to Agricultural pursuits, which can never fail of conferring upon the industrious Farmer present competence, health and contentment, and a prospective honorable independence for himself and his children.

To the Province at large the benefits which must accrue to it from a steady adherence to that pursuit are incalculable, and I will accordingly add that if in the course of my late progress I have been filled with admiration at the abundance and extent of the varied resources which have presented themselves to my observation, and have seen the elements of commercial wealth which every where are opened to the enterprise of your Merchants, in its Fisheries, Forests and Mines, I have still rested upon the pleasing conviction that New Brunswick possesses a soil and a climate which are capable not only of richly rewarding the labours of the Agriculturist, and of rendering her population independent of all foreign supplies, but which must ultimately, and I would hope at no remote period, render Agriculture the leading interest of the Province. In the meantime it is a reflection and a conviction of the most gratifying kind that if due encouragement be given to them by the Executive and Legislature, there is no branch of industry in which its inhabitants can engage in which that industry can fail of reaping an ample reward.

Among the most prominent objects of local interest as respects this County, and of general importance to the whole Province, as you have observed, are the projected improved communication between Halifax and Quebec, and the connecting of the waters of the Bay of Fundy with those of the St. Lawrence. Both these objects have received and shall continue to receive my closest attention, and I am happy to be able to inform you that the former is in favorable progress.

The renewed assurances of your devoted attachment to the Throne and Constitution of our Glorious Country, are most acceptable to me, and will be conveyed to our Gracious Queen.

For myself, for Lady Harvey, and for my family, I tender you my grateful acknowledgments for your good wishes.

Under the Commissions issued for New Brunswick and Nova Scotia, Major Head has been appointed an Assistant Commissioner and despatched to those Colonies for the purpose of taking evidence. He is instructed to return to the Seat of General Government by the beginning of October. Mr. Hanson, the other Assistant Commissioner with the Secretary of the Commission, are on their way to Toronto, for the purpose of making the necessary inquiries in Upper Canada. It is expected that the Commissioners will have concluded their investigation by the beginning of October, and that they will make their Report before the end of that month. We are informed that the Report, with the Minutes of Evidence, will be published for the information of the Colonies, before it is transmitted to England.—*Quebec Mercury, Sept. 1.*
