TOWN COUNCIL PASSED BY-LAWS

At Friday's Meeting Good Headway is Made With Important Work

At Friday's meeting of the Town Council most of the evening was devoted to the Rules of Procedure which are the rules that will govern the conduct of the council meeting. Good headway was also made with the passing of the By-Laws. Three of these are of considerable interest to the public.

By-Law No. 3, relates to public exhibitions of all kinds. Hereafter any circus and menagerie will have to pay a tax of \$50 a day. Any out-door show or exhibition will pay a tax of \$5 per day.

On any show, exhibition, play or concert in a public hall in which the performers are five or less there is levied a tax of \$3 for the first day and \$2 for each subsequent day. If the performers number six or more the tax is \$5 and \$3 respectively.

The foregoing are applicable only to those who reside outside the country. For bona-fide residents of the county there is a different scale of taxation. A merry-go-round under such conditions will be taxed \$5 per day and any kind of a show in a public hall will be taxed \$2 for the first day and \$1 for each subsequent day.

A moving picture house may be run every legal day of the year for a tax of \$50, or it may run two days a week, only, for \$25 a year. In addition, if there are vaudeville performers, three in number or less, there will be a tax of \$2 for the first day and a tax of \$1 for each following day. A higher tax is provided for a greater number of performers. No lotteries or drawings for prizes will be allowed. No children under 14 shall be allowed to attend evening performances or picture shows, unless accompanied by parent or guardian, or with the written permission of such parent or guardian.

By-Law No. 4, regulates billiard rooms and similar places of amusement. Briefly stated a pool-room with one table will pay \$15 tax and \$10 for an additional table.

Children under 14 shall not be allowed to play at a pool table, unless accompanied by parent or guardian.

By-Law No. 5, relates to dog taxation. Hereafter the owner, keeper or harbinger of each dog in the town of Hartland must pay a tax of \$1 for each male and \$5 for each female dog.

Those who are affected by the above by-laws are warned that they go into effect from Jan. 23, 1919. The wording of the by-laws in the records of the town is much more lengthy than is here epitomized, and cover a great many points. The town clerk, the town treasurer or any alderman will give full information pending the time when the by-laws can be printed in book form, a copy of which will be accessible to any rate payer.

The council will hold its next session on the first Monday in February.

Primitive Baptist Conference.

On January 4th, 1919, the Primitive Baptist conference met in quarterly session at Hartfield, York Co., N. B., with a fair representation of ministers. Congregations were not as large as common owing to the prevailing heavy snow storm. Session closed on Monday evening with good interest.
