, and energetic punishment of the Ringleaders, restore public tranquillity.

We offer to your Excellency our services in any way they may be required in this trying emergency. Composed as we are, of the descendants of men who settled this Co-

lony in 1783, under circumstances which can never be forgotten, and of loyal and constitutional subjects, who have adopted it since that period, we need not assure your Excellency, that New Brunswick glories in her loyalty to her Queen and devotion to the British Constitution, and that we are heartily ready and willing at all times to have these sacred feelings and principles put to the test, whenever the public good requires it.

A meeting of the Officers of the Rifle Battalion, City Militia, took place at the Court House on Tuesday last, when they unanimously passed a resolution, tendering their services to His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, in case he should deem them necessary in the present disturbed state of Lower Canada.

We understand that meetings of the Officers of the Saint John Sea Fencibles and the First Battalion County Militia, have also been held, at which similar resolutions were adopted.

We understand that the Officers of the First Battalion, City Militia, met last evening, and, in addition to coming to a resolution, similar to the one already adopted by the Officers of the Battalions above named, determined, for the purpose of making their services more useful when called for, to improve themselves in military discipline, by attending drills twice a week for that purpose.—*Courier, Dec. 9.*

The steamer *Gazelle* arrived yesterday morning from Windsor, with four officers and 100 men of the 85th Regiment.—We understand that on the arrival of the steamer from Eastport this evening, she will proceed to Windsor for another detachment of troops.

**PATRIOTISM.**—We understand that besides upwards of two hundred individuals in the different Parish Houses in this City at present, there are no less than 150 sick and distressed families, comprising more than five hundred souls, assisted in private houses in various quarters of the City, weekly, by the Parish Officers. Much the greater part of this very numerous body of Paupers, &c. are, we understand, emigrants of the present year. So large an amount of pauperism at this early period of the winter is truly alarming, and calls for the adoption of some measures that will, if possible, prevent its increase during the coming inclement season.
