### KING'S COLLEGE, April 3, 1838.

We have much pleasure in complying with the request of the Gentleman, who furnished us with a copy of the annexed letter for publication in the Royal Gazette:—  
"Montreal, March 24, 1838."  
"Sir:—I have just been made aware of the very handsome grant of money, voted by the House of Assembly of New Brunswick, to relieve the Soldiers Wives who were left at Saint John, when the 85th Regiment was ordered to proceed from thence to Lower Canada in December last.  
"Be pleased to convey to the Honorable House my grateful sense of the assistance thus afforded by them. The kindness received from the inhabitants, by the different divisions of the Regiment on their march through the Province, demands also our warmest thanks. Without that claim to their friendship which a long residence amongst them might inspire, the just cause which we were about to maintain was deemed sufficient reason to extend it to us. Generosity is the character of Britain and her sons, and the generous conduct of the people of New Brunswick adds to the many proofs

they have given, that theirs are truly British hearts.

"It is gratifying to find that in asserting the supremacy of our most gracious Sovereign, Her Majesty's troops are acting in unison with the feelings of her loyal subjects in the North American Provinces, who though resident at a distance from the shores of old England, reverence her institutions, and are prepared to defend the genuine freedom which they secure.

The Honorable the Speaker of the House of Assembly, Fredericton, New Brunswick.

We understand that several Brass Field Pieces, have been ordered to be forwarded from Nova Scotia to this Province. Two of these, with all the necessary equipments, were received in this Garrison on Tuesday last, by the steamer *Nova Scotia*, from Annapolis.—*Saint John Courier*, March 31.

HALIFAX, March 28.—H. M. Ship *La Pique*, Captain Boxer, will sail on Saturday next for St. John, N. B. with the remaining portion of the 65th Regiment.

Her Majesty's ship *Vestal*, arrived on Tuesday morning, in 23 days from Cork, bringing 180 soldiers, part of the complements of the 65th and 93d Regiments.—The *Hercules*, 74, which sailed four days previous, arrived this morning, and brings portions of the 15th, 34th, 65th, and 85th Regts. in all about 400 men.

The *Minden*, 74, had sailed from Gibraltar for Bermuda, with the 11th Regt. recently stationed at Zante.

The *Vestal* only brings Portsmouth dates to the 26th February.

The *Inconstant* Frigate is reported to have arrived at Portsmouth from Halifax.

The Circassians are preparing for an incursion into the Russian territory.

The influenza has lately made a dreadful havoc in the Russian capital.

### From the Montreal Gazette.

The following extraordinary document has been handed us for publication. It discloses some of the views and plans the "Commander in Chief of the Patriot Army," who has lately threatened our Province with invasion, and acquaints us with the desertion of Mr. Papineau from the cause of the Canadian Republic.

Plattsburgh, Sunday, 25th February, 1838.  
Dear Sir,—I know not when you may receive this, but as I may have very little time hereafter, I avail myself of this spare moment to convey to you one request, and send a few of the Resolutions of the Provincial Government of Lower Canada,—which I am desirous you should distribute in your part of Canada, to the best advantage. According to agreement, Mr. McKenzie, with a large force and well provided for war, took up his march towards Upper Canada on Friday morning; his army was safely encamped near Gananoque, about eighteen miles below Kingston, and last evening a ship from Montreal came to hand, saying that he had taken Kingston.

This news, we are assured, was confirmed by a despatch from Sir John Colborne to General Wool, at Champlain, this morning.  
On the first report of Mr. McKenzie's movements at Watertown, all the spare troops possible were sent on towards Upper Canada, and this morning we hear that Sir John is on his way thither, having taken the largest number of regulars he could with him. We have so arranged that Wool and Colborne are under the firm persuasion, that we have secretly sent on our men and means to the assistance of Mr. McKenzie, and this is confirmed by the apparent absence of our men and ammunition. We are informed, on this evening, Wool will move west, to guard the St. Lawrence frontier, disregarding us—that will much facilitate our entry into Lower Canada on Monday night and Tuesday morning.

Our force is abundant for our purpose—and, if you can possibly co-operate, our success will be of easier attainment. I would advise you to make your way with all possible speed to Three Rivers, if you have men enough, where we shall, by rapid movements, join you, after having secured Montreal—if your force is insufficient for this first route, then make your way to St. Hyacinthe, and thence to Sorel, where you may take up quarters until you receive instructions—if again your force is still less, move on with what you can muster to Missisquoi Bay, Saint John's and Laprairie, collect all you can of fire arms. Papineau has abandoned us, and this through selfish, and family motives regarding the Seigniories, and invidious love of the old French bad laws.  
We can do well without him, and better than if we had him a man only fit for words, but not for action. We have the most positive assurance of a lively and cordial reception on our arrival. We have named you a Captain, but I do not send the commission now, it is unnecessary.

This letter corroborates the intelligence conveyed in a letter from a recruit, in the patriot army, to his father at Three Rivers, which we lately noticed, and which the *Canadian* affected to doubt.—It will be seen that the General held out the same hope of a powerful army being in motion that was impressed on the youth in the instance we related.  
The following picture of the persons to be restrained is from the *New York Daily Express*, of the 12th instant; good authority in this instance:—  
"Correspondence of the New York Daily Advertiser."  
"DETROIT, February 16, 1838."  
"I have never seen among the Lazzaroni of Naples, or the starved wretches of Ireland, a more miserable, poverty stricken, wretched set of human beings than these 'Patriots.' I

doubt if 200 men could be selected from all our Penitentiaries, bearing more strongly the marks of a long life of wretchedness than the invaders of Canada. Not more than a third part had overcoats, and the few garments they had hung in threads and patches about their starved persons. What infatuation and what crime for intelligent men, to seduce by large promises these miserable beings into a situation which can bring them but increased misery and wretchedness!—I conversed with a large number, and found they had all been seduced from their usual employments by promises of great rewards. Dr. Duncombe, in his proclamation, offers 300 acres of land, 100 dollars bounty, and 12 dollars per month pay, with rations, to all who joined the cause. How long will our government suffer this frontier to be kept in a continued turmoil by a few hundred misguided men, dragged from one point to another by officers flourishing with showy uniforms, stars and tri-colored cockades, while the miserable tools of their ambition are suffering for the common comforts of life?  
"Among the 200 on Fighting Island, I did not see (and I made some efforts to find them) but one Canadian."

From the Montreal Gazette, March 20.

We have seen a letter from an officer at Amherstburg, of the 12th March, which states that accounts had been received of forty of the Americans, wounded in the engagement at Point Pele Island, on the 23d instant, having been taken in for treatment at the hospital in Portland, and that about thirty or forty were drowned in their precipitate flight across the ice. About a dozen of the company of the 83d, who had pursued the runaway brigades about four miles, fell through the ice, but were fortunately rescued by their comrades.

We learn from Toronto, that on the 13th instant, General Sutherland, who had been taken prisoner off Point au Pele, by Colonel Prince, was put upon his trial before a Court Martial, composed of Militia Officers, in pursuance of an Act passed during the last session, to protect the inhabitants of Upper Canada, "against lawless aggressions from subjects of foreign countries at peace with her Majesty."

On the second day, the trial was interrupted, in consequence of the prisoner having attempted, during the night, to break himself to death, by opening veins in his arms and feet. He was discovered in a state of great exhaustion.

British Officers lately arrived.—By the *Roscoe*, Major Carmichael; by the *Toronto*, R. T. Jackson, and Wm. Hobbs, Staff Surgeons; by the *Birmingham*, Capt. Wright, 43d Regt.; by the *Virginia*, Major Briggs, and Veterinary Surgeon Johnston, of 7th Hussars; and Lieut. Hammersly, of the Dragon Guards. These latter officers, we understand, are sent out to organize Cavalry Corps in Canada.—*New York Advertiser*, March 24.

Minette, leaving her afflicted parents to lament the loss of a truly dutiful and affectionate child.—On Friday morning last, MARIA BAYARD, in the 13th year of her age, third daughter of Robert Bayard, M. D. &c. after a long and painful illness, which she endured with the most exemplary patience and submission, evincing the support and consolations of entire confidence in the promise of God.—At Union Point, on Thursday last, after a short but severe illness, Mr. Edward G. Cunneen, aged 76 years, an old and respectable inhabitant.

At Amherstburg, after a short and painful illness of nine days, Arabella Gilkinson Innes, consort of the Hon. James Gordon, Member of the Legislative Council of Upper Canada.—This lady, in the absence of Mr. Gordon, who was attending to his parliamentary duties at Toronto, made her residence the recipient of the militiamen and officers then stationed at Amherstburg, (awaiting an attack from a band of rebels, on the opposite shore), and during her exertions to see them comfortably situated, she contracted a severe cold, which obliged her to keep her bed from the 8th to the 17th ult., when she expired, leaving her numerous relations forever to mourn her loss, and a large circle of friends by whom she will be universally regretted.
