Captain CONROY arrived here early on Friday morning last with Despatches from the Earl of DURHAM, for His Excellency Sir JOHN HARVEY, and returned again on Saturday to Quebec.

Pursuant to notice, a Public Meeting took place at the County Court House, on Friday last, for the purpose of considering the most appropriate means of expressing the public feeling upon the approaching coronation of Her Majesty.

The Rev. Dr. Somerville was called to the chair; who explained the purpose of the meeting. After which the following Resolutions were proposed and adopted.—The first and last were introduced by H. G. Clopper, Esq., and the second and third by L. A. Wilmot, Esq.

1. Resolved that on Thursday next, being the day appointed for the Coronation of Her Most Gracious Majesty QUEEN VICTORIA, the same be kept in Fredericton as a Public Holiday.

2. Resolved that a Public Subscription be taken up for the purpose of procuring Roast Beef and other refreshments for distribution, at such place and in such manner, as may be agreed upon, by a Committee to be appointed for that purpose.

In the evening there will be a Soiree or Tea Party, accompanied with Fire Works; and the Community may anticipate a day of uninterrupted pleasure, in which all ranks of society may cheerfully unite.

From Canadian Papers to the 19th.

The following Militia General Order, issued by the Lieutenant Governor of Upper Canada, will be perused with infinite satisfaction by all who are sincerely desirous, that notwithstanding the various outrages which have been committed by the citizens of the United States, upon the lives and property of the inhabitants of both Provinces, no act of retaliation should have been committed on our part. It will also be satisfactory to perceive by it, that two American gentlemen holding office in the state of New York, who were invited to attend the examination into the circumstance, have declared their conviction, that the firing by the two sentinels at Brockville into the steamboat Telegraph, had been purely accidental.

MILITIA GENERAL ORDER.

It has been reported to His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, that two Sentries, stationed at Brockville, lately fired into the American steam boat Telegraph, while passing up the river St. Lawrence.

The officer commanding, very properly caused the subject to be strictly investigated, in the presence of Mr. Perkins, District Attorney of St. Lawrence County, and Mr. Stilwell, Collector of Oswegatchie; and it has afforded the Lieutenant Governor the greatest satisfaction to peruse the certificate of those gentlemen, in which they declare that the circumstance was purely accidental.

Sir George Arthur, however, cannot refrain from expressing his disappointment at finding that greater precautions were not taken to avoid the possibility of such an accident. It is not enough for a non-commissioned officer to give an order to a sentry—it behoves him to satisfy himself that the order is understood by the sentry.

The Lieutenant Governor, in his Proclamation of the 31st ult. has expressed his conviction, that the utmost justice will be done by the American Government towards the subjects of Her Majesty, who may have suffered from the atrocious outrage committed by a body of ruffians, from the American shore, in the destruction of the Sir Robert Peel, and the plunder and ill-treatment of the passengers.

It was an unprovoked act of wickedness, revolting to human nature; and in that light must be regarded, not only by the Government, but by the respectable body of the people of America, who cannot suffer their shores to be disgraced by the perpetration of deeds so foul, without pursuing the offenders with the utmost vigilance and rigour.

Information has already been received that the outrage upon the Sir Robert Peel was committed by some Rebels, who fled from Canada, conjointly with their wicked associates, who, under the name of Patriots, have bound themselves together to perpetrate deeds of violence, robbery and piracy.

Characters thus disposed always meet their due reward in every civilized nation, at the hands of the ordinary ministers of justice. Whilst, therefore, the Lieutenant Governor undoubtedly expects that the Militia of the Country will continue to perform their duties, as they have hitherto done, with the same zeal and vigilance as Her Majesty's regular Troops; and that whilst every energy must be applied to apprehend and secure the pirates and robbers who are infesting the Islands in the Lakes of the Upper Province, His Excellency at the same time most strictly enjoins, that no act of retaliation or violence be committed towards the peaceable citizens of the United States, or any interruption given to them whilst engaged in the transaction of commercial intercourse, either within the waters or at the ports of Upper Canada.

This order will be read at the head of every corps, or detachment, of the embodied Militia, at two successive parades.

THE DRAWING ROOM.—Yesterday evening the Countess of DURHAM held her first Drawing Room, for the purpose of affording the ladies of Quebec the opportunity of being introduced to Her Ladyship. It is many years since a similar assembly has been held in the Chateau, few remembered the rules heretofore observed, but the ceremony of last night differed from what was formerly the practice and was conducted, we are told, precisely on the plan now in use at St. James'. The Ladies only were introduced and the gentlemen merely made their bows in passing. The Countess

standing near the centre of the room, supported by His Excellency the Governor in Chief on Her left, was attended by Lt. Col. Antrobus on her right, who presented the ladies by name to her Ladyship as they severally advanced to make their curtsies. The Drawing Room opened at 9, and a little after that hour, the Ball-room, from which the Ladies passed into the reception room, was filled with company.

The Aids-de-Camp, and the gentlemen of His Excellency's suit, with the ladies of the family, were in the reception room and stood in rear and to the left of LADY DURHAM. The company entered by the door on the right of the room and passed out by that on the left at the same side; on quitting it they either returned to the ball-room, or descending the stairs entered the supper room, where refreshments were served on tables laid out on three sides of the room, and at the upper end on a beaufet, covered with maroon colored cloth, was a splendid display of family plate, intermixed with numerous cups, both gold and silver, the trophies of many a well won victory on the turf by the steeds of the noble proprietor who is a zealous patronizer of that truly national sport. The rooms were brilliantly lighted with a profusion of wax lights in branches and chandeliers, and having been newly painted and furnished with furniture brought from England, for the purpose, by His Excellency the Governor General, the whole assumed a more palace like appearance, than they have latterly worn. It would not be easy to judge of the number of persons present, but it is not certainly too much to rate them at four hundred persons, for, besides the inhabitants of Quebec, the Officers of the Garrison and of the Ships of war were present, and by the diversity and splendour of their uniforms mixed with the elegant dresses of the ladies, tended greatly to heighten the brilliant scene.

From the regulations for the arrival and departure of carriages, published in the several papers and quietly, though strictly enforced by the new police force under T. A. Young, Esq., aided by the Military, notwithstanding the great number of vehicles no accident occurred, and the whole passed off almost without the slightest confusion. One driver alone, was inclined to be refractory, but he was quickly reduced to order.

We are sorry to learn that letters from various parts of the Frontiers, state, that bodies of men are collecting in Michigan and in Ohio with the avowed determination of making an incursion into Upper Canada. The depredations in the neighbourhood of Kingston may not be connected with these western parties, but they are got up in the same spirit, and we are informed that the authorities have not hesitated to avow, to respectable inhabitants of Upper Canada, their inability to restrain the people in their lawless attempts, and have advised them to be prepared for the worst that may happen.

Extract of a Letter from Kingston, 7th June.

"The Pirates keep up their system of plunder—they have visited the Isle of Tanti and some Mills on the main land, plundered as they went along, and any resistance was punished. Two were severely wounded. They proceeded up to south bay near the Ducks, where the Coburg and Barrie are now standing with soldiers on board, to intercept their retreat. I hope they will succeed. Something has occurred at Brockville, which called for some additional troops this morning, but I do not know what it is; for a wonder all is kept quiet."

We learn from another source that the force above mentioned is commanded by a Lieutenant of the Royal Navy serving under Captain Sandon: the latter officer is at present in Quebec, we understand, with the view to arrangements being made for equipping a naval force on the Lakes for the protection of British commerce against these piratical marauders.—*Mercury.*

From our Montreal Correspondent.

"Montreal, Sunday afternoon, June 10.—James Buchanan, Her Britannic Majesty's Consul at New York, arrived here this morning with despatches for Lord Durlan, received by the packet ship St. Andrew. They go by mail. Nothing new to day."

[Mr. Buchanan has since arrived in Quebec. Extract of a letter, dated Saratoga, June 6. "There is not a soul here that I know, except Dr. Davignon, who is leading Mrs. Papi-neau about, and one or two of her sons."

SARATOGA, 7th June, 1838.
"A gentleman arrived here by an extra-rail-road car, and said he travelled in company with Papineau,—that Papineau came from Philadelphia. At four o'clock this day I saw the arch rebel Papineau myself, so you see he is not dead. He looks quite altered in the face, and seems stouter and more bloated than when I last saw him in Quebec. He walked (seemingly in good health and spirits) with Dr. Davignon and two youngsters, said to be his sons."

A most daring robbery was committed in the ISLE of TANTI, in UPPER CANADA, a few days since, by a gang of about fifteen desperate characters, who have hitherto escaped detection. The individual upon whom the robbery was committed, is a British subject of the name of ROBERT PRESTON, from whose possession a sum of about six hundred dollars was forcibly carried away, and the individual himself, as well as two sons, so severely assaulted and beaten by the robbers, that their lives were considered to be in imminent danger. The villains were armed, and fired several shots in the execution of their lawless purposes. Another man, of the name of PATERSON, residing on the island, was robbed on the same occasion. We are happy to learn that every possible effort has been made by the authorities at KINGSTON to discover the perpetrators of this outrage; and that two steamboats had been despatched in search of them.

The detachment of Royal Sappers and Miners consisting of 50 rank and file, which arrived in the steamer *Der*, disembarked yesterday afternoon and marched up to their barracks. This detachment is composed of very fine looking efficient men who presented no appearance of having undergone a long sea voyage. We understand that they will be lodged in Martello Towers Nos. 2 & 3.

We perceive that an addition of 300 coloured men are wanted for Her Majesty's service, in

order to complete a Regiment now being raised at Chippewa, under Lieutenant Col. Creighton. An application can be made to Wm. A. Maingy, Esq. Ancaster, to whom we would recommend our coloured friends.

From the Albany Argus.

The following is a copy of a "proclamation" recently issued by the leader of the gang that destroyed the steamboat Sir Robert Peel. It was obtained for Gov. Marcy.

"To all whom it may concern—"

"I, William Johnson, a native born citizen of Upper Canada, certify that I hold a commission in the Patriot service of Upper Canada, as commander in chief of the naval forces and flotilla. I commanded the expedition that captured and destroyed the Sir Robert Peel. The men under my command in that expedition were nearly all natural born English subjects—the exceptions were volunteers for the expedition. My Head Quarters was on an island in the St. Lawrence, without the jurisdiction of the United States, at a place named by me Fort Wallace. I am well acquainted with the boundary line, and know which of the islands do, and which do not belong to the United States; and in the selection of the island I wished to be positive, and not locate within the jurisdiction of the United States, and had reference to the decision of the commissioners under the 6th article of the treaty of Ghent, done at Utica, in the State of New York, 13th June, 1822. I know the number of the island, and by that decision it was British territory. I yet hold possession of that station, and we also occupy a station some twenty or more miles from the boundary line of the United States, in what was Her Majesty's dominions until it was occupied by us. I act under orders. The object of my movements is the independence of the Canadas. I am not at war with the commerce or property of the citizens of the United States.

"Signed this tenth day of June, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and thirty eight.

"The Great Western arrived at Quarantine about 3 o'clock, A. M. on Sunday morning, having sailed from Bristol on the 4th inst. By her, we learn that the Sirius reached Falmouth from New York on the 18th ult. after a passage of 18 days.—The Great Western arrived out in 14 days.
