

Canada, dearest work of earth. The son of oppression looks to thee, and exulting thanks his God who has given, and the British nation who have preserved the asylum inviolate.

We are sorry to hear that a fatal disease has broken out among the horned cattle, at St. Thomas, below Quebec. About forty head of cattle have died within a short time past; sixteen of them in one field, where they were put out to grass. They fall down in convulsions and die in a couple of hours. No remedy has yet been found. It is said to be infectious, and persons who have handled the carcasses, have been taken ill in consequence.

The United States' papers mention the prevalence of a disease among the cattle in the State of New Hampshire, described as nearly similar in its effects.

TORONTO, Aug. 17.—Pardon has been extended to the state prisoners in Toronto Jail, five on giving security to keep the peace for three years, and eleven on condition of exiting themselves in three days time from the Province for ever. The names of the first are Seymour W. H. Stockdale, John McCormick, John Gillingham, Daniel Snell, and William Delong, and of the latter, Charles Duran, Daniel Shepherd, John Hill, Asa Wixon, Joseph Milburn, John Haling, Abraham Haling, John Brown, Silas Barnell, Jesse Cleaver, and Joel Wixon.—*Patriot*.

A great many reports have been current in town for some days past about instructions received from England, relating to political offenders. We believe they are merely conjectural, and that the system adopted by the local government will be adhered to. Sutherland, now in confinement here, it is said, will be discharged in consequence of some defect in the proceedings against him, and Theller will be sent to England. We observe that the system of discharge on security for good behaviour and on condition of voluntary exile, has been acted upon in Upper Canada, after the receipt of the latest despatches from England.—*Old Gazette*, August 24.

Reports of new attempts at raising disturbances on the Lower Canada frontier are still prevalent at Montreal. There is nothing to be feared or wicked for the actors in the late Revolution; but we believe that these reports, originated in great part, from the natural alarm of those who were ill-treated by the insurgents last autumn.—*Id.*

QUEBEC, August 25. Yesterday the Brigade of Guards had a grand field day on the Plains of Abraham, before His Excellency Sir Colin Campbell, who was accompanied by Sir Charles A. Fitz Roy, Governor of Prince Edward Island. The parade was formed at 10 o'clock, and the Brigade went through several evolutions in a style that elicited the praise of the Lieut. General, and excited the surprise of the numerous strangers from the United States who were present on the ground which, notwithstanding the heat of the day, was thronged with spectators.

A noon this day, their Excellencies Sir Colin Campbell and Sir Chas. Aug. Fitz Roy, left this city on their return to their respective seats of Government, namely, in Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island. Their Excellencies embarked on board the Malabar's barge which conveyed them to the *Medea* Steamship. The latter vessel, on receiving her distinguished passengers, displayed the St. Andrew's and St. George's flags at her main and fore, and immediately proceeded. Their Excellencies were attired in plain clothes, and left Quebec without any of the pomp and ceremonies usual on similar occasions.

GEORGE MINCHIN.

His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, Son, and Lieut. Col. Hayne, arrived here last evening in the Steamer *Fredericton* from Saint John, having been absent from Head Quarters nearly a fortnight, on a tour through the Northern and Southern Counties of the Province. His Excellency appears to be in good health, after the fatigues incident to a long and circuitous journey over land.

## From the Miramichi Gleaner, August 28.

Last week we announced that it was the intention of His Excellency to visit Miramichi and the Northern Counties. He arrived at Wilson's Point, on his way down, on Friday afternoon last about 5 o'clock, and was met by a number of Gentlemen who escorted him to Chatham. He was accompanied from Fredericton by his youngest son and Col. Hayne.

It having been bruited abroad, that His Excellency in all probability would arrive about three, a large concourse of the inhabitants, together with Mechanics, bearing flags and banners, the smiths dressed in their classical and highly picturesque costumes, as on the day of the Coronation of Her Majesty the Queen, assembled with the Amateur Band. After waiting a considerable time, they moved in procession headed by the Band, through the principal streets, and the sight was both animating and pleasing. On intelligence being obtained of His Excellency's near approach, the procession formed in line, the Band in a circle opposite the residence of the Hon. Joseph Cunard, and immediately the first carriage containing His Excellency, appeared in view, the band struck up a march, and a salute was fired from several pieces of ordnance placed in the open square in front. At its termination, and while His Excellency was proceeding to his residence, the Band performed the National Anthem, when loud and repeated cheers were given by the inhabitants assembled.

His Excellency then signified his intention of meeting the people in half an hour for the purpose of proceeding in procession through the town, and the crowd dispersed. At the appointed time the trades, &c. again assembled, and headed by the band, proceeded to wait on His Excellency, but the sky was clouded and heavy, thunder was heard in the distance, with vivid flashes of lightning, and every thing indicated a storm. His Excellency then addressed the crowd—thanked them for their attendance and attention—and as there was every appearance of unpleasant weather, thought he had best abandon his original resolution of proceeding through the town. The address was received by loud cheers, and the people retired to their homes.

About nine o'clock, the following morning, His Excellency went on board H. M. Sloop Pearl. The yards were manned, and on his leaving the vessel, a salute was fired. This was a very pleasing, and to many, novel sight; it being the first exhibition of the kind on our river, and consequently much enjoyed by those who had an opportunity of witnessing the scene.

About ten o'clock, a public meeting was held at Mrs. Martin's Hotel, agreeable to a requisition numerously signed to the High Sheriff. A. Rankin in the chair. It was Resolved, That an Address should be presented to His Excellency, and a Committee of twenty gentlemen nominated to present the same, when he should feel disposed to receive it. The Chairman then waited on His Excellency for that purpose, and on his return stated, as His Excellency was holding himself in readiness to embark on board the Steamer Cape Breton, immediately on her arrival, he could not meet the Deputation that day, but would appoint a time when he would receive the Address at the Court House, Newcastle. We shall publish the proceedings of this meeting, as well as the Address, next week.

The Steamer did not arrive until the evening, and, as the night was stormy, His Excellency did not embark until the following morning, at 7 o'clock, and immediately after the steamer got underweigh.

Last evening, a meeting of upwards of fifty of the Mechanics was convened at Mr. White's Hotel, when it was Unanimously Resolved, That an Address, emanating from them as a body, should be presented to His Excellency on his return to Miramichi; and a committee of ten persons, as a Deputation was chosen to present the same.

It is not positively known what stay His Excellency intends making in his journey northward, but it is expected he will be in Miramichi on Wednesday evening. He intends returning home by the Southern route passing through Kent County.

Sudden Squall.—One of the most violent squalls, perhaps ever witnessed in this place, passed over Chatham and its immediate vicinity, on the afternoon of Friday last.

So strong was the wind that it broke one of the trees in front of the residence of H. Cunard, Esquire, although in a very sheltered situation; ripped off a large portion of the slates on the roof of the new stone building now in course of erection for F. Peabody, Esquire; detached two large stones, together with a quantity of sheet lead from the corner of the roof of Messrs. Cunard's Store; and carried a small boat, which was lying bottom up near Mr. P. Henderson's wharf, across the street and dashed it with such violence against the fence in front of the residence of Dr. Key, as almost to shiver it to pieces. Several fences and porches were blown down, and carried to a considerable distance, and all the vessels driven from their moorings. As the street was crowded at the time, the inhabitants having congregated in expectation of the arrival of His Excellency, it is remarkable that no accident of a serious nature occurred. One or two persons, however, received slight bruises from the falling missiles.

## From the Saint John Courier, September 1.

THE FISHERIES.—The continued encroachments of the Americans on our Fisheries in the Bay of Fundy and on the coasts of the Gulf of St. Lawrence, have for some time past been a subject of very general complaint on the part of those engaged in that branch of commerce from the North American Provinces, and it has at length been found necessary to employ vessels of war for the protection of British interests on the coasts and within the known and prescribed limits of these Provinces!—Such infractions, by Americans, as they are likely to lead to serious consequences between the two nations. With a view of convincing the American Government of the nature and extent of these aggressions, Lord Durham is said to be at present in communication with the Cabinet at Washington. This step, we believe, has been taken in compliance with the suggestions of the Governors of the Lower Provinces, and

the result is of much consequence to their inhabitants generally—the subject being one of serious import to their trade and prosperity, although the stipulations of the treaties relative thereto, between the two Governments, appear to be almost entirely forgotten.

The Court of Over and Terminer, at which His Honor Judge PARKER presided, closed its sittings in this City, on the 22d ult.

The trial of John Way, charged with the murder of Sally West, a girl of the town, in May last, came on at this Court, and, after a patient investigation of the circumstances, resulted in an acquittal of the prisoner.

The following sentences were passed:—

David Bailey and John Smith, charged with Burglary, in breaking into the dwelling house of H. Watkeys—convicted of Larceny—Bailey to be imprisoned at hard labour in the common goal for two years, to be whipped fifty lashes on the bare back on Monday the 27th inst. and fifty lashes on Monday the 24th September; Smith, the same imprisonment, and to be whipped fifty lashes on Monday next.

For Theft.—*Jeremiah Croxley*, one year's imprisonment at hard labour; *Frederick Johnston*, two year's imprisonment at hard labour; *Zachariah Jones*, one year's imprisonment at hard labour; *James Davis*, two year's hard labour, and fifty lashes on Monday next; *Dunhill Hill*, six months' hard labour.

For Keeping a Disorderly House.—*Margaret Stevens*, six months' imprisonment.

For enticing a Soldier of the 11th Regt. to desert.—*Martin Fitzgerald*, two months' imprisonment.

NEW STEAMER.—A fine looking Steamer, owned by Mr. James Whitney, of this City, was towed into harbour by the Mail of the Mist Steamer, on Monday last, from Saint Mary's Bay, where she was built by Mr. Christopher Specht. She is constructed on an approved model for speed, and we trust will meet the expectation of her enterprising owner. We have not learned on what route she is intended to ply.

## Communication.

Mr. Simpson.—Will you have the goodness to caution the Public against receiving any notes of the "Bank of Old town," at Orono, as there is reason to believe it insolvent.

I have, however, observed with much concern, the manner in which the above caution was announced in last Saturday's "Sentinel." It is the duty of a Public Journalist to protect the people against imposture, but I cannot believe that anonymous slander or the floating scandal of a village, must of necessity be admitted in any respectable newspaper—the bare intimation of fraud will always be found sufficient to prevent its success.

In the present case, Mr. Ward has given form and currency to several errors. It is not true that Mr. Lane pretends only to be, but really is the Cashier of the "Old town Bank." It is not true that he left the Steamerboat Fredericton on Monday week, until she arrived in Saint John. It is not true that he returned only to the Oromocto, but came up in the Novelty to Fredericton; neither is the insinuation true that he pretended to be in search of another who had committed a robbery. These several errors must convince Mr. Ward, how necessary it is for the conductor of a Journal to ascertain the fact which he announces.

Mr. Lane is Cashier of the "Old town Bank," he did come here in pursuit of a Mr. A. V. Hammond, (named in the arrivals at the Saint John Hotel in the Courier of last Saturday week) who had absconded with a large amount of the bills of the "Old town Bank," which had been intrusted to him for other purposes than fraud, and for which Mr. Lane holds his receipt. Mr. Lane came to Fredericton to intercept Hammond on his way to Canada, having discovered that it was not his intention to apply the notes as agreed on their delivery to him.—Mr. Lane remained here for some days expecting that Hammond would come up in a Steamerboat. Mr. Lane will here affect no concealment either of his office or object. On Monday he went to Saint John, and on his arrival at the Hotel found the object of his pursuit, who has been lodged in prison at the suit of Mr. Lane. If these allegations can be proved correct, it will be evident that Mr. Ward has permitted, his zeal for the public welfare, to hurry him into the commission of a serious outrage on the feelings and character of an unoffending person.
