

Yard in Charleston—and returned to New York, without losing his rest, during either night, having travelled by steam boat and rail road, in the ordinary mode of travelling, and at the every-day rate, four hundred and thirty miles, having been absent from that city only thirty-six hours.

The Prince having at New York invited a party to dine with him on board the Hercules, and having chartered a steamboat to convey them to Newport returned to New York for the purpose of joining his party. He was met at the depot in Providence by several of the officers of the squadron at Newport, and the band, who accompanied him to New York for the purpose of returning with him in the boat to Newport. After the dinner the squadron will weigh anchor for France.

Colonial.

From the Quebec Mercury, June 30.

His Excellency Sir John Harvey, Lieutenant Governor of New Brunswick, whose arrival was expected on Thursday, reached Quebec yesterday, having come up from Kamouraska in Her Majesty's Brig *Charybdis*. His Excellency was received on landing by a Guard of Honour furnished by the Grenadier Guards, and a salute from the Citadel. Sir John is attended by his sons Capt. Gerald Harvey of the 70th Regt. and Mr. Harvey of the 34th Regt. His appearance, in good health, and with little alteration in person, afforded great pleasure to his numerous friends who assembled to greet him on his visit to this city where the recollection of his urbanity and good feeling during his residence, when at the head of the Adjutant General's Department in this command, will long be remembered.

It is reported that the *Malabar*, 74, is under sailing orders for Halifax, to return with the 33d Regiment; the *Hercules*, 74, for Port-au-Prince; and the *Andromache*, 28, for Newfoundland. The *Malabar* dropped anchor yesterday to the mouth of the St. Charles, where she remained at two o'clock this day. The *Hercules* and *Andromache* were at the same hour in the positions they have occupied since their arrival. The wind which is from the eastward may probably be the cause of their detention.

Three p.m.—The *Malabar* has sailed.
Five p.m.—The *Hercules*, 74, is now beating out.

Messrs. Papineau, Cote, O'Callaghan, R. Nelson, and twelve others who had fled to avoid the pursuit of justice, are outlawed, and if taken at large within the Province, are to suffer death as guilty of high treason, the same penalty attaches also to the return, without permission, to those transported to Bermuda.

Julbert and the others confined for murder, are excepted from the operation of the Ordinance (and will take their trials in due course), as are also all those who aided in the escape of Louis Lussier, from the prison of Montreal.

The Proclamation allows all political delinquents, with the exception of the persons whose cases are particularly provided for by the Ordinance, to return to their homes upon giving security for their future good and loyal behaviour.

This clemency, it is confidently hoped, will be justly appreciated by those to whom it is extended, by their connexions and by all who have, in a greater or less degree, participated in the late treasonable proceedings. But if, contrary to this just anticipation, they should prove ungrateful and engage in any fresh attempts to disturb the public peace or overthrow the Government, they cannot expect that a repetition of their offence will meet with similar indulgent treatment; but, on the contrary, must expect that their delinquencies will be chastised by that power they have already proved their inability to resist; yet it is to be hoped that none will be found so reckless or so wicked as to disregard the awful warning they have experienced or to return with ingratitude the mercy which the beneficence of our august Queen has extended to these offenders.

We perceive that the Sheriff of this District has offered a reward of £100 for the apprehension of Louis L'Hussier, charged with having been concerned in the murder of Lieut. Weir, and who made his escape from gaol on the 21st instant. Notwithstanding the strict investigation conducted by Mr. Leclerc, as to the manner in which L'Hussier effected his escape, nothing has transpired to throw light upon the mysterious subject. It has been surmised that this wretched individual may have attempted to escape through one of the common sewers of the gaol, and have been suffocated; for that it is impossible that he could have otherwise disappeared, without being seen or heard of by some one honest enough to give information regarding him.

Quebec, June 21.—Sir George Arthur left town on Saturday morning for Hamilton. Sir George Arthur has issued a proclamation requiring every person crossing the frontier to produce a passport.

On Sunday evening the Commodore Barrie called at Oswego on her downward trip, and on making fast to the wharf, a large body of men, headed by a lawyer, rushed on board, and the leader asked Capt. Patterson if Capt. Mosier was on board, as he had a warrant to apprehend him for being concerned in the capture of the *Caroline*.

On Saturday evening about 5 o'clock, a collision took place between the steamboats *William IV.* and the *Brockville*, and from the evidence of the passengers on board the *Kingston*, which was only a quarter of a mile behind at the time, who saw the whole transaction, the collision was intentional on the part of the *William IV.* The *Brockville* was pursuing a straight course, and had a shoal on her starboard side.

The escape of one of the persons accused of the murder of Lieutenant Weir, from the Montreal gaol, seems to have occasioned some excitement at Montreal. The persons lately enlarged, we are told, are all minors, and have given bail for good behaviour during two years.

A report has been current in town since

yesterday, that a vessel from Newfoundland arrived at Grosse Isle, had reported that the Cholera was prevalent at St. Pierre Miquelon, and that 80 persons had died of a day. The Island in that case would soon be depopulated. We believe that a vessel at Grosse Isle has reported cases of Cholera there, and it is not impossible but that it may have been brought by the French fishermen from the Mediterranean. Miquelon is near the eastern entrance of the Gulf of St. Lawrence.

Other accounts say that it is Typhus that prevails at Miquelon, and that it has been very fatal for three months past.

Bytown, June 27.—Military Movements.—Since the publication of our last, every Steamer which has arrived from below has been accompanied with several barges full of men, military and naval, proceeding to the upper part of the Province, via Rideau Canal. On Friday Major M'Bean, with his Company of the Royal Artillery, passed this place on their way to Kingston. On Saturday 150 Sailors and Marines arrived, and were on Sunday forenoon pushed up the Canal as far as the Hog's back. These are intended, it is said, to be placed in armed Schooners on the Lakes above. Besides, drafts for the different regiments above have passed at different times. Rumour with her hundred tongues is of course busy, and each succeeding day brings new reports, none however of such a character as to be relied upon. These movements in our land and sea forces clearly indicate, that whatever may be the result, the commanders are not to be caught unprepared.

Kingston, June 27.—The attack upon Major M'Grath's Lancers, given in our last, has been confirmed. The Lancers soon afterwards attacked the Brigands in the swamp near Chippewa, and took sixteen or twenty prisoners. It was with difficulty that Major M'Grath restrained his men from putting the ruffians to death on the spot;—they are composed of Refugees and Americans. His Excellency Sir George Arthur has gone to the Niagara frontier with detachments of Regulars and Militia.

The *Buffalo Daily Star*, of Friday, has the following rumour:—
"There is a rumour of a fresh insurrection at 'Short Hills,' Canada, about thirty miles from this city. We doubt the extent of killed and prisoners, which have been reported. We shall probably know before our next paper comes out."

From the Montreal Gazette of 30th June.

On the night of Thursday, this City was very generally illuminated, in honor of Her Majesty's Coronation. We observed several well executed transparencies, but the night being rainy, much of their effect was lost. The name "Victoria," was conspicuously displayed on an elevated platform in front of the Court House, under the directions of the officers of the Court. There were, in one or two places, transparencies of the Queen; and the one at Orr's Hotel attracted great notice, being of very superior workmanship. There were, in the course of the evening a great number of fireworks let off; and the Bands of the Royals and 33d Regiments being respectively stationed on the *Champ de Mars*, added much to the festivities of the evening.

There were on Saturday evening, at Montreal, a great many reports of fighting on the Niagara and Detroit frontiers, which could not be traced to any certain source. They have of course got to Quebec undergoing the usual process of multiplication.

From the Toronto Patriot, June 23d.

Last night we received the gratifying news that a party of the Queens Lancers having gone in pursuit of the pirates, nine of them were captured and one (the leader, Chandler) killed. On his person, it is said was found \$1000, and papers. This rascal was shot by Mr. Heath, an officer of the Lancers, who lost his horse by pursuing him into a swamp. These bandits have been brought over by a steamer called the *Red Jacket*, in small parties at a time, and landed a small distance above Chippewa. There are some hundreds of them, who ought to be hunted and treated like mad dogs. The country is all in arms and on the alert, so that we shall soon hear a good account of them. We are concerned to state, that the Lancer who was wounded on the previous evening is dead—his name was Adams and he was a citizen of Toronto. The bravery of the Lancers exceeds all praise.

PROCLAMATION.

UPPER CANADA.

By His Excellency Sir George Arthur, Knight Commander of the Royal Hanoverian Guelphic Order, Lieutenant Governor of the Province of Upper Canada, Major General Commanding Her Majesty's Forces therein, &c. &c. &c.
WHEREAS on the morning of the 21st of this present month of June, a large body of armed men assembled in the Township of Pelham, in the Niagara District, and attacked and plundered a house in that neighbourhood, of a large sum of money, and other property, and fired upon and overpowered a small detachment of the embodied Militia there stationed.

And whereas information has been received by me, that certain evil-disposed persons, connected with the Brigands who have of late molested and disturbed the peace of the American and British frontiers, have crossed Niagara River, and that they lurk and secret themselves in parts of the District of Niagara, with the knowledge and connivance of some of the disaffected resident inhabitants.

And whereas it is necessary for the peace and security of the District of Niagara, that the ingress and egress of idle and evil minded persons should be restrained and prevented, and that the perpetrators of the above outrage, and their abettors, should be brought to condign punishment.

I do therefore strictly order and command all officers, Magistrates, and others whom it

may concern, that no person be permitted to land upon or leave the shore, on the British side of the Niagara River, coming from or going to the United States Territory, unless he shall give a full and reasonable account of himself, and shew that he is coming or going in the prosecution of his lawful affairs and business, which person shall be furnished with a passport, to secure him from further hindrance or molestation.

And I do hereby earnestly call upon all Magistrates, Officers, and other loyal Subjects of the Queen, for their best united exertion in restoring the peace and tranquillity of the Province, in the prevention of crime and disorder, and in the apprehension of the guilty; and I assure them of every support and assistance which may be required for these purposes, to the utmost extent of Civil and Military powers which Her Majesty has been pleased to place in my hands.

Given under my Hand and Seal at Arms, at Toronto, this twenty-second day of June, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and thirty eight, and of Her Majesty's Reign the second.

His Excellency Sir John Harvey has deferred his departure, on his return to his Government until to-morrow, when he will embark, in the forenoon, in H. M. S. *Andromache* for Miramichi or Bathurst.—June 3.

The Capture of three slave vessels.—The Bermuda Gazette of the 26th of May contains a notice of the arrival at Hamilton of Her Majesty's ship *Pearl*, commanded by Lord Paget, having in charge two slave vessels captured by the *Pearl*, towards the close of April—one was the *Brig Diligent*, captured after a chase of sixteen hours.—She had on board four hundred and eighty slaves, besides a crew of forty five men—fourty of the poor slaves had died on the passage. The other was the *Opposition*, and was captured the same day. She had, however, previously landed her slaves on the south side of Cuba.

Another slave, the brig *Camoens*, with five hundred and eighty slaves, had been captured by the British armed schooner *Sappho*.

DAY OF THE CORONATION.

Yesterday Halifax presented a scene of innocent festivity and rejoicing, worthy the metropolis of this loyal and happy province. Every thing combined to render the day memorable. The weather was charming in the extreme—the sun sending down his warmest rays and the delicious breezes fanning you on every side. The expectations of the people were raised to the highest pitch of excitement—indeed it was evident from the crowds which flocked to various points of attraction, that all hearts were attuned for the happy oc-

casion. The morning of the day was auspicious—and when the shades of evening dispersed the multitudes of loyal spectators, all retired pleased and satisfied. Even the children partook of the gaiety and cheerfulness of the day—and a ribbon on their caps with the name of Victoria inscribed upon it, seemed to make them flit about more proudly and happily. One feeling of exultation pervaded all classes—the poor were blessed, and the rich were not less delighted—the groups of young in their holiday attire were all mirth and cheerfulness, while now and then you would meet with a very aged individual, who appeared for the joyous time to have lost the weight of years. The 28th of June will not soon be forgotten—nor will Halifax soon witness another day, so marked by generous loyalty and universal rejoicing.

For the benefit of our distant subscribers we may give an outline of the proceedings, in honor of Her Majesty Queen Victoria's Royal Coronation.

On Wednesday evening the Irish Society roasted an Ox on the common. At sunrise on Thursday the Militia Artillery fired a royal Salute three times repeated. At 8 o'clock A. M. the Vessels in port exhibited their colors—flags of every description were displayed from the Exchange, Custom House, Dalhousie College, Province Buildings and the Churches. 'Merry Peals' were rung and continued at intervals until 11 o'clock, A. M. At 12 o'clock His Excellency Sir Colin Campbell reviewed the troops in Garrison—three rounds were fired and three hearty cheers were given by the Soldiers to Victoria their Queen. At half past one o'clock the Nova Scotia Philanthropic Society left the parade in front of Dalhousie College, and went in procession to the Government House, where they gave three most hearty cheers to the Queen. At three o'clock a Procession was formed in the following order:—

Companies of Militia,

And his colored brethren.

This procession moved from the Parade to the upper side of the Government House—where each Society halted and gave three loyal cheers for the Queen; after which they proceeded to the Common and dispersed. Tents were erected on the Common provided with Beef, Bread and Porter for gratuitous distribution. During the afternoon various sports and amusements gave life and animation to the thousands who thronged the Common. At dusk the Province Building, Dalhousie College, the Engine House, Carpenters' Hall and a few private houses were brilliantly illuminated. The Engine House with its number of transparencies and covered with evergreens, attracted general attention. A transparency of the Nova Scotia Philanthropic Society was conspicuous in front of Dalhousie College.

At 9 o'clock a succession of splendid fireworks were displayed on the grand Parade.

Thus closed the memorable day of the 28th of June. All the festivities of the day passed off with great spirit and hilarity. It was a holiday of the people and as such was richly enjoyed. Generally we believe, all were orderly, peaceful and quiet. In short, many, many years may elapse before Halifax will witness so bright and triumphant a day, as that on which Victoria was crowned Queen of all the British Dominions. *Victr Regina.*

His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor in the exercise of the royal prerogative, on the day of the Coronation, released from prison a number who were confined in the bridewell and jail. A dinner was also provided for the poor, and for the inmates of the places of custody above mentioned, from the funds under the management of the General Committee.

HORRID MURDER.—Intelligence was received by Mail on Saturday of a horrid murder committed at the River Philip, in the County of Cumberland, early on Thursday morning last. We have been obligingly favoured with the perusal of a letter from Amherst, dated on Sunday, giving the particulars of the dreadful crime which had been perpetrated, and at the same time the gratifying information of the arrest of the supposed murderer. A Farmer of the name of John Clem, one of the victims of the assassin, formerly of King's County in this Province, it appears had for some years resided on the South side of the River Philip, several miles from its mouth. He was an industrious man, of parsimonious habits, and unmarried, Jane Pipes, a Widow, lived with him as Housekeeper; and at the time the sad event occurred, her daughter, about 11 years of age, was on a visit to her.

On the morning of the 28th June, one of the Settlers in the neighbourhood went to the House for the purpose it is said, of procuring Potatoes—he knocked several times without effect—then opened the door and entered the hut—the scene presented was beyond description—there were Clem, the Widow Pipes, and her child, all weltering in blood, and, apparently in the agonies of death; Clem's head presented several mortal wounds, and his body was much mangled, he was still breathing, but expired in a few hours—Mrs. Pipes' head appeared to have been beaten, "apparently to a jelly," and one of the shoulders of the child was driven downwards upon her body—no hopes were entertained of the Widow's recovery, but the Child's life is not altogether despaired of.

Suspicion fell immediately upon one Doyle, who had been a servant to Clem, and had been discharged only the day preceding the murder.

Intelligence of the horrid circumstance was received at Amherst at 4 o'clock in the afternoon of the 28th, while the good people of the Township were celebrating the Coronation of their QUEEN—it was soon known that the suspected Criminal had passed through the Settlement that morning, on his way, as was supposed, to St. John. A Warrant for his apprehension

was issued, and officers were sent in pursuit of him. Joseph Avar, Esq. a Magistrate of Westmoreland, N. B. and Mr. Aea Filmore, of River Philip, much to their credit, also volunteered their services. On Saturday afternoon the latter Gentlemen returned to Amherst, having Doyle in custody, who, after undergoing an examination, was committed to Jail. The writer mentions several other circumstances tending to strengthen the suspicions against the Prisoner, which at the present moment we think it prudent to abstain from publishing—he is now in the hands of justice, and his guilt or innocence will soon be established.—*Halifax Royal Gazette.*
