Government House, 14th July, 1838.

The English Mail, by the June Packet at Halifax, reached this place on Sunday evening last. We have London papers to the 6th, but they contain nothing of much importance.

His Excellency the LIEUT. GOVERNOR arrived in town on Friday last, at half past six o'clock; p. m. having descended the St. Lawrence in H. M. S. Andromache, and passed thro' Miramichi.

We are requested to state that the display of Fire Works which were intended to be made on the day of the celebration of Her Majesty's Coronation, will be exhibited near to the Government House to-morrow evening the 19th inst.

Yesterday the 65th Regiment, under the command of Lieut. Col. SEXTON, now in this Garrison, were reviewed by His Excellency the Commander in Chief. They are a fine looking body of men, and presented an imposing appearance in the performance of their different movements, and such as has not been witnessed in this place for many years.

We understand that a very large proportion of American Bank Notes of Massachusetts and Maine now offered in this Province are counterfeit; and caution the public against receiving paper purporting to be issued by the Banks of those States.—We have been shown one of the Waldo Bank, Maine, which almost any person would consider genuine; and notes of the Commonwealth, and other broken Banks of Boston, have been offered during the past week at a large discount. The only safe and proper course therefore, will be to refuse the paper of any other Banks, except those of this Province, which are known to be solvent.—Fredericton Sentinel.

On Thursday afternoon, the house occupied by Mr. Breen was discovered to be on fire. The alarm being given, the troops in garrison and the inhabitants generally, were soon on the spot, and succeeded in extinguishing it; but not before it had communicated to a neighbouring house. The fire originated from a defective chimney, which has before endangered the premises, and should be properly secured. The upper stories of both houses were much injured; and we regret to state that Mr. SPHANN of this town who had the direction of one of the engines, fell while reaching forward to secure the hose, and the engine went over his ankle, grazing his side and passing over his shoulder. Fortunately no bones were broken, altho' he was of course severely bruised. It became necessary eventually to cut through

the roof, to check the progress of the flames; and the want of an Axe Company was very evident. This is found every where to be a most efficient body of men, and one which might easily be organized in this community. Fires are sudden, alarming, and often destructive occurrences; and the only effectual mode of dealing with them, is to be prepared for such events; and bring to the scene of conflagration a properly organized force, and a cool and deliberate exercise of judgment.—1b.

Despatches were received by His Excellency Sir COLIN CAMPBELL on Friday evening last, by a Special Messenger, from His Excellency the Earl of DURHAM. The Malabar, 74, we understand, had sailed for this Port, for the purpose of conveying a Regiment from hence to Quebec. The 73d is under orders to proceed in her.—Halifax Royal Gazette.

York General Sessions.

JANUARY TERM, 1838.

WHEREAS in and by the third Section of an Act of the General Assembly of this Province, made and passed in the first Year of the Reign of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, intituled "An Act to repeal all the Acts in force relating to 'Trespasses, and to make more effectual provision 'for the same,' the Justices of the Peace in their General Sessions are empowered to make such other Regulations as shall be most expedient and agreeable to the nature and circumstances of the several Counties, Towns and Parishes; And whereas it has been made to appear to this Court, that the allowing SHEEP to run at large on the Public Streets and Highways is attended with great damage and inconvenience:

Be it therefore ordered, That no Sheep be allowed to run at large on any of the Public Streets or Highways within the County of York, between the 1st May and 1st November, in each and every year, under a penalty of Sixpence for each Sheep so running at large.
