Miscellaneous.

COINAGE.—Coins are generally completed by one blow of the coining-press. These presses are worked in the Royal Mint by machinery, so contrived that they shall strike sixty blows in a minute; the blank piece, previously properly prepared and annealed, being placed between the dies by part of the same mechanism. Of these presses, and of the other machinery, and operations used and carried on in the Mint, an excellent account, with illustrative engravings, has been given by Mr. Mushet, in the Supplement to the Encyclopedia Britannica. The number of pieces which may be struck by a single die of good steel, properly hardened and duly tempered, not unfrequently amounts at the Mint to between 300,000 and 400,000, but the average consumption of dies is of course much greater, owing to the different qualities of steel, and to the casualties to which the dies are liable: thus, the upper and lower die are often violently struck together, owing to a fault in the layer-on, or that part of the machinery which ought to put the blank into its place, but which now and then fails so to do. This accident very commonly arises from the boy who superintends the press neglecting to feed the hopper of the layer-on with blank pieces, if a die is too hard, it is apt to break or split, and especially subject to fissures, which run from letter to letter upon the die. If too soft, it swells, and the collar will not rise and fall upon it, or it sinks in the centre, and the work becomes distorted and faulty. He, therefore, who supplies the dies for an extensive coinage has many casualties and difficulties to encounter. There are eight presses at the Mint, frequently at work for ten hours each day, and I consider that the destruction of eight pair of dies per day (one pair for each press), is a fair average result, though we much more frequently fall short of than exceed this proportion. It must be remembered, that each press produces 3600 pieces per hour, but making allowance for occasional stoppages, we may reckon the daily produce of each press at 30,000 pieces; the eight presses therefore will furnish a diurnal average of 240,000 pieces.—*Brande's Journal.*

ANECDOTE OF A DOG.—A small pet dog, belonging to a gentleman in Fife, lately had six pups, one of which died, and was buried in the garden. Soon after another took ill, and seemed likely to die also, when the mother carried the miserable creature out to the garden, scraped a hole, in which she deposited her offspring, and had proceeded to replace the earth, when her master entered, and, being attracted by a puppy cry, went up to the spot, and found the ailing pup nearly buried. There can be no doubt that the dog acted upon the principle of imitation.

NATURAL AFFECTION OF A LAMB.—In the year 1810, a small enclosure in Leith Links, employed for keeping a few sheep, was broken into, and a ewe abstracted, the head of which was left by the depredators on the outside of the paling. In the morning, her lamb, only two days old, was found by the keeper standing over this relic of her parent, as if lamenting her fate, and could only be brought away by force.

PLOUGH AND HARROWS.—A clergyman in one of the agricultural districts of Scotland had busied himself in producing an improved plough, about which he was for some time very "full," as the Scotch say, and accordingly, wherever he was, he was sure to overflow in reference to the subject. He afterwards employed his busy brain in editing a school Horace, of which for some time he was also very "full." Calling one day upon a farmer in the neighbourhood, he said, "Well, have you seen my Horace?" "Na, Sir," quoth the Agriculturist, "I haena seen your harrows; but weel I kent your plough."

Payne be appointed Stipendiary Constables, to examine and report upon the state of the Taverns in this County, and to see that the Rules and Regulations for the government of Tavernkeepers are strictly enforced, and to detect offenders against the law to regulate Tavernkeepers and Retailers of Spirituous Liquors, and the illicit sale of Spirits, and also to carry into effect the provisions of the Act to prevent Forestalling and Regrating. York General Sessions.

JANUARY TERM, 1838.

WHEREAS in and by the third Section of an Act of the General Assembly of this Province, made and passed in the first Year of the Reign of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, intitled "An Act to repeal all the Acts in force relating to Trespasses, and to make more effectual provision for the same," the Justices of the Peace in their General Sessions are empowered to make such other Regulations as shall be most expedient and agreeable to the nature and circumstances of the several Counties, Towns and Parishes: And whereas it has been made to appear to this Court, that the allowing SHEEP to run at large on the Public Streets and Highways is attended with great damage and inconvenience:

Be it therefore ordered, That no Sheep be allowed to run at large on any of the Public Streets or Highways within the County of York, between the 1st May and 1st November, in each and every year, under a penalty of Sixpence for each Sheep so running at large.
