

the most heartfelt emotions of joy and gratulation. The pleasures of the Regatta lasted about three hours, after which the congregated multitudes harmoniously dispersed, highly delighted with the brilliant scene they had witnessed.

At six o'clock, the Common Council and their numerous guests sat down to an excellent dinner, prepared for the purpose by Mr. Netherly, at their fine chamber in the Court House. His Worship the Mayor took the Chair, assisted by James Peters, Jr. Esquire, Common Clerk, and James T. Hanford, Esq. Coroner, as Vice Presidents. On the right of His Worship sat Colonel Goldie, of the 11th Regt. and next to him His Honor Judge Botsford. On the left of His Worship sat the Hon. Wm. Black, Senior Member of the Legislature, and next to him the father of the City, the venerable and venerated JOHN WARR, Esquire. A number of appropriate toasts were drunk, which we give below, with an enthusiasm fitting to the occasion. Colonel Goldie returned thanks in a short and expressive speech when the sixth toast was drunk, and concluded by proposing the health of "His Worship the Mayor and Corporation," as did also Mr. Black, the Senior Member of the Legislature, when the compliment was given to that Body from the Chair. Major Ward spoke feelingly, also, on the marked respect shown him.

When the health of Sir John Harvey was announced, and the sentiment that accompanied it, we can scarcely describe the rapture with which it was received, and it was some minutes before the cheering subsided.

The day was also concluded in two different modes by two large bodies of cheerful citizens. The one gratified themselves by participating in a splendid Ball and Supper at the Saint John Hotel, at which a large and highly respectable party assembled, and which we understand, was a scene of great enjoyment; and the other similarly partook of heartfelt happiness at the Temperance Soiree at the Wesleyan School Rooms, where about five hundred happy beings indulged in the innocent and heartily gratifying sociality of tea party, at which many "admissible good things," some excellent speeches and a proper seasoning of music, together with general philanthropy and good will, firm loyalty, and rational intercourse, formed a "feast of reason and a flow of soul," that might have been envied at many a more splendid, but less harmless entertainment. We understand, indeed, that this festivity of our temperance friends, was one of the most delightful occurrences of the day, and proved a season of as unalloyed and perfect enjoyment as could have been devised. Late in the evening the weather changed to heavy rain, but the principal amusements of the day, including all the outdoor festivities, (with the exception of a bonfire on Portland Heights,) had previously terminated, and were thoroughly enjoyed; and never has the City of St. John witnessed a day of greater happiness and real pleasure. The Coronation day of our beloved and lovely Queen will long be remembered by us, and all in our neighbourhood; and we doubt not, that in the midst of their pleasures and amusements, thousands of happy hearts were silently lifting themselves up in loyal and fervent aspirations, invoking the blessings of a long and happy reign for their youthful Monarch; while millions upon millions of her faithful subjects, in other parts of the Globe, were participating in similar enjoyments, and uttering similar loyal prayers—

"LONG LIVE VICTORIA!"

"GOD SAVE THE QUEEN!"

THE REGATTA.

The first race was by seven six oared Gigs, in which the prizes were won by the following:—the Hazard, entered by the Carleton Club, and the successful boat of last year, first prize, £20; Harlequin, by Mr. Smith, 2d, £5; True Blue, by Mr. Wright, 3d, £2 10s. The Coronation, entered by Mr. Lawton, came in next, minus an oar. Venture, entered by Mr. Wright, the Wasp, by the Indian Town Club, and the Blue Bonnet, by Mr. McClellan, returned, having been disabled by the roughness of the weather. The Wasp when she was stove by the sea, was working handsomely, and, although detained some time at the start, bade fair to give the Hazard a severe trial for the prize.

In the second race, three whale boats started, Mr. Marvin's Blue Nose winning the first prize of £8 10s. with apparent ease; Mr. Swinney's Try Again taking the second of £4; and Mr. McAvity's, Portland, bringing up the rear.

The third race, rowed by Amateurs, was run by four four oared Gigs—the Cygnet (the Hazard of the first race) entered by Mr. G. Thomson, carrying off the first prize of £5; and the Red Rover, by Mr. John Thomas, the second of £2 10s. The North Star (the Coronation of the first race) entered by the North Wharf Club, having gone off the course a short time after starting, the Victoria, entered by Mr. W. G. Hare, brought up the rear. The lead in this race was taken in beautiful style by the lads on board the Red Rover, and admirably well kept until they reached the Beacon, when the Cygnet in turning started ahead and came in victorious.

The fourth race was by Fishing Skiffs—in which three started. The first prize of £3 10s. was won by Mr. Mailman's Paragon; the second of £1 10s. by Mr. Cuddyford's Emma. The fifth race was by Dingies, Mr. Patton's Fairy taken the prize of £3. Two boats started. In the sixth race, seven canoes started, paddled by Indians, and came out in the following order:—Wild Goose, 1st, taking £3; Gabriel, 2d, £2; Loon, 3d, £1; Paul, 4th, 18s.

We are authorized to state, that a bet of 1000 dollars is ready to be staked, that a boat shall be built and rowed by six natives of this City, against any other boat and equal number of men that can be produced from any other part of the world.

This challenge is intended to meet the eyes of the Whitehall boatmen, who may be recollected beat Captain Harris, in his gig boat, a few years since at New-York, and our City Boys have a great desire to regain the palm.—*Chronicle.*

JANUARY TERM, 1838.

WHEREAS in and by the third Section of an Act of the General Assembly of this Province, made and passed in the first Year of the Reign of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, intituled "An Act to repeal all the Acts in force relating to Trespasses, and to make more effectual provision for the same," the Justices of the Peace in their General Sessions are empowered to make such other Regulations as shall be most expedient and agreeable to the nature and circumstances of the several Counties, Towns and Parishes; And whereas it has been made to appear to this Court, that the allowing SHEEP to run at large on the Public Streets and Highways is attended with great damage and inconvenience;

Be it therefore ordered, That no Sheep be allowed to run at large on any of the Public Streets or Highways within the County of York, between the 1st May and 1st November, in each and every year, under a penalty of Sixpence for each Sheep so running at large.
