RESIGNATION OF "HONEST JOHN"

Pursuant to a request by Premier Clarke, Hon. John Morrissey, Chief Commissioner of Public Works, has resigned. The long letter to the premier and the public which accompanied the resignation is printed in all the daily papers and is remarkable in its revelations.

In long has been known that if any one member of the government told all he knew of the inner work of that remarkable institution there would be the dickens to pay.

It seems that "Honest John" was not as deep in the mire as the rest of them and they were afraid of him. He was long ago slated for dismissal but the trouble was how to go about it.

All the charges of Dugal, Carter and Veniot are overshadowed by the revelations of Mr. Morrissey who substantiates and amplifies the charges of Mr. Carter.

Every elector should read carefully the ex-Commissioner's letter. In it he says the books of the Department of Agriculture were kept open because of an expected refund of \$10,000 by B. F. Smith—made necessary by the opposition enquiries about the "potato scandal."

Mention is made of a recent payment of \$500 on the famous York election fund note by Rev. J. B. Daggett.

The liquor men of St. John paid over \$6000 last year to prevent changing the liquor laws to their disadvantage.

An account was paid at over \$10,000 that had been passed at only a little more than \$600.

Mr. Morrissey's letter "lifts the veil" a little but he asserts the worst is yet to come.

B. F. Smith has given himself a certificate of character and the Standard heartily endorses it. Mr. Flemming, it will be remembered, was also endorsed by the Standard and whitewashed by the legislature. Until the patriotic potato business has been investigated, as demanded by Mr. Carter, neither Mr. Smith nor the Standard has any license to preach. The Gleaner says Mr. Smith "has made trouble enough."

The Kite charges have already saved Canada \$1,570,000. Nine days after the charges were made the American Ammunition Company cut the price of fuses already contracted for to the tune of that amount. It has also been proved that the government contention that the Shell Committee were direct agents of the British War Office was not based on facts. There was therefore no ground whatever for the plea that the War Office and not the Canadian parliament should conduct the enquiry. The evidence thus far produced places the government and the Shell Committee in a very unenviable light.

Mr. and Mrs. Frank Clarke have returned to their residence after being away for the winter.

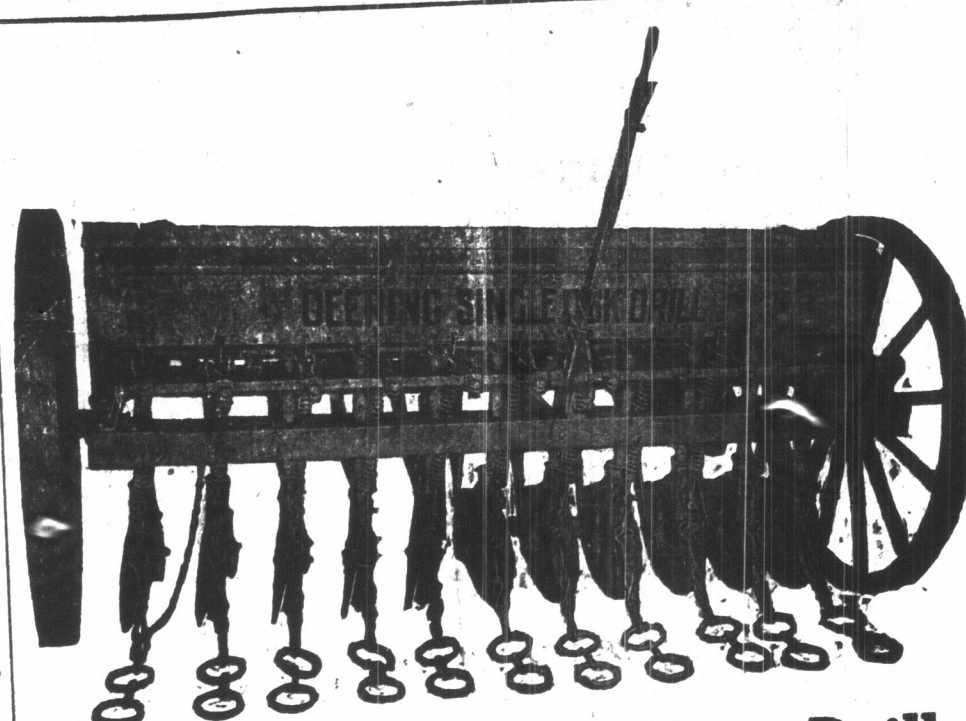
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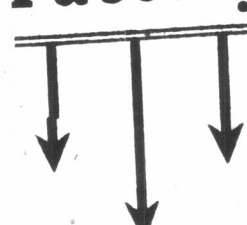
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
