Your wishes and suggestions upon the subject of the "Metis" Road have, I am happy to inform you, been anticipated by me in the representations which I made to His Excellency the Governor General, during my late visit to Quebec—they shall, however, be repeated—though I do not allow myself to doubt that the necessary improvement in that important communication will be effected at no remote period.

I have thanked you for your kind welcome, I thank you for your good wishes towards myself—but above all, I thank you for that declaration of your devoted attachment to the Government and Institutions of the Mother Country, which I firmly believe will be found unshaken under any trials to which it can be exposed.

To His Excellency Major General Sir John Harvey, K. C. H. and C. B., Lieutenant Governor and Commander in Chief of the Province of New Brunswick, &c. &c. &c.  
The humble address of the Inhabitants of the Lower District of the County of Gloucester.

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY,

The people of this border County, experience a peculiar satisfaction in welcoming the Representative of their Queen. In immediate contact with that Province in which rebellion so lately dared to lift its hand, we feel it our duty to be especially steadfast in those principles by which that rebellion has been so triumphantly crushed; and it has ever been our glory to declare, that venerating the Institutions of Old England, we seek not a change, and while within the fostering influence of British rule, we stand proudly identified with that great nation, whose Constitution and whose Laws are respected by all the civilized world.

Your very recent journey to the seat of the General Government, scarcely permitted us to hope that we should be honoured by your presence during this season. We hail this visit as a proof that personal inconvenience is not regarded by Your Excellency, and that no portion of New Brunswick, however remote, will be overlooked by your energetic administration.

Among the capabilities and natural resources of this County, Your Excellency's military and civil experience will discover the necessity of completing the great line of communication from Halifax to Quebec, now only interrupted between Bathurst and Metis. A Road connecting Her Majesty's North American Colonies, practicable at all seasons of the year, and carried through a settled territory, British beyond all pretence, must be considered an object not merely of Colonial, but National importance.

That New Brunswick may long enjoy the advantages of your administration, and when it shall please Her Gracious Majesty to call you to higher honors, that you may retire from this Province with a consciousness of having administered British Justice in a loyal, a happy, and a contented Colony, is the fervent prayer of Her Majesty's subjects in the County of Gloucester.

Bathurst, 29th August, 1838.

To which address, His Excellency replied as follows:—

GENTLEMEN,  
I thank you for your congratulations on the occasion of my visit to this County, and am gratefully sensible of the compliment which you have been pleased to connect with them, as to my indifference to considerations of personal inconvenience, when an important public duty is involved.

I can truly assure you that I have never been insensible to the important consideration that this frontier County is inhabited by a population which yields to no other in loyalty and attachment to British connexion, and I cannot doubt that the determined manifestation of these sentiments on their part, during the late disturbances in an adjoining Province, was productive of the best effects.

It is highly satisfactory to me to be able to inform the inhabitants of this District that I did not omit, during my late visit to the seat of the General Government, to bring under the favourable consideration of His Excellency our distinguished Governor General, the great importance, as well as an entire Colonial as in a national point of view, of rendering the communications between the Lower and Upper Provinces of British America, practicable and secure. The advantages possessed by that line to which you have drawn my attention, (by "Metis") have not been overlooked by me, and I entertain a confident hope that early effect will be given to my representations upon this subject, in the high quarter to which I have alluded.

I again thank you, gentlemen, for your congratulations and favourable opinions, and trust that whenever and under whatever circumstances my connexion with this loyal Province may terminate, I shall be able to carry with me the consciousness of having done all in my power to promote its happiness and prosperity, locally and generally, and thereby to merit a continuance of the good wishes of its Inhabitants—I can covet no higher reward.

NOTES ON THE FISHERIES, &c.  
We were prepared with further Notes on the Fisheries for this week's impression, but have been led to defer them, and to notice two circumstances, from which all interested in the subject will feel both satisfaction and confidence; and we therefore substitute a notice of them from our other MSS.

First.—The recent visit of His Excellency Sir John Harvey, to and along the coast of the Province on the St. Lawrence, is likely to be of essential benefit; for unquestionably his unwearied zeal, guided by his high intelligence for public good purposes, would not fail to be directed to the Fisheries, nor to mark the scenes where foreign encroachments are there made.

Secondly.—The appearance of vessels of war in the Bay and elsewhere indicate to us, that the wise representations of the Legislature and Chamber of Commerce have at length been listened to by Her Majesty's Government and the Naval authorities on this station—and that an efficient squadron and an energetic system will be maintained to put an entire stop to alien infractions—to protect legitimate trade, and to relieve shipping in distress.

And let us here remind our readers, that during the naval command of the indefatigable and meritorious Admiral Sir David Milne—he visited these coasts, &c. to satisfy himself by personal observation on various matters connected with our maritime interests—and the result was that might be expected from such an able officer, viz. an uncompromising adherence to the true intent and meaning of our foreign treaties, and suitable guardianship to our seafaring industry.

It is not unlikely that before long we may be gratified by seeing the flag of the present-giant Commander-in-Chief, Admiral Sir Richard Paget, flying in our port, after a cruise for a similar object as that of his predecessor of former years, and we trust to perpetuate continued good effects.

I am also induced to postpone the publication of the "Notes" for a time, to allow the proceedings of the meetings at Passamaquoddy, &c. to be made public, and in the hope, likewise, to see their example emulated by our brethren of all the sea-board Counties of the Province, on the St. Lawrence.

We have heard with unfeigned sorrow of the removal of the Rev. I. W. D. Gray, from the present scene of his clerical duties. Domestic affairs, we understand, call for his presence in England. During his residence in this City he has been highly and deservedly esteemed by all denominations of Christians.

Amongst those who have been directly benefited by his ministry he is truly beloved, as the honored instrument of conveying to their minds the most valuable of all instruction, and assisting them by his enlightened and persuasive eloquence to attain the most dignified of all principles. The day was an auspicious one for the spiritual interests of the Established Church, and for the religious welfare of many who have departed this life in sure and certain hope of a glorious resurrection unto eternal life, as well as for hundreds who remain "to this day," on which he commenced the discharge of his holy functions. Although not of the most robust habit, yet he has pursued his work with remarkable industry and zeal, and we may add, under the Divine blessing, with great encouragement and success. His talents and piety, qualify him to do much good in any community; whilst his christian liberty and courtesy secure for him the affection of those who are members of other Churches. We cannot but look upon his removal as a public loss, and most sincerely trust that the distant hope which is held out of his return next spring may terminate in reality.—City Gazette.
