LATER FROM EUROPE.—The packet *Silvie de Grasse*, Capt. Wiederholt, arrived yesterday morning from Havre.—The *Silvie de Grasse* sailed from Havre on 2d ult, but was obliged by head winds to put into Torbay, (Eng.) which port she left on the 5th. We are indebted to the owners of the ship for a London paper of the 4th Jan. obtained at Torbay, and have besides received regular files of Paris papers to the 1st.

The disturbances which occurred in Lower Canada, form as was to be expected, the chief subject of discussion in the London papers. The dispersion of the insurgents at Saint Denis and Saint Charles was known there, but intelligence of the route of those who collected together at Grand Brule had not yet been received. Of course they had neither information of the ridiculous attempt of McKenzie in Upper Canada.—We perceive that *The Morning Chronicle*, evidently writing by authority, endeavours to allay public apprehension. That paper says, that the despatches received from Sir JOHN COLBORNE, represent the outbreak as in no degree alarming, and that he had not even asked for reinforcement. The Ministers, however, seem determined on sending them, as from various quarters, we have accounts of military movements for the British Provinces. Mr. Roebuck, formerly agent of the French Canadian party, when in the House of Commons, had addressed a letter to the British public on the state of affairs in Lower Canada, in which he boldly asserts that the citizens of this country will flock in great numbers to the assistance of the French Canadians, and that our Government has not the power to prevent it!

There was a great fire in London on the 27th of December, on Davis Quay, opposite the Tower. The Warehouses on this quay contained three thousand barrels of turpentine, with great quantities of oil and other inflammable materials, and three brigs lying alongside were also loaded with similar articles. All were destroyed. The fire raged from half past 6 in the morning until 1 p.m.—5000 barrels of turpentine and 600 tons of oil were consumed, besides three brigs and a warehouse full of grain. The oil alone was worth \$200,000. The whole loss was estimated at £120,000, or 600,000 dollars.

The French Chambers have organized, and Mr. Dupin has been again elected President of the Chamber of Deputies. On the coast of Africa and at Constantine, affairs remain in statu quo.

Don Carlos has reviewed a large body of troops, with which he is again about to march to Castille and perhaps attack Madrid.

Letters from Hanover state that the discontents are increasing, and hint at the probability of a revolution. Blood had already been shed. On the 11th of December, the King issued a decree dismissing the seven protesting professors of Göttingen, and banishing three of them from the kingdom. This led to meetings and commotions among the students, who were charged by a troop of dragoons; three of the students were killed, and eight severely wounded.

From the London Morning Post.

The intelligence which reached London yesterday from Canada and the United States, the most important particulars of which we hastened to lay before the public in a second edition, is of a mingled character—partaking in pretty equal proportions of the gloomy and the cheering in relation to the actual position of affairs, and presenting us alternately with sinister and with auspicious omens of the future.

Perhaps the most formidable source of danger brought into view by the advices of yesterday, is the disposition manifested by a part of the people, if not also by the Government of the United States, to make common cause with the Canadian insurgents. Should this disposition prevail to any considerable extent in the American Union, it is clear that the struggle in which Great Britain is involved is a struggle from which there is no possibility of honorable retreat, and which can only be successfully maintained by the prompt, unsparring and energetic employment of the utmost powers and resources of the State!

The *Quebec Gazette*, published by authority, contains a proclamation by His Excellency the Governor in Chief, dated the 7th instant, appointing and commanding "a General Thanksgiving to ALMIGHTY GOD, for having appeased the late seditious tumults, and put an end to the rebellion which has been so lately raised up amongst us, and restored the great and public blessings of peace; to be observed throughout Her Majesty's Province of Lower Canada, on Monday, the twenty-sixth February instant."

The same Gazette contains a Proclamation proroguing the Provincial Legislature from the 19th February to the 19th March next.

From the Quebec Gazette, Feb. 12.

We understand that His Excellency the Governor in Chief has been obliged to postpone his departure in consequence of a hurt received by falling on the ice in the street on Friday last.

The swearing in of Sir JOHN COLBORNE, as Administrator of the Government, will have to be postponed for a few days, as he can only legally act in the absence of the Governor in Chief.

All is quiet in Upper Canada and along the frontier. The Cornwall Observer of the 8th inst. states that Mackenzie was at Ogdensburg on the 6th, harranging the people there. He will, however, get few that will be deceived by him a second time.

DR. GESNER'S GEOLOGY AND MINERALOGY OF NOVA SCOTIA.—This Work has been republished in London—it has been very favourably noticed in the Edinburgh Journal, and reviewed in the London Monthly Review. We understand that the Dr. has some idea of attempting a second and improved edition. There can be but one opinion of the importance of such publications, bearing as they do upon the best resources of the country. They arouse public attention to our capabilities, and betoken a desire for an acquaintance with them, which will direct capital and enterprise to our shores, where they are much wanted, and would find ample and lucrative employment. In encouraging publications which have this end in view, a great deal is done to subserve a patriotic purpose; and we hope the Dr.'s labours in this department of science will at length meet with their merited reward.—*Halifax Times*, Feb. 15.

P. E. ISLAND.—The Legislature was opened on Tuesday the 23d January. The three Members of Assembly, J. W. LeBlanc, W. Cooper, and John Mackintosh, who were placed in custody of the Sergeant at Arms in the last Session of that Assembly, and refused to apologise in the terms dictated by the House, have in the present Session, again been handed over to the above named functionary.—*Idid.*
