

has already through the kindness of Colonel Carter and the officers, entertained the *beau monde* in Edinburgh, by playing in Moray Square, and at the Horticultural Exhibition, both of which places were attended by all the beauty and fashion of the northern metropolis. New arms of a superior description, with browned locks and spring bayonets, have been issued to the Battalion which is in high order.—*United Service Gazette*.

By an official statement laid before the House of Commons, it appears the expenses incurred, on account of the Coronation, are estimated at £70,000. It is said the duties payable to Government on the timber used for the occasion, will amount to a sum equal to the whole of the expense.

Marshal Soult seems to be the Lion of the day in London. He is beset on all sides with breakfasts, dinners and luncheons.

A grand civic entertainment was lately given at Guildhall by the Corporation of the city of London to the foreign princes, ambassadors extraordinary, and corps diplomatique. At this dinner the names of the Duke of Wellington and Marshal Soult, both of whom were present, were coupled in the same toast, which was received with great applause.

The Duke of Wellington briefly acknowledged the compliment. In the gigantic conflict in which he had been engaged before the conclusion of the war, there were no personal contests, no personal animosities. For himself he must say, he felt the utmost respect for the person of his great antagonist, and felt honored by having his name associated with that of His Excellency the Duke of Dalmatia.—(Loud Cheers.)

Marshal Soult shortly returned thanks, and pronounced a high eulogium on his Grace the Duke of Wellington, as the most high-minded, intrepid, and yet generous adversary it was possible to contend with.—(Loud Cheers.) It was in the field of battle, he first learned to estimate the valor and prowess of the British troops; but having since come to England he took the reception he had met with as a fresh guarantee of the cordiality and kindness which existed between the Sovereign he represented and her Majesty the Queen of England. His Excellency again referred to the Duke of Wellington, and expressed a hope that he should be enabled to take revenge on him for the kindness he had received in England, by performing similar offices for him in France.

To-day at 11 o'clock, His Excellency Lieutenant General Sir Colin Campbell, K. C. B., embarked on board H. M. Steamer *Medea*, Captain Nott, for Quebec, on a visit to the Earl of Durham, Governor General of British North America. A guard of honor from the 23d Royal Welsh Fusiliers, received His Excellency on the Queen's Wharf with the customary honors due to his rank, as the Governor of Nova-Scotia. The Field Officers of the Garrison, Members of Her Majesty's Executive and Legislative Councils, and principal inhabitants, escorted His Excellency to the place of embarkation; and the wharves adjacent were thronged with persons who assembled to witness his departure. At 20 minutes past 11 the *Medea* weighed anchor. His Excellency is accompanied on his voyage by his daughter (Miss Campbell) and by Lieut. Colonel J. Leander Starr, one of his Colonial Aides-de-Camp, and Captain Campbell, Military Secretary.—The *Medea* is to call at Charlotte Town, P. E. I. for His Excellency Sir Charles Fitzroy, who also proceeds to Quebec on an official visit to the noble Earl.

J. R. Glover, Esq. and Lady, and Ensign Bazalgette, went passengers in the *Medea*. *Halifax Recorder*, August 11.

PUBLIC HOTEL.—A meeting for the organization of a Company to provide for the erection of a Public Hotel, on an eligible site in the Town of Halifax, was held in the Exchange. The enquiries made by a Committee appointed at a previous meeting were laid open for further consideration. No material obstacles appeared against carrying the contemplated object into execution, and of two sites which were proposed, namely—the vacant lot of ground owned by Mr. Fairbanks, in Hollis-street, and the north end of the block above Dalhousie College, the latter was chosen. Stock had already been subscribed to a considerable amount which was immediately increased to about £7,000. The following gentlemen were then named as a Committee, with authority to purchase the ground and erect a building sufficiently large for accommodation of about one hundred persons, with rooms for public meetings, &c. Hon. T. N. Jeffrey, Hon. H. H. Cogswell, Hon. J. B. Uniacke, Hon. Michael Tobin; Edward Kenney, James Murdoch, and William Young, Esquires.—Henry Pryor, Esq. was appointed Secretary and Treasurer to the Company. The estimated cost of the Building is between eight and twelve thousand pounds. The committee have power to increase the number of shares to one hundred and twenty, and to apply to the Legislature for an act of incorporation if necessary.

Wm. Young, Esq. strongly insisted upon the necessity of the more wealthy individuals of the town subscribing more largely to the undertaking. In reply the Hon. H. H. Cogswell stated his conviction that if the hotel was erected by but a few capitalists, another would be started in opposition to it as soon as it should prove profitable. The Hon. gentleman added, that in addition to his responsibility as one of the Committee, if sufficient stock should not be subscribed, he would undertake to supply the deficiency.

Thus, by these measures for the establishment of an efficient hotel, Halifax is about to be relieved of a severe inconvenience, and a stain upon her commercial importance.—*Recorder*.

NIAGARA FALLS, July 31.

Yesterday, Morreau was executed at Niagara, for being concerned in Short Hills affair—attacking and capturing by night a party of lancers. The execution took place from the drop in front of the jail. A large concourse were present, but the most perfect order prevailed. Morreau is said to be a native of

Pennsylvania—a Roman Catholic. We did not learn that he said much in the very short ride between his trial and execution. A few hours before he was executed, a person named Beamer was carried into the prison, and on his passing the cell of Morreau, the latter remarked of Beamer, "that is the man who brought me to this situation." Beamer, it appears, was the leader of the gang, and enticed Morreau into the snare. The prisoner had been attended since his sentence by two clergymen of his order, but what effect those visits had, I am unable to say.

About 2 o'clock the window was raised, and Morreau and Mr. Sheriff Hamilton appeared on the drop. Mr. H. adjusted the fatal cord, and immediately retired, and before the cap was drawn over the face, the drop fell, and only a slight motion of the hands was discovered. It appeared to be the prisoner's determination not to look upon the multitude assembled, for in coming out of the prison he raised his eyes upward, and kept them in that position until he was dead.

Montreal, Thursday evening, August 9.—A letter from Niagara of the 2nd instant, states, that a young man, an American, was tried the day previous on charges similar to those for which Morreau suffered, and found guilty, but recommended to mercy. Chandler was found guilty on the 2d, of high treason, but also recommended to mercy. The others had not had their trials, and it was supposed they would all plead guilty.

By steamboat we are in possession of the Montreal *Courier* of yesterday, from it we extract the following intelligence from Upper Canada:

The Niagara Reporter furnishes the following in a Postscript—

Saturday, August 4, 1838.

To-day the convicted prisoners were sentenced as follows:—4 Americans for felony, to be executed at the goal, and 12 British subjects to be drawn on hurdles to the place of execution, there hanged and their bodies given for dissection on the 25th inst.

Amongst the Officers considered in Military circles as likely to succeed to the Command of the Forces in British North America, in the event of Sir John Colborne's return, we learn that the names of Lieut. Generals the Right Honble. Sir Frederick Adam and of Sir Benjamin D'Urban, are mentioned.

Yesterday, sixteen soldiers of the 32d Regiment, who had been badly wounded at Point au Pelee Island, arrived in town from Upper Canada, and were embarked last night, on board the *Eagle* steamer for Quebec, on their way to England, having been discharged. Their wounds are reported to be very severe, and to have completely disabled some of them.

PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND, August 8.

We understand that His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor has received a communication from the Earl of Durham, stating that on the receipt of his despatch, communicating information of the outrage perpetrated by an American Fishing vessel, off the northern coast of this Island, in June last, in plundering the wreck of the *Sir Archibald Campbell*, a representation of the circumstances was immediately transmitted to Her Majesty's Minister at Washington; so that we have reason to expect that no means will be left untaken to obtain reparation for the injury inflicted, and to bring the offenders to punishment.

We learn further, that in consequence of the representations made by His Excellency of the inadequacy of the naval force on this station, H. M. S. *Pearl*, Capt. Lord Clarence E. Paget, and the *Charybdis*, Lieut. the Honourable R. Gore, have been ordered to cruise in the Gulf for the remainder of the season, for the protection of the Fisheries, and other British interests.

H. M. S. *Andromache*, from Newfoundland, was going into Quebec on the 2nd inst. as the *Medea* was leaving the harbour. Governor Prescott was not on board the *Andromache*, having been prevented from leaving his Government, as we formerly surmised, in consequence of the Legislature of the Colony being in Session.

Arrived here on the 3d inst., from Gaspe, H. M. S. *Racehorse*, 18 guns, Captain Crawford, and sailed again this morning for Quebec.

H. M. Schooner *Charybdis* arrived from Pictou this morning.

BERMUDA.—The British brig *Queen Victoria*, arrived yesterday from Bermuda. By a paper published there on the 28th, we learn the arrival there of the Canadian exiles from Quebec in H. M. ship *Vestal*. They are admitted on a parole of honor to a residence in the main Island, and will experience no interruption in their excursions to any part of it.—*N. Y. Cour. and Enquirer*.
