## ECCLESIASTICAL INFORMATION.

### GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE CHURCH OF SCOTLAND.

Lord Belhaven, her Majesty's Lord high Commissioner to the General Assembly of the Church of Scotland, arrived with his suite on Monday, at Holyrood Palace. On Wednesday afternoon his Grace was waited upon by the Lord Provost, accompanied by Bailies Crooks, Millar and Grieve, the Dean of Guild, and the City Chamberlain, when his Lordship presented the keys of the city, and according to custom, received them back from his Grace. The civic party had afterwards the honor of dining with Lord Belhaven and a select party, among whom were Lord Greenock, Lord Maitland, Lord Robert Ker, the Lord Justice Clerk, Lord Meadowbank, Lord Gillies, Lord Corhouse, Lord Mounieff, Lord Jeffrey, Lord Cockburn, the Solicitor General, Rev. Dr. Gardner, Colonel Gordon, R. A. Col. Ferguson, 79th, Sir Thomas Dick Lauder, Sir George Grant Suttie, Sir Henry Jardine, Sir James Spittal, Col. Gordon, R. A. his Grace's Almoner and Chaplain, &c.

S., Mr. Paul, Accountant, Mr. Scott, Castlemaains, &c. &c.—The Lord Provost, City Magistrates, and Council, were among the last of the presentation.

A guard of the 14th Dragoons and 79th Highlanders formed the Guard in the Palace Yard. About twelve o'clock his Grace proceeded in his carriage to the High Church, preceded by the military Guard, and a carriage in which were the pages, ushers, &c. par-

ties of the day police in their new uniforms, also attended the procession, and the streets were lined by the 14th dragoons and 79th Regiment.

The High Church was, as usual on such occasions, crowded. The Rev. Dr. Gardiner of Bothwell, Moderator of last General Assembly, preached an excellent discourse from 2d Cor. iv. 7.

Divine Service having been concluded, his Grace the Commissioner and suite proceeded to the Tron Church, where the Assembly met, and was constituted with the usual solemnity.

The Ex-Moderator, (Dr. Gardiner,) after acknowledging the high honor which had been conferred on him by the kindness of the last General Assembly—kindness which he could never cease to bear in grateful recollection, proceeded to say:—Before retiring from this office, I beg, in accordance with my own feelings, and in compliance with the wishes of many distinguished members of the Church, to recommend to your notice the Rev. Dr. William Muir, as a person eminently qualified to occupy the Moderator's Chair, and to preside over your deliberations. Dr. Muir's character is so widely known, as to require no eulogy from me. Possessing high talents, extensive acquirements, and active habits, exemplary in the discharge of his public and private duties, universally respected, and esteemed as an able and faithful minister of the Gospel, he is beloved in no ordinary degree by the flock over whose spiritual interests he is appointed to watch. But it is not only as a parochial minister that he is distinguished. His publications have spread his name far and wide; and it consists with the knowledge of every individual in this Assembly, that he has been a most happy and effective instrument in promoting the Assembly's schemes. And it will also be recollected that his conduct as Covenanter of the Committee on the spread of Popery obtained for him the well-merited thanks of the last General Assembly. Intimately acquainted with the laws and constitution of the Church; possessing firmness, dignity, talent, and energy of character, combined with much gentleness of disposition, he seems peculiarly fitted for discharging the duties of Moderator. Without trespassing longer upon your time, I beg most respectfully to propose that Dr. William Muir be elected Moderator of this ensuing General Assembly. (Cries of "Agree, agree.")

Dr. Muir was then elected Moderator by acclamation; and took the Chair accordingly. His Grace the Commissioner then addressed the Assembly:—Right Rev. and Right Honorable,—Since I had last the honor of addressing you from this throne, we have had to deplore the loss of a Sovereign, whose reign was marked by the most anxious solicitude for the welfare and happiness of his people. I am commissioned by our Sovereign Lady the Queen, as the representative of her Royal person to your Venerable Court, and have to inform you, that in ascending the throne of her illustrious ancestors, she has cheerfully come under all those solemn obligations which are required by the constitution of this country for the maintenance of the Presbyterian Church as by law established. And her Majesty commands me further to acquaint you, that she has the highest satisfaction in placing at your disposal the Royal grant of £2000 for education in the Highlands, which it has hitherto been the gracious pleasure of her illustrious predecessors to make to you in former years. Her Majesty relies on your loyalty and attachment to her person and government; and she trusts with confidence to your fatherly care in superintending the religious instruction of her people. Right Reverend and Right Honorable,—I feel assured that all your deliberations will be conducted in the true spirit of brotherly love and concord; and I have only to add, that it will afford me sincere gratification to do every thing in my power for your comfort and convenience during the sitting of the Assembly.

The Moderator then addressed his Grace in reply:—May it please your Grace,—We, members of the General Assembly, cannot proceed to the important business for which we are met, without mutual congratulation and thankfulness, that by the mercy and care of our glorified and adored Saviour, the Head of the Church, this privilege is still continued—his Almighty hand upholding and defending our Zion, and perpetuating to us her solemn convocation. And also that by your Grace's acceptable commission as the Representative of her Majesty here, the duty—the sacred duty of the Sovereign, as the guardian of the Presbyterian Church established by law, is once more publicly recognised to be a duty of imperative and lasting obligation. The trying dispensation of Providence in the demise of his late gracious Majesty, deeply affected the minds of us all: And while the remembrance of him is not soon to pass away, it is our hope and prayer that neither may the deplorable event of his removal soon lose its sanctifying influence on any of us. The assurance of maintaining the Church of Scotland, now so cheerfully given by her Majesty, and according to the forms employed by her ancestors of blessed memory, is received by us with respect and gratitude; and, through the good promise imputed by it, must deepen the loyal and affectionate interest which we feel in her Majesty's welfare and prosperity. Her Majesty has been graciously pleased to express her trust in our fatherly care and superintendence for the religious instruction of her people. It will ever, we hope, be our delight, even as it is our duty, to endeavour, in humble dependence on the blessing of Christ, to accomplish these, the great objects of our ministry. And where the means of religious instruction and pastoral care to be afforded to the extent of the need of the destitute population, we would anticipate that, by the same blessing, the pious wish of Her Majesty's ancestors, of sacred memory, would speedily be realised, and none of the people but would have a Bible and be able to read and understand it. The grant bestowed out of the Royal Bounty, conveys up to the chief purpose for which it is appropriated, the gratifying intimation that the Highlands and Islands of our beloved country are remembered and cared for at the opening of the new reign, even as they have been in times past. The purpose itself of the grant—to diffuse the knowledge of saving truth in the

destitute parts of the land, and especially for the reclaiming of lost souls where the people have fallen into the delusions and fatal errors of Popery—this purpose is surely the most appropriate to which the Protestant Sovereign of a Protestant country can devote a measure of the Royal munificence.

The re-appointment of your Grace to fill the honourable situation of representative of the Sovereign in the General Assembly is peculiarly gratifying to us, knowing your Grace's purity of character and exemplariness as an office bearer in the Church; and keeping in mind the attentions, courtesies and kindness shown to us by your Grace on former occasions, we hold the pledge and assurance that every thing will be done in your power to promote the ends of your distinguished Commission. And let me add, that in making arrangements for business, the General Assembly will, I am sure, be desirous of studying your Grace's convenience and comfort. May it please your Grace—It will doubtless be the desire of the members of the Assembly to conduct their procedure in the spirit of peace and concord, and in such a manner as shall enable your Grace to report favourably of it to her Majesty. Our first and great object is to acquit ourselves to Christ Jesus our Lord and Master and to our own consciences. In doing so, the full and unfettered discussion of those subjects brought before us may be called for. To promote the cause of truth such may be necessary, absolutely so. But let me assure your Grace that it will be the prayer unceasingly offered, that the blessed and adored Head of the Church, even Jesus, who is exalted to bear supreme rule in heaven and earth, may himself preside in the midst of us, and that his wisdom may endow us not only with the spirit of power, but also with the spirit of love and a sound mind, that all things be done in order for the glory of God and the good of his holy Church.
