The vote in 1911 resulted:

NEWS IN BRIEF

Winnipeg, Jan. 10.—Government and
Grand Trunk officials have arranged for
shelters for the Grand Trunk Pacific
elevators at Fort William via Graham to

Portland at the same rate as now prevails
over the C. P. R. to that port. It is ex-
pected from fifty to sixty cars will be
taken by the new route, starting at once.

London, Jan. 7.—In connection with
yesterday's announcement of a defeat of
a German war vessel on Lake Tanganyika,
an East-Central Africa, it is announced
that the British ships which accomplished
the surrender of the German vessel were
specially constructed in England, and
transported to the east of Africa. Until
the arrival of these vessels the Germans
dominated Lake Tanganyika.

Niagara Falls, N. Y., Jan. 10.—Robt
ing followed a strike of 3,000 employes
of the American Aluminum Company here
to-day. The strikers stormed the

Paris, Jan. 7.—Announcement
made by the Bulgarian Journal, Narodna
Prava, of Sofia, according to a dispatch
from Athens to the Havis Agency, that
after the holidays King Ferdinand will
visit Unkup, Neles, Prilep and Orchida,
and will be crowned Emperor of Macedonia
at Monastir.

London, Jan. 9.—For threaten-
ing to blow up the local Y. M. C. A.
building, Bernard Krueger, a former Ger-
man soldier, and night fireman of the
building for the past two years, has been
arrested. He was charged with threaten-
ing to blow up the building with dynamite
and to kill the Rev. Henry Kingston, and
interfered with the Rev. Henry Kingston
at the end of the war.

London, Jan. 8.—William Waldorf
Astor, formerly of New York, who was
raised to the peerage last week by the
King, has assumed the title of Baron
Bereford. The title of Lord Bereford
was conferred on him by the King. Lord
Bereford has taken the title of Lord
Bereford of Metemeh, and Curragh-
more. Metemeh is the scene of one of
the early exploits of Lord Bereford's
naval career.

Philadelphia, Jan. 10.—Three men
were killed and a number injured in an
accident which occurred yesterday at the
plant of the Du Pont Powder Works at
Carney's Point, N. J. One man is
missing. It has been reported that a
large number of men had lost their
lives, but after an investigation the superin-
tendent of the plant said that only three
were dead and possibly four.

Peking, Jan. 6.—The Government
has suppressed the Peking daily news-
paper Tsinchoupaou at the request of
Eki Hoqi, Japanese Minister to China, be-
cause of the paper's published charges that
Japan is promoting the revolution.

The Chinese minister of agriculture
and commerce, Chow Tzu-chi, will leave
on January 15 for Tokyo as special envoy
of President Yuan Shih-kai to confer the
highest Chinese order upon the Japanese
Emperor.

Ottawa, Jan. 10.—The Separate
School Commission is awaiting authority
from Toronto for the next move in the
Guilgeuse school fight. It is understood it
will be the duty of the commission to
conduct a full investigation of the charges
that Misses DeLoe, and other leaders in
last week's uprising.

The school is in a state of siege, ready
for any move by the government forces.
About 400 men are in the vicinity of the
school, ready to rally to the aid of the
garison of forty women that has been in
the building since Friday.

Washington, Jan. 6.—Complete
rehabilitation of the historic Gracie Con-
stitution, which has lain at the Boston yard
since 1897, where it was launched,
before being taken to the Navy Depart-
ment, which asked Congress to-day
to appropriate \$150,000.

The Constitution, famed in song and
story for daring exploits in the War of
1812, was to be sold for scrap metal,
but the House, swayed by a recitation of
Oliver Wendell Holmes's famous poem,
changed its mind on the verge of voting,
and determined to keep her as a relic.

New York, Jan. 9.—The jury in the
case of the eleven former directors of the
New Haven Railway returned a verdict
of guilty on all counts. Six of the defend-
ants were acquitted. In the case of the
other five the jury disagreed.

The acquitted are: D. Newton Barney,
Robert W. Taft, James Hemmingway, A.
H. Robertson, Frederick F. Brewster, and
Henry K. McHugh. Those on whom the
jury disagreed are: William Rockefeller,
Charles E. Brook, Charles M. Pratt, Lewis
Cass Lyford and Edward D. Robbins.

London, Jan. 8.—The Norwegian
steamer Bonheur, 1,388 tons gross, has
been sunk. Fifteen members of her crew
have been landed.

London, Jan. 7.—An announcement
made last night by the Peninsular and
Oriental Steamship Company says that
the number of persons on board the
steamer Aeneas, who have not been ac-
counted for aggregates 336. Of these, 119
were passengers and 217 members of the
crew.

The sinking of a vessel with the
attendances loss of life is an official
Montevideo statement under date of
January 7, received here from Cattine as
follows:

An Italian steamer from Brindisi with
some hundred tons of supplies and 425
Montevideo recruits from America on
board touched a mine yesterday near San
Giovanni D. Media. The ship sank im-
mediately and two hundred passengers
perished.

Rome, Jan. 7.—A fishing vessel put
in at Anzio to-day, with the lifeboat from
the steamer Aeneas, which had been pick-
ed up.

Examination of the boat seems to bear
out the assertion that it was fired upon
and sunk, while containing passengers,
among whom were women, by the Aus-
trian submarines which torpedoed the
Aeneas. Many hairpins were found in
the boat. Several holes in it, apparently
made by shells from the submarine, had
been stopped up with shawls and torn
skirts.

London, Jan. 9.—The British battle-
ship King Edward VII has been sunk,
after striking a mine. The entire crew
was saved.

The sinking of the King Edward VII
was announced by the admiralty in the
following statement:

H. M. S. King Edward VII has struck
a mine. Owing to the heavy sea she
had to be abandoned, and sank shortly
afterwards. The ship's company was
taken off without any loss of life. Only
two men were injured.

The King Edward VII was launched in
1903, completed in 1905, and carried a
complement of 825 men. Her tonnage was
15,350, and she carried four 12-inch guns,
four 9.2-inch, ten 6-inch, and ten 12-
pounder guns.

JOFFRE'S NEW YEAR'S ADDRESS TO THE ARMY

Paris, Jan. 7.—The order of the day is
issued by General Joffre, the French com-
mander-in-chief, to the army on New Year's
day. General Joffre says: "At the mo-
ment when I have the honor to address you,
you may consider your work with pride
and measure the grandeur of what you
are accomplishing. It is in the Alps, in the
Champsagne, in the Woivre and in the
Vogues you have inflicted upon the enemy
resounding blows and caused him suffer-
ing losses, losses incomparably greater
than his own. The German army still
exists, but it is a shattered and demoralized
army, diminishing each day. Obligated to
surrender to the Allies, Germany must
surrender to the Allies. We are in the
possession of a good deal of the old man's
property, without surrendering ourselves
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
