

things can no longer be endured; we live near a country where all law, human and divine, is set at defiance, and where neither person or property is safe.

While we are now writing, a salute is firing at Ogdensburg by way of rejoicing at an act, a parallel to which we defy any one to find in the annals of nations.

Colonel Fraser and daughter were on board on their way to Toronto, and it is said had £1,000 in cash which he was taking up. Capt. Armstrong did not see Colonel Fraser among the passengers, and serious apprehensions are entertained for his safety, as the rebels are inveterate towards him.

We have had reports of different meetings among these vagabonds for two or three weeks past, and as long as our Government remain inactive and do not resent these continued aggressions, we shall be liable to incursions and our towns and villages plundered and burnt. They are protected by the United States' Government, and sympathized with and assisted by the people,—it is quite impossible to expect any assistance in apprehending these pirates from the authorities or people on that side.

This frontier, from Cornwall to Kingston, is quite unprotected, and you may expect to hear of further mischief unless we have troops sent there.

The boat was new and cost about £10,000,—the outrage was committed in a United States port, and while peacefully employed in her lawful business.

The gang all dressed and painted, either as Indians or Negroes, rushed on board, some armed with guns and fixed bayonets, some with pistols and swords, and others with an implement resembling a lance or spear on a red painted pole about 8 feet long; they immediately ordered the Captain on shore, placed a guard on the gang-way to prevent the men on shore from returning, and six of them took possession of the Engine Room.

Unfortunately the mate and pilot, Roderick McSwain, had gone to sleep just as the boat made the wharf, and did not awake till the flames burst into his room; he rushed across the deck through the blaze, leaped into the water and swam ashore. Poor fellow, he is now lying in one of the berths of the cabin, on his way to his home in Prescott, with his face, hands and feet very badly burned. It is exciting to look on this victim of these lawless brigands.

ARRIVAL OF CAVALRY.—The transport telegraphed at noon yesterday was the *Arab*, No. 7, Captain Lodge—Lieut. Lester, R. N. Agent—having on board 5 officers, 2 ladies and 3 children, 35 men, 7 women and 12 children, of the 7th ("The Queen's Own") Light Dragoons (Hussars). The *Arab* left Cork on the 5th May and has had, we hear, a very fine passage—no disaster of any kind worth mentioning having occurred. The following are the names of the officers accompanying this detachment:—Captain Thos. E. Campbell; Capt. Chas. McArty, (Pay Master); Lieut. Thos. Paterson; Cornet Jas. M. Hagart; Doctor Warren.

The Cavalry will not land at Quebec; the *Arab* proceeds to Montreal to-morrow morning at 10 o'clock in tow of the British America, steamer.

THE CORONATION.—We are glad to find that preparations are making in this City to celebrate the Coronation of our Most Gracious Queen with becoming spirit. The Common Council, we understand, have determined to commemorate the auspicious event by a Public Dinner, and that the poorer classes may enjoy a share of the good things, two Oxen are to be provided for their entertainment, one to be roasted on Queen's Square on the Eastern side of the Harbour, and the other in the Square of the same name on the Western side. Preparatory arrangements for a Coronation Ball and Supper have also been made; and a Subscription List for a Regatta, to take place on the day appointed for the Coronation, is now rapidly filling up. To allow all classes to participate in some of the festivities of the joyous occasion, we feel confident that there will not be a dissentient voice in this community against proclaiming Thursday the 28th of June a General Holiday in the loyal City of Saint John.—*St. John Courier.*

ARRIVAL OF THE TALAYERA.—On Thursday morning the *Talayera*, 74, Captain Mends, 31 days from Halifax, having on board four companies (comprising about 450 men,) of the 11th Regiment, came to anchor off this Harbour. At two o'clock the steamers *Nova Scotia* and *Maid of the Mist* proceeded alongside the ship for the purpose of bringing the Troops on shore, which they soon accomplished. On their way up the harbour and while marching to the Barracks, the fine Band of the Regiment played a number of national and martial airs, to the no small gratification of a large concourse of our citizens who had assembled at different points to witness their landing. The 11th is composed of a fine looking body of men; the first appearance of both officers and men among us, called forth general approbation, which, we trust, they will always merit.—*Id.*

The *Talayera* sailed this morning for the Mediterranean, (where she is stationed,) with a fine breeze from the N. W.—*Id.*

Lieut. Colonel McGregor, of the 93d Regiment, arrived from Halifax, via Windsor in the *Nova Scotia*, last night. He is on his way to Britain, via in the United States.—*Id.*
