We understand that His Excellency the Major General commanding in this Province, has received despatches from the Horse Guards, expressing Lord Hill's warm approbation of the manner in which Her Majesty's Troops have accomplished the Winter march to Lower Canada; which His Lordship is pleased to consider as in the highest degree creditable to both Officers and Men, as well as to all concerned in the arrangements made for their equipment and accommodation.

We also learn that two Regiments of Her Majesty's Troops are to be stationed in this Province, and that the 30th Regiment may be shortly expected for that purpose.

It affords us much pleasure to state that the Commander of the Forces has acceded to the recommendation of His Excellency Sir John Harvey, by awarding a gratuity to each of the eleven Teamsters who conducted Lieutenant Colonel Booth and the first division of the 43d Regiment round the Lake Timiscouata, on their route to Quebec, in the month of December last; and that the same is payable on demand at the Central Bank of New Brunswick.

## Latest Intelligence.

### HOUSE OF LORDS.

**North Eastern Boundary.**—The Earl of Aberdeen was very desirous of making one remark (before the great question of the evening was brought forward) relative to the north east boundary question. Nothing had been laid upon their Lordship's table on that subject since the report of the arbitration of January, 1831; nor had anything been communicated to Parliament since. Now as some information had been produced before the other House in reference to that subject, he supposed that the noble Viscount opposite would have no objection to lay the same information before their Lordships?

Viscount Melbourne said he would have no objection whatever to the production of the information alluded to.

Money continues abundant and discounts remain at from 2½ to 3½ per cent. on the best bills.—Owing to all anxiety having ceased relative to any collision between this country and the United States, arising out of the steamboat affair, public securities have advanced, and considerable investments of capital have been made in them. Consols have been quoted at 92 1-2 5-8 Money any Account, which is nearly as high prices as they were before the first intelligence from Canada reached this country. When merchandise begins to revive, and capital flows in that direction, then will the funds in all probability go down. Exchange Bills have been 55, 57; Bank Stock has been 205.

**Prosperity of Trade.**—No London Bankruptcy or insolvency appeared in the Gazette of the last Friday in February. This has occurred several times of late.

**The Tunnel under the Thames** is completed within 60 yards of the Middlesex shores.

**Great expedition** is making at Sheerness in fitting out the Hastings 74, the late flagship of Vice-Admiral Sir William Hall Gage, the late commander-in-chief in the Tagus; that vessel having been ordered to convey the Earl and Countess of Durham, family and suite, to Quebec. The Hastings, commanded by Captain Lock, is expected to be ready for sea in five weeks.

**A rumour** is current that the effective force of the navy is to be increased to six sail of the line early in the summer.—*Plymouth Journal*

**The battalions of the Guards** ordered for Canada, and which were to have marched for embarkation on the 16th inst. have received counter orders not to march for six weeks.

**The Cavalry for Canada** take with them from England 20 horses per troop; the horses of the remainder of the men who embark are to be sent to Maidstone, to wait the arrival of the 11th dragoons from India.—*United Service Journal*

**In the army estimates** for this year the levy money for recruits is calculated for 10,000 men; for 1837-8 it was only for 6,000.

**Most severe weather** altogether has been experienced in the Mediterranean and on the coasts of Spain and Portugal, and the damage done to the shipping has been very extensive.

**It is currently reported** in the best informed circles that Mr. O'Connell is about to accept the office of Lord Chief Justice of the Queen's Bench in Ireland, upon the retirement of Sir Samuel Bushe, who has now been upwards of fifteen years on the Bench, and is entitled to the maximum retiring pension of 3,800 a year. The change will take place prior to Easter term.

**Bombay papers** to the 6th January have been received by the overland mail, which state that the plague had broken out with great violence at Delhi.

**Her Majesty's Ministers** have narrowly escaped a vote of censure for mismanagement in Canadian affairs.—In the House of Commons, on the 6th March, Sir William Molesworth moved the following Resolution:

"That an humble address be presented to her Majesty the Queen, respectfully expressing the opinion of this house that in the present critical state of Her Majesty's foreign possessions in various parts of the world, it is essential to the well-being of Her Majesty's Colonial empire, and the more important domestic interests dependent on the prosperity of the colonies that Her Majesty's colonial Minister should be a person on whose intelligence, firmness and capability the House might be able to place reliance; and declaring that, with all due deference to the constitutional authority of the Crown, the House is of opinion that Her Majesty's present Secretary of State for the Colonies did not enjoy the confidence of the House or country."

**To which the following amendment** was moved by Lord Sandon, and, after a warm debate, lost by a majority of 29 in favor of Ministers.

"That an humble address be presented to Her Majesty, expressing to Her Majesty our deep regret that the tranquillity of Her Majesty's Provinces of Upper and Lower Canada should have been disturbed by the wicked and treasonable designs of disaffected parties in those Provinces, by which many of the inhabitants have been seduced into opposition against the authority of Her Majesty. To assure Her Majesty that we have observed, with the utmost satisfaction, the zeal and fidelity which have animated the loyal inhabitants of Her Majesty's North American Provinces, and that we cordially rejoice in the success which has attended Her Majesty's regular troops, combined with the services of the loyal inhabitants. To assure Her Majesty of our continued determination to aid Her Majesty in every effort which she may be called upon to make for the suppression of revolt and the complete restoration of tranquillity in those Provinces, professing at the same time to

afford redress to every real grievance, and to take such measures as shall promote the constitutional government of those Provinces, and shall best secure order and tranquillity, and promote the real interests of all Her Majesty's subjects. Humbly to represent to Her Majesty that it appears, on considering the documents and the correspondence relating to Her Majesty's North American Provinces which Her Majesty has been graciously pleased to lay before this House, that it is the opinion of this House that the defiance of Her Majesty's authority, which has led to a violent rebellion, and the suspending of the Constitutional government in Lower Canada, are in a great degree to be attributed to the want of foresight and energy on the part of Her Majesty's confidential advisers, and to the ambiguous, irresolute, and dilatory course which has been pursued with respect to the affairs of Canada since their appointment to office."

**We notice in the Army Estimates** for the present year, a sum for the erection of Barracks in Halifax.

**NORTHUMBERLAND HOGS.**—A Hog belonging to James Gilmore, Esq., was killed at Douglastown, on the 4th instant. When alive, he weighed 1,155 lbs., and when dead and dressed 1,010 lbs. Last season, the brother of the same animal, when killed, was 18 months old, and weighed 465 lbs., and the mother 398 lbs.; making in all fully Nine Barrels of Prime Mess Pork, which, at its present rate, would be worth £65 currency.—*Gleaner*, April 17.

**UPPER CANADA.**—Sutherland was found guilty on the 3d inst. and was sentenced to be executed.—The Reformers of Upper Canada addressed the new Governor, Sir George Arthur, on the subject of extending the Royal clemency to Sutherland and two others, Lount and Matthews, who are found guilty with him, and to the other prisoners, but His Excellency's answer left no ground for hope. Lount and Matthews were ordered to be executed on the 12th.

**A respectable and numerous** attended meeting of the inhabitants of Bathurst, was held in the Wesleyan Methodist Chapel, on Monday Evening the 2d April.
