I congratulate myself upon the visit which I have paid to this beautiful settlement, the admirable state of your road of communication with Fredericton, (over which I have passed with ease in four hours); the excellent quality of your farms and the flourishing state of your crops, and I will add the entire contentment exhibited in the countenances and demeanour of all around me, are circumstances in your condition for which I was not altogether prepared. I rejoice in and congratulate you upon them, and having thus made your acquaintance, I desire you to consider me as a friend who will always be ready and happy to promote your interest.

From what I have this day witnessed of the actual condition of this fine settlement and of the loyal and truly British sentiments by which the settlers are animated, I do not hesitate in expressing my entire conviction that nothing can retard the rapid development of the agricultural resources of this highly favoured and beautiful region—with that development, the individual welfare of each of you is identified; and it may not be unsatisfactory to you to receive from me a further assurance, that in your loyalty to the Queen and attachment to the Parent State, involving as these sentiments do submissive obedience to the Laws, the Inhabitants of Stanley are surpassed by no other portion of Her Majesty's subjects in New Brunswick.

We would caution the public to be on the alert, in consequence of a daring and desperate gang of unprincipled characters, who are at present lurking about the town and neighborhood, and who have within the last week committed various depredations on the goods and property of the inhabitants. The shop of Mr. J. O'Neil was broke into and robbed of clothing to the amount of £30. The shop of Mr. N. Murray, Tavernkeeper was also entered, and upwards of £60 in money extracted from his desk, besides several watches and other articles, with which the thieves decamped. We have also been informed that a robbery was committed in another dwelling in town, and a considerable sum of money stolen from one of the lodgers, but we cannot give the particulars. The proper officers are making every exertion to discover the robbers, but no clue has yet been found of their hiding place. We understand that several robberies have been committed of a similar character at the Oromocto, attended with some personal injury.

**FURIOUS DRIVING AND LOSS OF LIFE.**—On Saturday last a party of our townsmen with their wives and families, crossed the river and proceeded some distance up the country, in three waggons, on a pleasure excursion, and on returning homeward they hit upon the rash and dangerous experiment of urging forward the horses at their full speed in order to gain a small sum of money which was offered to the driver who should first reach the Ferry landing, by which means the foremost waggon upset, and the next in succession, coming in collision with it, the inmates of both were thrown with great violence to the ground. Several of the persons, male and female, were more or less bruised, and we regret to say, that Mr. John M'Lauchlan was so much injured from the effects of the fall, that he survived but a few hours after the accident occurred. Mr. M'L. was a respectable inhabitant of this town, and his sudden and lamentable death, has occasioned much regret in the community. He has left a widow and three children—an aged father and mother, and a numerous circle of relatives to lament their loss. His remains were interred on Monday last numerous and respectfully attended.

We cannot close the above remarks without stating that the public good requires that the Law should be rigidly enforced upon all who are in the habit of racing on the streets and highways: for this dangerous practice has become so frequent and notorious, that it is matter of astonishment to us that more lives have not been sacrificed by the wanton disregard of the wholesome regulations which are in existence to prevent this crying evil, and which we hope are long to see made more penal.

A Coroner's Inquest was held on Sunday last on view of the body of Mr. J. M'Lauchlan. Verdict—"Accidental Death, occasioned by imprudent driving on the highway."

The weather during the last few days has been excessively warm; on Friday at one o'clock the thermometer stood at 93 in the shade.

At a Meeting of the Directors of the Central Bank, held on Monday the 27th inst., it was RESOLVED, That in future this Bank will receive and pay Sterling Silver only at the rate of *One Shilling and Two Pence* per shilling, sterling, being the same rate at which it now passes current in Saint John.

#### CHURCH SOCIETY.

MEETING OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE.  
August 13, 1838.

Extract from the Minutes.

The Archdeacon lays before the Meeting a communication from the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel, dated July 4, 1838, in reply to the application made by the New Brunswick Church Society, for aid in providing Missionary visits to neglected places in the Province, stating that the Society had Resolved.

"That it will use its best endeavours to engage four travelling missionaries to be employed in the Dioceses of Quebec and Nova Scotia, and will allow to such Missionaries salaries of £150 a year, provided that all the actual expenses of travelling be defrayed from local funds."

Whereupon it was unanimously resolved, That the Archdeacon do express the

"heartfelt gratitude of this Committee for this new instance of the Society's benevolent attention to the wants of the Church in this Province, and assure them that, to the full extent of the means already at their disposal, and of whatever additional means they may be enabled by the most strenuous exertions to procure, the Church Society of this Archdeaconry are ready to assist in this most useful and necessary work. They gladly and thankfully engage to pay the travelling expenses of such clergyman as the Society shall appoint for this duty, and earnestly pray that the appointment may be made as soon as possible."

The Committee then took into consideration the applications which had been forwarded for assistance to Sunday Schools; but as a few only of these were found to have been sent in agreeably to the notice issued by order of the General Meeting, and contained in the 6th page of the second report, they felt themselves obliged to direct that further information be requested from several of the local Committees, and to defer till the arrival of that information the appropriation of considerable part of the sum placed at their disposal for this object. They resolved that the sum of £20 should be divided in equal portions among the Sunday Schools of Kingston, Springfield, Saint Stephen's, Sussex Vale, and Fredericton.

It was further resolved, That the Archdeacon be requested to adopt such measures as may appear to him best calculated to procure speedy payment of the subscriptions to this Society which are now in arrear, and to procure further subscriptions, and also to impress upon the Clergy of the Province the necessity of exerting themselves in their respective missions to the same purpose.

**VISIT OF HIS EXCELLENCY.**—We understand that His Excellency Sir John Harvey is expected here on Friday next, and purposes leaving in the Cape Breton the following day, to visit the Counties of Gloucester and Restigouche. We have not learnt what stay His Excellency intends making in Miramichi on his return, but we trust it will be for a few days at least, to enable him to form, by his own personal observation, some idea of the population, trade, &c. of the place, as well as of the natural resources of the country, which only require the fostering care of Government, and the free exercise of capital to bring them into active operation.—*Miramichi Gleaner*, August 21.

**THE MAILS.**—We are glad to find that in future there are to be three Mails, weekly, between this City and Halifax;—the third is to be conveyed by the land route, and will leave Saint John every Saturday evening.

A great saving appears to have taken place in the time formerly occupied in travelling from Halifax to Saint John, by land. The distance, which occupied three or four days, was accomplished we are informed, this week, by the *Harvey Stage Line*, in about forty eight hours!—*Saint John Courier*.

We understand that Mr. A. KUREK, one of the Polish Exiles, now in this city, is preparing a splendid Dressing Case, constructed of beautiful Stained Straw work, which is to be presented to Her Most Gracious Majesty VICTORIA, in which will be enclosed a *New Brunswick Grand Coronation March*, composed by A. Kurek, and arranged for the Military Band of the gallant 11th Regiment, by the celebrated Harmonist, Mr. Castaldi. The article will be left in our Reading Room next week, for the inspection of the curious. It is presented by Mr. K. from respect to our Nation, and in honour of our Maiden Queen.

**DARING ASSAULT AND BATTERY.**—On Tuesday evening last, a little before eleven o'clock, as Mr. Samuel M. Chamberlain, of this City, was crossing King's Square, on his way to his Lodgings, he was assaulted by a person from behind, from whom he received so severe a blow as to fell him to the ground senseless,—and on coming to after the lapse of a few minutes, he found himself relieved of a small Trunk, which he held in his hand at the time, containing about £30 in Bank Notes. When such daring acts of villainy can be perpetrated in the heart of our city, and at so early an hour, without the fear of detection, it behoves every citizen, in the absence of other protection, to devise means for the defence of his life and property.—Such a state of things as the present we hope will not much longer exist; but it can only be remedied by a more efficient police establishment.—*Gazette*.

The steam ship *Great Western* left New York on the afternoon of Thursday the 16th instant, for Bristol. In going out she saluted two French vessels of war, then at anchor in the harbour; both returning the compliment. She carried out \$2000 worth of letters, (\$500 more than she brought,) and about ninety passengers, among whom were Capt. H. Bagot, R. N., bearer of despatches from the Earl of Durham; the Rev. F. W. Miles, of Fredericton; and Mr. B. Tilton, of St. John.—The afternoon was wet and rainy, and excursions down the harbour, which has been advertised for the occasion, did not therefore take place.

At the time the *Great Western* went to sea, the wind was blowing a gale directly ahead, yet she went safely out upon the great deep, made a good offing, in spite of wind or weather. In the morning the wind became fair, and she is now steadily pursuing her course to a termination, which we trust will be both safe and speedy.

**GEOGRAPHY AND HISTORY OF NOVA SCOTIA.**—We have with much pleasure received a well written and neatly printed little volume, bearing the above title. The work is compiled by Mr. John Crosskill, of Halifax; and in 70 pages, contains more historical information on our own country, than will be found in any other work of twice its size. The book, with a map of Nova Scotia, Prince Edward Island, and part of New Brunswick, is sold at 1s. 6d. per copy, or 15s. per dozen, and is highly deserving of the patronage of teachers and parents.—*Pictou Mechanic & Farmer*.

H. M. S. Pearl sailed yesterday morning on a cruise to the Fisheries.

H. M. S. Talavera, arrived at Gibraltar on the 1st July, in 19 days from St. John, N. B.

About 9 o'clock yesterday morning Admiral Sir Charles Paget hoisted his flag on board H. M. S. Inconstant, and the *Cornwallis* immediately beat out against a light breeze from the North east. About two hours after the wind came round to the west.
