PRESENTMENT.

The Grand Jury for the County, in closing their labours at this time beg leave to state, that they have given their most serious attention to the different subjects given them in charge, and beg to remark that numerous evils exist in the town from the illicit sellers of Ardent Spirits, and from the frequent occurrence of Minors, Apprentices and Servants, resorting to those haunts of vice and immorality. We are fully impressed with the necessity, of your honorable Court adopting some effectual remedy to suppress the same; the Grand Jury not having sufficient power to compel parties to appear before them. Fathers, and guardians of Minors, either from affection or respect are unwilling to bring such matters before the public, consequently the offending persons pass with impunity. But we are satisfied in our minds, that there are such haunts, and that they encourage Apprentices and Children to gamble and dissipate at the expense of Parents and Masters. We would recommend that the number of Licensed Taverns be reduced in the town of Fredericton, and that none be allowed but those of comfort and respectability.

We would also recommend that your honorable Court would appoint a Stipendiary Constable, whose duty it should be to examine and report upon the state of Taverns in the Town; and check the growing evil of regrating and forestalling, so forcibly given us in charge at the opening of the Court. This being the only way we can point out to remedy this growing evil; a small sum say fifteen or twenty pounds a year taken from the licence fund, or such other as we are decidedly of opinion, that such an appointment would greatly tend to put down an evil which is daily growing to an alarming extent.

We have also given considerable attention to the County accounts laid before us at the opening of the Court, and are highly gratified to find the accounts connected with the Alms House are of such a very satisfactory nature; and much is due to the Commissioners and Mr. Fleming, the Keeper, for the attention paid to the comfort of the inmates of that establishment.

We would also beg leave to notice, the very handsome and correct manner, in which Mr. Beek, the County Auditor, has laid the Accounts and all documents connected with them, before us; and consider that we would not have discharged our duty to that officer, if we did not thus express our entire satisfaction.

To which Mr. Justice Robinson, the Chairman, made the following reply: GENTLEMEN.—The sentiments expressed in this Report, meet my most hearty concurrence, and that of the whole Court. I have long deplored the existence of the evils which you have pointed out, with regard to the sale of Spirituous Liquors, and the unhappy consequences which result from it; and you may be assured, that the Court will devote their most serious attention to their removal; and especially in the adoption of your recommendation, of appointing a Stipendiary Constable, to see that the rules and regulations for the government of Taverns are duly enforced, and to detect the illicit sale of spirits, and the growing evil of forestalling and regrating.

The Court are also much gratified to find, that the accounts of the Commissioners of the Alms House and the Work House, and those of the County generally, are so entirely satisfactory to the Grand Jury.

GENTLEMEN.—In now discharging you from farther attendance at this Session, the Court thank you for the consideration which you have given to the various subjects, to which your attention has been called, and for the readiness with which the important functions of your office have been performed.
