In the front of the Maltese cross which is in front of the crown is the enormous heart shaped ruby, once worn by the chivalrous Edward, the Black Prince, but now destined to adorn the head of a virgin Queen. Beneath this, in the circular rim, is an immense oblong sapphire. There are many other precious gems, emeralds, rubies, and sapphires, and several small clusters of drop pearls. The lower part of the crown is surrounded with ermine. It is upon the whole a most dazzling and splendid crown, and does infinite credit to those by whom it has been designed and put together. Her Majesty has expressed herself highly pleased with it.

With a condensed account of the Coronation of Her most gracious Majesty Queen Victoria, we present our readers with new cuts of the Royal Arms, from an Official Print.

### SAINT JOHN, August 4.

MELANCHOLY CATASTROPHE!—A most melancholy catastrophe, attended with the loss of no less than Nineteen human lives, occurred in the vicinity of this City on Thursday morning last. It appears that a party, consisting of twenty-five persons, mostly women and children, belonging principally to Portland, started in a boat at an early hour in the morning, for the purpose of proceeding a short distance up the River Saint John to gather Berries, (a custom usual at this season of the year,) and were rowing through the smaller passage in the Falls, between five and six o'clock, when the boat struck on Hunt's Rock, then under water; the tide running rapidly up at the time, she immediately swung round and capsized, precipitating all on board into a part of the river abounding with eddies and whirlpools, and in which it is difficult even for the most expert swimmers long to sustain themselves. The consequence was truly awful: of the twenty-five persons on board, only six were able either to reach the shore, or to keep themselves afloat until the few who had witnessed the frightful disaster could come to their aid. Their names are:—

Sampson Manaton, Richard Heanes and son, and William Young, James Murray and John Trennaman, (three youths). Those who perished were—Mrs. Heanes and five children, Mrs. Manaton and four children, Mrs. Trennaman and daughter, Mrs. Osborne and son, Miss Hale, Miss Adams, Miss King, and Thomas Stevenson.

This sad dispensation of Providence has caused a general feeling of sorrow and regret to pervade the city and vicinity. Nearly all who were in the boat were family connections, and from their names it will be seen that several families have been almost entirely swept away,—the father of one and the father and one child of another only surviving. Three of the females, we learn, were sisters of Mr. Hale, Ship-builder, of Portland;—another was a daughter of the late Josiah Adams, of Portland; and all of them have doubtless left many sorrowing relations and friends, who will long deplore their sudden and untimely death.

The bodies of Miss King and an infant child of Mr. Heanes were found soon after the accident, but too late to restore the vital spark. A Coroner's Inquest was held immediately and a Verdict of Accidental Death unanimously returned. We have not heard that the bodies of any of the other sufferers have since been recovered. Miss King was in the 63d year of her age.

WE have lately had repeated complaints respecting the irregular delivery of the Gazette in Saint John. We have again to repeat that the papers for our subscribers in that City are sent from the office on the day of publication, by the evening steamers; and these vexatious occurrences can only be accounted for by a circumstance which accidentally came to our knowledge, viz.—that our last week's parcel for St. John had been three or four trips up and down the River before it reached the Post Office. We leave our friend of the Chronicle to say who is to blame.
