

had having been authorised to withdraw them. With respect to any application which had been made for an increased force, he must for the present decline answering the question which had been put to him (hear, hear); and with respect to the desertion of soldiers belonging to Her Majesty's troops in Lower Canada, he was not aware that any accounts to that effect had reached this country, although he knew that attempts had been made, and pains had been taken, by seditious persons in the colony (loud cheers from the Opposition), in order to promote desertion among Her Majesty's troops. With respect to the last question, as to the time when any measures might be brought forward on the subject, he could not now state any positive determination. He could only state what the present opinion of the Government was, but that opinion was of course liable to be varied by the intelligence which might be received from Canada in the meanwhile. But, whatever they might think themselves bound in justice to do, Her Majesty's Government felt deeply persuaded that it was their duty to support in Canada the cause of those who were well affected to the Crown of the country. (Loud cheers.)

We agree with Lord John in thinking that the last of his answers, by far the clearest and most intelligible, was not only not altogether satisfactory to Mr. Leader, who has been graciously pleased to take Lower Canada under his special protection, but as unsatisfactory as it conveys the intimation to that gentleman—and, through him to Messrs. Papineau and Co., that the Queen's Government will—as how could they not—support the Conservatives of the colony in opposition to the Radicals.

That troops on the eve of sailing from England for the Mediterranean have been ordered to Canada every body knows, and that prompt and decisive measures are absolutely necessary. The apprehension and trial of M. Papineau for sedition would tranquillize the whole country; and, as a proof that coercion, and not conciliation, is the cause to be pursued, we have only to turn to Upper Canada, where the vigour and firmness of Sir Francis Head have maintained such perfect peace and good order that he has been able, at the request of Sir John Colborne, Commander of the Forces, to spare him all the regular troops for service in Lower Canada, confident in the loyalty of the militia and the inhabitants of the Province which he governs. It is stated that the first measure which has been adopted is the recall of Lord Gosford himself, which will leave the Government for the present in the hands of Sir John Colborne, the Commander of the Forces, who will thus possess the uncontrolled power of applying those forces in the manner best calculated to carry into effect the decision of Lord John Russell and his colleagues.

The 93d Regiment, which had been under orders for Gibraltar, were about to embark at Cork for Halifax, on its way to Canada.

Sir Francis Bond Head is to be succeeded in the Government of Upper Canada by Colonel Sir George Arthur. This is said to be in compliance with the expressed wishes of Sir Francis. We think it more than probable, however, from recent circumstances, that he will be prevailed upon to continue for some time longer in a situation, the duties of which he has proved himself so eminently qualified to discharge.

It was reported in London on the 1st. December, that Lord Gosford was to be recalled, and that Sir John Colborne was to succeed him as the Governor General of the British Provinces of Canada.

On the 30th November, in the House of Commons, a motion was made and agreed to, that a Select Committee be appointed to inquire into the condition of the poorer classes in the thickly peopled towns, with a view of forming some plan for the improvement of their education and their moral condition.

THE CORONATION.—The English papers announce that the Coronation of Queen Victoria is expected to take place in the month of June next, and is to be solemnized with surprising magnificence.

The Queen had a grand dinner party on the evening of the 22d, at which all the Foreign ministers were present, with their ladies.

A letter from the Cape of Good Hope, dated September 20, mentions the death of the Governor, Sir B. D'Urban. He was ridden over by a horse, and had his skull fractured, causing his death in a few hours.

The Pennsylvania, Captain Smith, arrived at Liverpool, after a passage of fourteen days and a half from New-York. The first land seen was the Skerries fifteen miles inside of Holyhead, which she passed by sounding.

There is nothing of importance from Spain. It was said to be the intention of Don Carlos to recross the Ebro, in the course of a fortnight, with a new expedition of 10,000 men.

SAINT JOHN, Jan. 13.

FIRE!—Last evening about 10 o'clock, a fire broke out in a house in St. Andrews' street, near the Queen's Square, the property of Mr. Clarke, of New York, and at the time occupied by Mrs. Inches, was burned to the ground, with a considerable quantity of the furniture. The flames spread with fearful rapidity, and it was with great exertion that the adjoining houses were saved from a similar fate. The Military and City Engines were early on the spot, and did effectual service. The House, we understand, was insured in the Aetna Insurance Office. A young man, by the name of Foyer was so severely injured by the falling of one of the chimneys that he died this morning.—*Courier*.

Her Majesty's ship Cornwallis is hourly expected to arrive here with the residue of the 34th Regiment, and a part of the 65th from Halifax. It is also stated that the 34th regiment will proceed forthwith to Canada.—*Ibid*.

We have much pleasure in being able to state, that since the Militia have taken the duties of the Garrison, they are highly spoken of by the Town Major, as being most zealous, and particularly correct and alert on their posts; and we have no doubt, under the superintendence of that Officer, they will not be

found deficient in performing the several duties required from them.—*Ibid*.

Large and respectable loyal meetings have been held at Chatham, Miramichi; at Bathurst Gloucester County; and at Picton, N. S. At each meeting Resolutions were adopted expressive of the loyalty of the inhabitants to their Queen, and of their abhorrence at the revolutionary proceedings in this Canada.—*Observer*.

A Queen's Messenger, Mr. Krause, arrived yesterday in one of the Packets, and without delay proceeded to Washington. It is understood that he is the bearer of despatches to Mr. Fox on the subject of the N. E. Boundary.—*N. Y. Tribune*, Jan. 6.
