

# IMPORTANT FROM WASHINGTON. THE NORTH EASTERN BOUNDARY QUESTION ABOUT TO BE SETTLED.

Our Washington dates are to the 15th inst. In the Senate, Mr. Buchanan's Bill for the preservation of our neutral relations, was brought up. It empowers all the officers of the government, Collectors, Marshals, &c. upon the borders, to enforce the neutrality of the nation, and it contains provisions authorizing the President to make appropriations to put the laws in execution.

Mr. Buchanan moved the passage of the Bill. Mr. Ruggles of Maine objected to immediate action of the Bill—he wished time to examine its provisions, and see if something could not be done for the protection of the Boundary of Maine. He had understood that some official documents had very lately been put into the hands of the Executive upon the subject of the North Eastern Boundary, and he wished to learn what they were, before final action upon the measure before the Senate.

Mr. Buchanan said he did not object to a postponement of the Bill for a day, but he hoped its progress would not be stayed by an unnecessary connexion of the North Eastern Boundary question with its provisions. He too, had been informed by high authority that the North Eastern Boundary question was about to be closed, whether satisfactorily or not, he could not say—but it was certain that the negotiation was very soon to be terminated.

From the Saint John Courier, January 27.

We have London dates to the 19th of December.

The Ministry have caused an inquiry into the Pension List, Sir Robert Peel and his party opposing, by a vote of 295 to 233, which shows a very large majority on the side of Lord John Russell. Sir R. Peel deprecated an inquiry on account of its tending to disturb the rights of individuals, and as affording no pecuniary relief to the treasury. The sum voted annually, is about £1,500,000 sterling.

Sir William Molesworth, in an Address to the electors of Leeds, opens an attack upon the Whig Ministry, and recommends agitation for the ballot, triennial Parliaments and an exercise of the suffrage, so as to do away with the Tory influence of the great land holders.

The Courier, a Ministerial paper, in speaking of the recall of the Earl of Gosford, says: "We believe that his lordship's successor is not yet appointed, but most probably he will be a military man." The same paper says "Sir Francis Head comes home because he does not find, we understand, the income of his situation equal to support the dignity of his office."

A Paris paper, *Le Commerce*, has an article upon Canadian affairs. It advised England to submit the difficulties to French arbitration, for the Canadians, it is added, will listen to the advice of their ancient country.

The last accounts from Stockholm stated that the difficulties existing between Norway and Sweden were far from being removed, the Norwegians having given fresh cause of offence to Sweden, by sailing in the Mediterranean without hoisting the Union flag.

TREATY BETWEEN GREAT BRITAIN AND PERU.—We find in the London Papers an important Treaty between Great Britain and the Peru-Bolivian possessions. The leading features are reciprocity and the prohibition of slavery.
